A BILL

To provide a site for the National Women's History Museum in the District of Columbia.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "National Women's His-
- 5 tory Museum Act of 2005".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress finds that—

1	(1) the National Women's History Museum
2	Inc., is a nonprofit, nonpartisan, educational institu-
3	tion incorporated in the District of Columbia;
4	(2) the National Women's History Museum was
5	established—
6	(A) to research and present the historic
7	contributions that women have made to all as-
8	pects of human endeavor; and
9	(B) to explore and present in a fair and
10	balanced way the contributions that women
11	have made to the Nation in their various roles
12	in family and society;
13	(3) in March 1999, the President's Commission
14	on the celebrating of Women in American History
15	concluded that "efforts to implement an appropriate
16	celebration of women's history in the next millen-
17	nium should include the designation of a focal point
18	for women's history in our nation's capital" cit-
19	ing the efforts of the National Women's History Mu-
20	seum to implement this goal;
21	(4) the National Women's History Museum will
22	collect and disseminate information concerning
23	women including through the establishment of a na-

tional reference center for the collection and preser-

- vation of documents, publications, and research relating to women;
 - (5) the National Women's History Museum will foster educational programs relating to the history and contribution to society by women, including promotion of imaginative educational approaches to enhance understanding and appreciation of historic contributions by women;
 - (6) the National Women's History Museum will publicly display temporary and permanent exhibits that illustrate, interpret, and demonstrate the contributions of women;
 - (7) the National Women's History Museum requires a museum site near the National Mall to accomplish the objectives and fulfill the ongoing educational mission of the museum;
 - (8) the 3-story glass enclosed structure known as the "Pavilion Annex" is a retail shopping mall built next to the Old Post Office in 1992 by private developers using no Federal funds on public land in the Federal Triangle south of Pennsylvania Avenue, NW.;
 - (9) the Pavilion Annex came into the possession of the General Services Administration following

1	bankruptcy and default by the private developer of
2	the Old Post Office Pavilion;
3	(10) the Pavilion Annex has been vacant for
4	over 10 years and is in a state of disrepair;
5	(11) the Pavilion Annex is located near an area
6	that has been identified as an ideal location for mu-
7	seums and memorials in the Memorials and Muse-
8	ums Master Plan developed by the National Capital
9	Planning Commission;
10	(12) the National Women's History Museum
11	will provide a vibrant, cultural activity in a building
12	currently controlled by the General Services Admin-
13	istration but unused by any Federal agency or activ-
14	ity;
15	(13) the Government Accountability Office has
16	determined that vacant or underutilized properties
17	present significant potential risks to Federal agen-
18	cies, including—
19	(A) lost dollars because of the difficulty of
20	maintaining the properties; and
21	(B) lost opportunities because the prop-
22	erties could be put to more cost-beneficial uses,
23	exchanged for other needed property, or sold to
24	generate revenue for the Government;

1	(14) the National Women's History Museum
2	will use Government property for which there is no
3	Government use as of the date of enactment of this
4	Act, in order to—
5	(A) promote utilization, economy, and effi-
6	ciency of Government-owned assets; and
7	(B) create an income producing activity;
8	(15) the National Women's History Museum
9	will attract an estimated 1,500,000 visitors annually
10	to the District of Columbia; and
11	(16) the National Women's History Museum
12	will promote economic activity in the District of Co-
13	lumbia by—
14	(A) creating jobs;
15	(B) increasing visitor spending on hotels,
16	meals, and transportation; and
17	(C) generating tax revenue for the District
18	of Columbia.
19	SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.
20	In this Act:
21	(1) Administrator.—The term "Adminis-
22	trator" means the Administrator of General Serv-
23	ices.
24	(2) Museum sponsor.—The term "Museum
25	Sponsor' means the National Women's History Mu-

1	seum, Inc., a nonprofit organization incorporated in
2	1996 in the District of Columbia.
3	(3) PAVILION ANNEX.—The term "Pavilion
4	Annex" means the building (and immediate sur-
5	roundings, including any land unoccupied as of the
6	date of enactment of this Act) in Washington, Dis-
7	trict of Columbia that is—
8	(A) known as the "Pavilion Annex";
9	(B) adjacent to the Old Post Office Build-
10	ing;
11	(C) located on Pennsylvania Avenue, NW.,
12	to the east of 11th Street NW.; and
13	(D) located on land bounded on 3 sides by
14	the Internal Revenue Service buildings.
15	SEC. 4. OCCUPANCY AGREEMENT.
16	(a) In General.—Notwithstanding any other provi-
17	sion of law, the Administrator shall enter into an occu-
18	pancy agreement to make the Pavilion Annex available to
19	the Museum Sponsor for use as a National Women's His-
20	tory Museum in accordance with this section.
21	(b) Payments.—The Administrator shall enter into
22	negotiations with the Museum Sponsor concerning pay-
23	ment to the Federal Government based on the cost basis
24	of the Pavilion Annex or prior appraisals or expert opin-

1	ions rendered to the General Services Administration re-
2	lating to valuation of the structure.
3	(c) Appraisal.—
4	(1) IN GENERAL.—If the Administrator and the
5	Museum Sponsor are unable to reach agreement on
6	fair market value for the purpose of determining
7	rent within 90 days after the date of enactment of
8	this Act, fair market value for the purpose of deter-
9	mining rent shall be determined by not more than
10	3 appraisers, operating under a common set of in-
11	structions, of whom—
12	(A) 1 shall be retained by the Adminis-
13	trator;
14	(B) 1 shall be retained by the Museum
15	Sponsor; and
16	(C) 1 shall be selected by the first 2 ap-
17	praisers only if—
18	(i) the first 2 appraisals are irrecon-
19	cilable; and
20	(ii) the difference in value between the
21	first 2 appraisals is greater than 10 per-
22	cent.
23	(2) Difference of not more than 10 per-
24	CENT.—If the 2 appraisals differ by not more than

10 percent, the fair market value shall be the aver-

2	age of the 2 appraisals.
3	(3) IRRECONCILABLE APPRAISALS.—If a third
4	appraiser is selected—
5	(A) the fee of the third appraiser shall be
6	paid in equal shares by the Administrator and
7	the Museum Sponsor; and
8	(B) the fair market value determined by
9	the third appraiser shall bind both parties.
10	(d) TERM OF OCCUPANCY AGREEMENT.—
11	(1) In general.—The term of the occupancy
12	agreement shall be at least 99 years, or any lesser
13	term agreed to by the Museum Sponsor.
14	(2) First payment shall
15	be due on the date that is 5 years after the date of
16	execution of the occupancy agreement.
17	(e) Private Funds.—The terms and conditions of
18	the occupancy agreement shall facilitate raising of private
19	funds for the modification, development, maintenance, se-
20	curity, information, janitorial, and other services that are
21	necessary to assure the preservation and operation of the
22	museum.
23	(f) Shared Facilities.—The occupancy agreement
24	may include reasonable terms and conditions pertaining

1	to shared facilities to permit continued operations and en-
2	able development of adjacent buildings.
3	(g) Renovation and Modification.—
4	(1) In general.—The renovation and modi-
5	fication of the Pavilion Annex—
6	(A) shall be carried out by the Museum
7	Sponsor, in consultation with the Adminis-
8	trator; and
9	(B) shall—
10	(i) be commenced as soon as prac-
11	ticable but not later than 5 years after the
12	date of execution of the occupancy agree-
13	ment;
14	(ii) sever the walkway to the Old Post
15	Office Building; and
16	(iii) enhance and improve the Pavilion
17	Annex consistent with the needs of the Na-
18	tional Women's History Museum and the
19	adjacent structures.
20	(2) Expense credit.—Any expenses incurred
21	by the Museum Sponsor under this subsection shall
22	be credited against the payment under subsection
23	(d)(2).
24	(h) Report.—

(1) In General.—If the Administrator is un-1 2 able to fully execute an occupancy agreement within 3 180 days of the date of enactment of this Act, not 4 later than 240 days after the date of enactment of 5 this Act, the Administrator shall submit to the Com-6 mittee on Homeland Security and Governmental Af-7 fairs in the Senate and the Committees on Trans-8 portation and Infrastructure and Government Re-9 form in the House of Representatives a report. (2) Contents.—The report shall contain— 10

- (A) a summary of the issues that remain unresolved and an analysis of the position of the General Services Administration;
- (B) an itemization, including date, where appropriate, and costs of actions taken by the General Services Administration to maintain and secure the Pavilion Annex to prevent further deterioration; and
- 19 (C) a plan for future use and development 20 of the Pavilion Annex, including plans for ap-21 propriate security improvements.

22 SEC. 5. EFFECT ON OTHER LAW.

Nothing in this Act shall limit the authority of the National Capital Planning Commission and the National Capital Planning Commission shall retain authority over

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- 1 development in the Federal Triangle development area as
- 2 defined in subchapter II of chapter 67 of title 40, United

3 States Code (40 U.S.C. 6711 et seq.).

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
