## H. R. 586

## AN ACT

To preserve the use and access of pack and saddle stock animals on public lands, including wilderness areas, national monuments, and other specifically designated areas, administered by the National Park Service, the Bureau of Land Management, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, or the Forest Service where there is a historical tradition of such use, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Right-to-Ride Live-
- 5 stock on Federal Lands Act of 2005".
- 6 SEC. 2. USE AND ACCESS OF PACK AND SADDLE ANIMALS
- 7 ON PUBLIC LANDS.
- 8 (a) National Park System Lands.—Section 12 of
- 9 Public Law 91–383 (16 U.S.C. 1a–7) is amended by add-
- 10 ing at the end the following new subsection:
- 11 "(c) Use and Access of Pack and Saddle Ani-
- 12 MALS.—
- "(1) GENERAL RULE.—The Secretary of the
- 14 Interior shall provide for the management of Na-
- tional Park System lands to preserve and facilitate
- the continued use and access of pack and saddle
- stock animals on such lands, including wilderness
- areas, national monuments, and other specifically
- designated areas, where there is a historical tradi-
- 20 tion of such use. As a general rule, all trails, routes,
- and areas used by pack and saddle stock shall re-
- main open and accessible for such use. The Sec-
- retary may implement a proposed reduction in the
- use and access of pack and saddle stock animals on
- such lands only after complying with the full review

3	"(2) Rules of Construction.—Nothing in
4	paragraph (1) shall be construed—

20	(b) Bureau of Land Management Lands.—Sec-
21	tion 302 of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act
22	of 1976 (43 U.S.C. 1732) is amended by adding at the
23	end the following new subsection:
24	"(e) USE AND ACCESS OF PACK AND SADDLE ANI-
25	MALS.—

"(1) GENERAL RULE.—The Secretary shall provide for the management of public lands to preserve and facilitate the continued use and access of pack and saddle stock animals on such lands, including wilderness areas, national monuments, and other specifically designated areas, where there is a historical tradition of such use. As a general rule, all trails, routes, and areas used by pack and saddle stock shall remain open and accessible for such use. The Secretary may implement a proposed reduction in the use and access of pack and saddle stock animals on such lands only after complying with the full review process required under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.).

"(2) Rules of construction.—Nothing in paragraph (1) shall be construed—

"(A) to authorize the Secretary to refuse to issue a permit for a new use of pack and saddle stock animals, including use by a commercial outfitter or guide, without complying with applicable resource management plans and planning processes required under this Act or any other provision of law;

1 "(B) to limit the authority of the Secretary 2 to impose a temporary emergency closure of a 3 trail, route, or area to pack and saddle stock 4 animals or issue special permits; or 5 "(C) to create a preference for one rec-6 reational use for any area of the public lands, 7 without consideration of the stated purpose of 8 the area.". 9 (c) National Wildlife Refuge System Lands.— Section 4(d) of the National Wildlife Refuge System Ad-10 ministration Act of 1966 (16 U.S.C. 668dd(d)) is amend-11 12 ed by adding at the end the following new paragraph: 13 "(5)(A) The Secretary shall provide for the management of System lands to preserve and facilitate the continued use and access of pack and saddle stock animals on 15 16 such lands, including wilderness areas, national monu-17 ments, and other specifically designated areas, where there 18 is a historical tradition of such use. As a general rule, 19 all trails, routes, and areas used by pack and saddle stock 20 shall remain open and accessible for such use. The Sec-21 retary may implement a proposed reduction in the use and 22 access of pack and saddle stock animals on such lands only 23 after complying with the full review process required under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 24

4321 et seq.).

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1 "(B) Nothing in subparagraph (A) shall be con-2 strued— 3 "(i) to authorize the Secretary to refuse to issue a permit for a new use of pack and saddle 4 5 stock animals, including use by a commercial out-6 fitter or guide, without complying with applicable re-7 source management plans and planning processes re-8 quired under this Act or any other provision of law; 9 "(ii) to limit the authority of the Secretary to 10 impose a temporary emergency closure of a trail, 11 route, or area to pack and saddle stock animals or 12 issue special permits; or "(iii) to create a preference for one recreational 13 14 use for any unit of the System, without consider-15 ation of the stated purpose of the unit.". 16 (d) National Forest System Lands.—Section 15 17 of the Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act of 1974 (16 U.S.C. 1613) is amended— 18 19 (1) by inserting "(a)" before "Regulations"; 20 and 21 (2) by adding at the end the following new sub-22 section: 23 "(b) Use and Access of Pack and Saddle Ani-24 MALS.—

1 "(1) GENERAL RULE.—The Secretary shall pro-2 vide for the management of National Forest System 3 lands to preserve and facilitate the continued use 4 and access of pack and saddle stock animals on such 5 lands, including wilderness areas, national monu-6 ments, and other specifically designated areas, where 7 there is a historical tradition of such use. As a gen-8 eral rule, all trails, routes, and areas used by pack 9 and saddle stock shall remain open and accessible 10 for such use. The Secretary may implement a pro-11 posed reduction in the use and access of pack and 12 saddle stock animals on such lands only after com-13 plying with the full review process required under 14 the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (42) 15 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.).

"(2) Rules of construction.—Nothing in paragraph (1) shall be construed—

"(A) to authorize the Secretary to refuse to issue a permit for a new use of pack and saddle stock animals, including use by a commercial outfitter or guide, without complying with applicable resource management plans and planning processes required under this Act or any other provision of law;

13	of use of pack and saddle stock animals on Federal lands					
14	for purposes of the amendments made by this section.
