minute and to revise and extend her remarks.)

Ms. WATSON. Madam Speaker, earlier this year, the House Republican leadership purged the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct of three of the Republican Members. After losing his chairmanship, the gentleman from Colorado (Mr. HEFLEY) told The Washington Post, and I am quoting, "There's a bad perception out there that there was a purge in the committee and that people were put in that would protect our side of the aisle better than I did."
