A BILL

To amend title 18, United States Code, to provide penalties for aiming laser pointers at airplanes, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Securing Aircraft5 Cockpits Against Lasers Act of 2006".

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3 (a) OFFENSE.—Chapter 2 of title 18, United States4 Code, is amended by adding at the end the following:

5 "§ 39B. Aiming a laser pointer at an aircraft

6 "(a) IN GENERAL.—Whoever knowingly aims the 7 beam of a laser pointer at an aircraft in the special air-8 craft jurisdiction of the United States, or at the flight path 9 of such an aircraft, shall be fined under this title, impris-10 oned not more than 5 years, or both.

11 "(b) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term 'laser 12 pointer' means any device designed or used to amplify 13 electromagnetic radiation by stimulated emission that 14 emits a beam designed to be used by the operator as a 15 pointer or highlighter to indicate, mark, or identify a spe-16 cific position, place, item, or object.

17 "(c) EXCEPTIONS.—This section does not prohibit
18 aiming a beam of a laser pointer at an aircraft, or the
19 flight path of such an aircraft, by—

"(1) an individual authorized to engage in such
conduct by an aircraft manufacturer as part of the
conduct of research and development or flight test
operations conducted by such manufacturer;

24 "(2) an official of the Federal Aviation Admin25 istration authorized to engage in such conduct;

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"(3) any other person authorized by the Fed-
eral Aviation Administration to engage in such con-
duct as part of research and development or flight
test operations;
"(4) a member or element of the Department of
Defense or Department of Homeland Security acting
in an official capacity for the purpose of research,
development, operations, testing, or training; or

9 ergency sig-10 naling device to send an emergency distress signal. "(d) REGULATIONS.— 11

"(1) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General, in 12 13 consultation with the Secretary of Transportation, 14 may provide by regulation, after public notice and 15 comment, such additional exceptions to this section as may be necessary and appropriate. 16

17 "(2) NOTICE TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 90 18 days before the date any regulations issued under 19 paragraph (1) become final, the Attorney General 20 shall provide written notification of any proposed 21 regulations under this section to the Committee on 22 the Judiciary and the Committee on Commerce, 23 Science, and Transportation of the Senate and the 24 Committee on the Judiciary and the Committee on

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Transportation and Infrastructure of the House of 1 2 Representatives.". 3 (b) TECHNICAL AND CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.— 4 (1) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 2 of title 18, United 5 States Code, is amended by redesignating the section 39 relating to commercial motor vehicle inspec-6 7 tions as section 39A. 8 (2) Amendment to table of sections.— 9 The table of sections at the beginning of chapter 2 of title 18, United States Code, is amended by strik-10 11 ing the item relating to the section 39 relating to 12 commercial motor vehicle inspections and inserting the following 13

"39A. Commercial motor vehicles required to stop for inspections. "39B. Aiming a laser pointer at an aircraft.".

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
