A BILL

To authorize the Secretary of Transportation to make grants to public transportation agencies and over-the-road bus operators to improve security, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Public Transportation
- 5 Security Assistance Act of 2006".

- 19 OTHER GROUPS.—In carrying out this section, the Sec-
- 20 retary shall consult with over-the-road bus management
- 21 and labor representatives, public safety and law enforce-
- 22 ment officials, and the National Academy of Sciences.
- 23 **SEC. 205. FUNDING.**

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- There is authorized to be appropriated to the Sec-
- 25 retary of Transportation to carry out this title

- 1 \$50,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2007 through 2009.
- 2 Such sums shall remain available until expended.

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
