# H. R. 6209

To protect the religious freedom of providers of adoption or foster care services.

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## IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. ENGLISH of Pennsylvania (for himself, Mr. GREEN of Wisconsin, Mr. WILSON of South Carolina, Mr. SOUDER, Mr. KENNEDY of Minnesota, Mr. GINGREY, Mr. AKIN, Mr. MILLER of Florida, Mr. McCOTTER, Mr. SAM JOHNSON of Texas, Mrs. MUSGRAVE, and Mr. FORTUÑO) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means

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## A BILL

To protect the religious freedom of providers of adoption or foster care services.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Religious Freedom for  
5 Providers of Adoption, Foster Care, and Child Welfare  
6 Services Act”.

7 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

8 The Congress finds as follows:

1           (1) The Constitution of the United States  
2 grants the Congress the power to provide for the  
3 general welfare of the people of the United States,  
4 and prohibits the enactment of laws that violate the  
5 freedom of religion guaranteed by the First Amend-  
6 ment.

7           (2) Among the many ways that Congress pro-  
8 vides for the general welfare is by providing approxi-  
9 mately \$7,000,000,000 annually in Federal funds to  
10 support the provision of foster care, adoption, and  
11 other child welfare services to children and families  
12 in need of such services.

13          (3) One of the most important of these services  
14 is the placement of foster or adoptive children with  
15 families who are capable of providing appropriate  
16 care for these needy children.

17          (4) Religious organizations have played a long-  
18 standing role in the effective provision of these serv-  
19 ices, especially placement services.

20          (5) Some State and local governments have in  
21 effect laws, policies, or procedures under which li-  
22 censes necessary for religious organizations to pro-  
23 vide foster care and adoption services are denied, or  
24 threatened to be denied, unless these organizations  
25 violate their own religious principles and beliefs and

1 agree to place foster or adoptive children with cou-  
2 ples whose marriage is not recognized by Federal  
3 statute.

4 (6) These actions by State and local govern-  
5 ments inhibit the religious freedom of religious orga-  
6 nizations that seek to provide these services, by dis-  
7 criminating against them for providing these services  
8 in a manner that does not violate their religious  
9 principles and beliefs.

10 (7) An appropriate and effective method of en-  
11 couraging cooperation with the Federal policy of  
12 supporting the provision of these services in a man-  
13 ner consistent with the freedom of religion is to  
14 withhold Federal funds from State or local govern-  
15 ments who act in violation of this policy.

16 (8) Therefore, this Act provides for the with-  
17 holding of Federal funds for foster care and adop-  
18 tion assistance to States that restrict the freedom of  
19 religious organizations to provide foster care and  
20 adoptive services consistent with the fundamental re-  
21 ligious beliefs and principles of these organizations.

1 **SEC. 3. PROTECTING RELIGIOUS FREEDOM OF ENTITIES**  
2 **THAT PROVIDE ADOPTION OR FOSTER CARE**  
3 **SERVICES.**

4 Section 474 of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.  
5 674) is amended by adding at the end the following:

6 “(g) PROTECTING RELIGIOUS FREEDOM OF ENTI-  
7 TIES THAT PROVIDE ADOPTION OR FOSTER CARE SERV-  
8 ICES.—None of the funds made available to carry out this  
9 part may be made available to a State or local government  
10 that discriminates against any entity on the basis that—

11 “(1) the only couples to whom the entity pro-  
12 vides adoption or foster care services are couples  
13 united in marriage (as defined in section 7 of title  
14 1, United States Code); or

15 “(2) the only individuals to whom the entity  
16 provides adoption or foster care services are those  
17 whose conduct is in accordance with the religious  
18 principles and practices of the entity.”.

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
