A BILL

To authorize assistance to the countries of the Caribbean to fund educational development and exchange programs.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE AND TABLE OF CONTENTS.
- 4 (a) Short Title.—This Act may be cited as the
- 5 "Shirley A. Chisholm United States-Caribbean Educational

- 11 (1) Administrator.—Except as otherwise pro-
- vided, the term "Administrator" means the Adminis-
- trator of the United States Agency for International
- 14 Development.

2	TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional commit-
3	tees" means—
4	(A) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and
5	the Committee on Appropriations of the House of
6	Representatives; and
7	(B) the Committee on Foreign Relations
8	and the Committee on Appropriations of the
9	Senate.
10	(3) CARICOM COUNTRY.—The term "CARICOM
11	country"—
12	(A) means a member country of the Carib-
13	bean Community (CARICOM); but
14	(B) does not include—
15	(i) a country having observer status in
16	$CARICOM;\ or$
17	(ii) a country the government of which
18	the Secretary of State has determined, for
19	purposes of section 6(j) of the Export Ad-
20	ministration Act of 1979 (as continued in
21	effect pursuant to the International Emer-
22	gency Economic Powers Act), section 40 of
23	the Arms Export Control Act, section 620A
24	of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961, or
25	any other provision of law, is a government

3	(4) Secretary.—Except as otherwise provided,

8	cation, including, to the maximum extent prac-					
9	ticable, an historically Black college or univer-					
10	sity that is a part B institution (as such term					
11	is defined in section 322(2) of the Higher Edu-					
12	cation Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1061(2))) or an					
13	Hispanic-serving institution (as such term is de-					
14	fined in section 502(5) of such Act (20 U.S.C.					
15	1101a(5)));					
16	(B) a higher education association;					
17	(C) a nongovernmental organization incor-					
18	porated in the United States; or

22	SEC. 3. FINDINGS AND STATEMENT OF PURPOSE.					
23	(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:					
24	(1) The United States and CARICOM countries					
25	have enjoyed long-standing friendly relations.					

- (2) As an important regional partner for trade and democratic values, the Caribbean region constitutes a "Third Border" of the United States.
 - (3) The decrease in tourism revenue in the aftermath of the tragic terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, had an adverse affect on the Caribbean region.
 - (4) According to a 2005 World Bank Report on the Caribbean region, high rates of unemployment, particularly youth unemployment, have had severe implications on poverty and income distributions, as well as drug trafficking and addiction.
 - (5) The 2005 World Bank Report also concludes that better synchronization is needed between curricula in CARICOM countries and the skills needed in evolving national and regional job markets and economies.
 - (6) Caribbean leaders have highlighted the need for increased educational opportunities for Caribbean students in fields that will contribute to and support an increasingly competitive regional economy.
 - (7) Enhancing United States cultural and educational exchange programs in CARICOM countries will expand human resources, provide opportunities that promote economic growth, and improve regional security.

- 1 (8) Many Caribbean leaders studied at the un2 dergraduate or graduate level in the United States be3 fore returning to their respective countries to con4 tribute toward the strengthening of democracy, the
 5 economy, or the provision of social services.
 - (9) From 2003 through 2005, 217 Caribbean leaders participated in exchange programs with the United States that focused on good governance, combating drug trafficking, anti-corruption, and other regional issues of concern.
 - (10) The Department of State currently administers public outreach programs that include cultural, academic, and citizen-exchange initiatives in CARICOM countries through the public affairs sections at United States embassies with support from the Office of Public Diplomacy in the Bureau of Western Hemisphere Affairs.
 - (11) The Caribbean Center for Excellence in Teacher Training (C-CETT), a Presidential Initiative funded by the United States Agency for International Development and implemented by the University of the West Indies, works to improve the quality of reading instruction by training classroom and student teachers in seven countries of the English-speaking Caribbean. Belize, Jamaica, Grenada, St.

- 1 Lucia, Guyana, St. Vincent and the Grenadines, and
- 2 Trinidad and Tobago have participated in the C-
- 3 CETT as a means to reducing illiteracy in the most
- 4 disadvantaged urban and remote rural areas.
- (12) In Anguilla, Antigua and Barbuda, the Ba-5 6 hamas, Barbados, Belize, the Cayman Islands, the 7 Dominican Republic, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, 8 Jamaica, Montserrat, St. Kitts and Nevis, St. Lucia, 9 St. Vincent and the Grenadines, Suriname, and Trin-10 idad and Tobago, the Bureau of Educational and 11 Cultural Affairs of the Department of State sponsors 12 educational advisors to promote study in the United
 - (13) In the 2004–2005 academic year, approximately 14,000 Caribbean students were enrolled in United States colleges and universities.
 - (14) Shirley Anita Chisholm, who served as a member of the United States House of Representatives from 1968 to 1983, had family roots in the Caribbean nation of Barbados, was a staunch advocate for educational opportunity and access, and increased support for historically Black colleges and universities and other minority-serving institutions in the United States.

1	(b) Statement of Purpose.—The purpose of this					
2	Act is to establish—					
3	(1) an educational exchange program between					
4	the United States and CARICOM countries, to be					
5	known as the "Shirley A. Chisholm United States-					
6	Caribbean Educational Exchange Program", pursu-					
7	ant to section 4 of this Act to assist in educating					
8	promising students and scholars from CARICOM					
9	countries who will invest the knowledge and experi-					
10	ences they gain in the United States back into the					
11	community of CARICOM countries; and					
12	(2) a program to provide educational develop-					
13	ment assistance for CARICOM countries pursuant to					
14	section 5 of this Act.					
15	SEC. 4. SHIRLEY A. CHISHOLM UNITED STATES-CARIBBEAN					
16	EDUCATIONAL EXCHANGE PROGRAM.					
17	(a) Program Authorized.—The Secretary of State					
18	is authorized to establish an educational exchange program					
19	between the United States and CARICOM countries, to be					
20	known as the "Shirley A. Chisholm United States-Carib-					
21	bean Educational Exchange Program," under which—					
22	(1) secondary school students from CARICOM					
23	countries will—					
24	(A) attend a public or private secondary					
25	school in the United States;					

1	(B) participate in activities designed to
2	promote a greater understanding of the values
3	and culture of the United States; and
4	(C) have the option to live with a United
5	States host family and experience life in a
6	United States host community; and
7	(2) undergraduate students, graduate students,
8	post-graduate students, and scholars from CARICOM
9	countries will—
10	(A) attend a public or private college or
11	university, including a community college, in the
12	United States;
13	(B) participate in activities designed to
14	promote a greater understanding of the values
15	and culture of the United States; and
16	(C) have the option to live with a United
17	States host family and experience life in a
18	United States host community or live in an on-
19	campus housing environment.
20	(b) Elements of Program.—The program author-
21	ized under subsection (a) shall meet the following require-
22	ments:
23	(1) The program will offer scholarships to stu-
24	dents and scholars based on merit and need. It is the
25	sense of Congress that scholarships should be offered

1	under the program to students and scholars who evi-
2	dence merit, achievement, and strong potential for the
3	studies such students and scholars wish to undertake
4	under the program and 40 percent of scholarships of-
5	fered under the program should be based on financial
6	need.
7	(2) The program will seek to achieve gender
8	equality in granting scholarships under the program.
9	(3) The program will limit participation to—
10	(A) two years of study for secondary school
11	students;
12	(B) four years of study for undergraduate
13	students;
14	(C) 30 months of study for graduate stu-
15	dents; and
16	(D) one year of study for post-graduate stu-
17	dents and scholars.
18	(4) For a period of time equal to the period of
19	time of participation in the program, but not to ex-
20	ceed 2 years, the program will require participants
21	who are students and scholars described in subsection
22	(a)(2) to—
23	(A) agree to return to live in a CARICOM
24	country and maintain residence in such country,

1	within 6 months of completion of academic stud-
2	ies; or
3	(B) agree to obtain employment that di-
4	rectly benefits the growth, progress, and develop-
5	ment of one or more CARICOM countries and
6	the people of such countries.
7	(5) The Secretary of State shall have the discre-
8	tion to waive, shorten the duration, or otherwise alter
9	the requirements of paragraph (5) in limited cir-
10	cumstances of hardship, humanitarian needs, for spe-
11	cific educational purposes, or in furtherance of the
12	national interests of the United States.
13	(c) Role of United States Cooperating Agen-
14	CIES.—The Secretary shall consult with United States co-
15	operating agencies in developing the program authorized
16	under subsection (a) and shall make grants to United States
17	cooperating agencies in carrying out the program author-
18	ized under subsection (a).
19	(d) Monitoring and Evaluation of Program.—
20	(1) In general.—The Secretary shall establish
21	and implement a system to monitor and evaluate the
22	effectiveness and efficiency of the program authorized
23	under subsection (a). In carrying out the system, the
24	Secretary shall evaluate the program's positive or

negative effects on brain drain from the participating

1	CARICOM countries and suggest ways in which the
2	program may be improved to promote the basic goal
3	of alleviating brain-drain from the participating
4	CARICOM countries.
5	(2) Requirements.—In carrying out para-
6	graph (1), the Secretary shall review on a regular
7	basis—
8	(A) financial information relating to the
9	program;
10	(B) budget plans for the program;
11	(C) adjustments to plans established for the
12	program;
13	(D) graduation rates of participants in the
14	program;
15	(E) the percentage of participants who are
16	students described in subsection (a)(1) who pur-
17	sue higher education;
18	(F) the percentage of participants who re-
19	turn to their home country or another
20	$CARICOM\ country;$
21	(G) the types of careers pursued by partici-
22	pants in the program and the extent to which
23	such careers are linked to the political, economic,
24	and social development needs of CARICOM
25	countries; and

1	(H) the impact of gender, country of origin,
2	financial need of students, and other relevant
3	factors on the data collected under subpara-
4	graphs (D) through (G).
5	(e) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Congress
6	that the Secretary should seek to work with CARICOM
7	countries to establish an educational exchange program
8	under which—
9	(1) secondary school students from the United
10	States will attend a public or private equivalent
11	school in CARICOM countries; and
12	(2) undergraduate students, graduate students,
13	post-graduate students, and scholars from the United
14	States will attend a public or private college or uni-
15	versity in CARICOM countries.
16	SEC. 5. PROGRAM TO PROVIDE EDUCATIONAL DEVELOP
17	MENT ASSISTANCE FOR CARICOM COUN-
18	TRIES.
19	(a) Program Authorized.—The Secretary of State,
20	acting through the Administrator of the United States
21	Agency for International Development, is authorized to es-
22	tablish a program to provide educational development as-
23	sistance for CARICOM countries.
24	(b) Purpose of Program.—The purpose of the pro-
25	aram authorized under subsection (a) is to improve pri-

mary and secondary education in CARICOM countries by enhancing teacher training, strengthening curriculum and instructional materials, and assisting improvements in 3 4 school management and public administration of education. 5 (c) Elements of Program.—The program authorized under subsection (a) shall extend and expand upon existing primary and secondary school programs in 8 CARICOM countries to provide— 9 (1) teacher-training methods and training in 10 subject area studies; 11 (2) classroom and school management; 12 development and modernization of cur-13 riculum and instructional materials: (4) increased community involvement in school 14 15 activities; and 16 (5) local, regional, and national government pol-17 icy planning on the elements described in paragraphs 18 (1) through (4). 19 (d) Role of United States Cooperating Agen-CIES.—The Secretary shall consult with the Secretary of 20 Education and United States cooperating agencies in devel-21

oping the program authorized under subsection (a) and

shall make grants to United States cooperating agencies in

carrying out the program authorized under subsection (a).

- 1 (e) Monitoring and Evaluation of Program.—The
- 2 Secretary shall establish and implement a system to mon-
- 3 itor and evaluate the effectiveness and efficiency of the pro-
- 4 gram authorized under subsection (a).
- 5 (f) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Congress
- 6 that the Secretary should seek to work with CARICOM
- 7 countries to establish an educational development program
- 8 under which education in the CARICOM countries is im-
- 9 proved and access to quality education for children in
- 10 CARICOM countries is increased.

11 SEC. 6. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS.

- 12 (a) Funding From Private Sources and Partner-
- 13 Ships With Other Appropriate Entities.—To the
- 14 maximum extent practicable, the Secretary of State and the
- 15 Administrator of the United States Agency for Inter-
- 16 national Development should implement the programs au-
- 17 thorized under sections 4 and 5 of this Act through utiliza-
- 18 tion of funding from private sources to maximize the im-
- 19 pact of United States funds under this Act, and through
- 20 partnerships with appropriate United States organizations,
- 21 institutions, and corporations.
- 22 (b) Avoidance of Duplication.—The Secretary and
- 23 the Administrator shall consult with the Secretary of Edu-
- 24 cation to ensure that—

1	(1) activities under the programs authorized						
2	under sections 4 and 5 of this Act are not duplicative						
3	of other United States educational programs for						
4	CARICOM countries; and						
5	(2) United States cooperating agencies and part-						
6	ner institutions in CARICOM countries are accred-						
7	ited by national or regional accrediting bodies.						
8	(c) Reporting Under SEVIS.—To the extent nec-						
9	essary, the Secretary shall provide support to United States						
10	cooperating agencies that are participating in the program						
11	authorized under section 4 of this Act in order to fulfill						
12	the requirements for student data reporting under the Stu-						
13	dent and Exchange Visitor Information System (SEVIS).						
14	SEC. 7. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS.						
15	(a) Report Required.—Not later than 90 days after						
16	the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State						
17	shall submit to the appropriate congressional committees a						
18	report on plans to implement the programs authorized						
19	under sections 4 and 5 of this Act.						
20	(b) Matters To Be Included.—The report required						
21	by subsection (a) shall include—						
22	(1) with respect to implementation of the pro-						
23	gram authorized under section 4—						
24	(A) a plan for selecting participants in the						
25	program, including an estimate of the number of						

1	secondary school students, undergraduate stu-
2	dents, graduate students, post-graduate students,
3	and scholars from each country, by educational
4	level, who will be selected as participants in the
5	program for each fiscal year;
6	(B) a timeline for selecting United States
7	cooperating agencies that will assist in imple-
8	menting the program;
9	(C) a financial plan that—
10	(i) identifies budget plans for each edu-
11	cational level under the program; and
12	(ii) identifies plans or systems to en-
13	sure that the costs to public school, college,
14	and university education under the pro-
15	gram and the costs to private school, college,
16	and university education under the pro-
17	gram are reasonably allocated; and
18	(D) a plan to provide outreach to and link-
19	ages with schools, colleges and universities, and
20	nongovernmental organizations in both the
21	United States and CARICOM countries for im-
22	plementation of the program; and
23	(2) a plan outlining implementation of the pro-
24	gram authorized under section 5, identifying the ini-

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1	tial countries in which the program will be imple-
2	mented and a timeline for implementation.
3	(c) Updates of Report.—
4	(1) In general.—The Secretary shall submit to
5	the appropriate congressional committees updates of
6	the report required by subsection (a) for each fiscal
7	year for which amounts are appropriated pursuant to
8	the authorization of appropriations under section 8 of
9	this Act.
10	(2) Matters to be included.—Such updates
11	shall include the following:
12	(A) Information on United States cooper-
13	ating agencies that are selected to assist in im-
14	plementing the programs authorized under sec-
15	tions 4 and 5 of this Act.
16	(B) An analysis of the positive and negative
17	impacts the program authorized under section 4
18	will have or is having on brain drain from the
19	$participating\ CARICOM\ countries.$
20	(C) A description of efforts made by the
21	Secretary of State, acting through the Adminis-
22	trator of the United States Agency for Inter-
23	national Development to implement the pro-

 $gram\ authorized\ under\ section\ 5.$

(D) A description of the programs established in each CARICOM country receiving assistance under the program authorized under section 5 that provides a detailed explanation of the extent to which the program and the assistance provided are contributing to the purpose of the program described in section 5(b) in the CARICOM country.

(E) An evaluation of additional educational development goals in CARICOM countries, identifying those goals that could be maximized or achieved with United States assistance through the program authorized under section 5. In addition to standard or necessary areas of education review, the evaluation should give attention to factors affecting academic achievement, attrition, and graduation rates in CARICOM countries. The evaluation should suggest ways in which United States assistance can maximize success factors and address factors contributing to poor achievement.

22 SEC. 8. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

To carry out this Act, there are authorized to be appropriated such sums as may be necessary for each of the fiscal years 2008 through 2012. Amounts appropriated pursuant

- 1 to the authorization of appropriations under this section
- 2 are in addition to amounts otherwise available for such
- 3 purposes.
