Mr. Kline of Minnesota (for himself, Mr. Hayes, Mr. Ramstad, Mrs. Bachmann, Mr. Jones of North Carolina, Mr. Abercrombie, Mr. Peterson of Minnesota, Mr. Lobiondo, Mr. Walz of Minnesota, Mr. Ellison, Mrs. Boyda of Kansas, Mrs. Gillibrand, Mr. Oberstar, and Mr. Wilson of South Carolina) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Armed Services

A BILL

To establish the National Guard Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Yellow Ribbon Re-
- 5 integration Program Act of 2007".
- 6 SEC. 2. NATIONAL GUARD YELLOW RIBBON REINTEGRA-
- 7 TION PROGRAM.
- 8 (a) Establishment.—The Secretary of Defense, in
- 9 coordination with the Chief of the National Guard Bureau,

- 1 shall establish a national combat veteran reintegration
- 2 program to provide National Guard members and their
- 3 families with sufficient information, services, referral, and
- 4 proactive outreach opportunities throughout the entire de-
- 5 ployment cycle. This program shall be known as the Yel-
- 6 low Ribbon Reintegration Program.
- 7 (b) Purpose.—The Yellow Ribbon Reintegration
- 8 Program shall consist of informational events and activi-
- 9 ties for Reserve Component members, their families, and
- 10 community members through the four phases of the de-
- 11 ployment cycle:
- 12 (1) Pre-deployment.
- 13 (2) Deployment.
- 14 (3) Demobilization.
- 15 (4) Post-deployment-reconstitution.
- 16 (c) Consultation.—The Secretary and National
- 17 Guard Bureau Chief shall consult with the following par-
- 18 ties during establishment of the program:
- 19 (1) The Adjutant General of the Minnesota Na-
- tional Guard and officials associated with the State's
- 21 "Beyond the Yellow Ribbon" Reintegration Pro-
- gram.
- 23 (2) Adjutants General of the remaining 53
- 24 States and territories.
- 25 (d) Organization.—

- (1) EXECUTIVE AGENT.—The Secretary shall designate the National Guard Bureau as the Department of Defense executive agent for the Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program.
 - (2) Establishment of the office for reintegration programs.—
 - (A) IN GENERAL.—The National Guard Bureau shall establish the Office for Reintegration Programs within the National Guard Bureau Joint Staff. This office shall administer all reintegration programs in coordination with State National Guard organizations.
 - (B) Office composition.—The Office for Reintegration Programs shall consist of six full-time National Guard Bureau personnel to administer the Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program. The office shall be responsible for coordination with existing National Guard family and support programs. The Directors of the Army National Guard and Air National Guard may appoint liaison officers to work with the permanent office staff. The office shall closely coordinate with the Army National Guard and Air National Guard Directorates for Manpower and Personnel with respect to existing family sup-

port structure, mobilization schedules, training schedules, training plans and programs, and any other personnel issues.

(3) Advisory Board.—

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(A) APPOINTMENT.—The Chief of the National Guard Bureau shall appoint an advisory board to analyze and report areas of success and areas for necessary improvements. The advisory board shall include, but is not limited to, the Director of the Army National Guard, the Director of the Air National Guard, the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Reserve Affairs, an Adjutant General on a rotational basis as determined by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau, the Director of the National Guard Bureau Manpower and Personnel Directorate (J-1), and any other Department of Defense, Federal Government agency, or outside organization as determined by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau. The members of the advisory board may designate representatives in their stead.

(B) Schedule.—The advisory board shall meet on a schedule as determined by the Chief of the National Guard Bureau.

1	(C) REPORTING REQUIREMENT.—The ad-
2	visory board shall issue internal reports as nec-
3	essary and shall submit an initial report to the
4	Committees on Armed Services not later than
5	180 days after the end of a one-year period
6	from establishment of the Office for Reintegra-
7	tion Programs. This report shall contain—
8	(i) an evaluation of the reintegration
9	program's implementation by State Na-
10	tional Guard organizations;
11	(ii) an assessment of any unmet re-
12	source requirements;
13	(iii) an assessment of the reintegra-
14	tion program's inclusion of other Reserve
15	Component service members and the neces-
16	sity for further expansion to incorporate all
17	the Reserve Components; and
18	(iv) recommendations regarding closer
19	coordination between the Office of Re-
20	integration Programs and State National
21	Guard organizations.
22	The advisory board shall submit annual reports
23	to the Committees on Armed Services following
24	this initial report by the first week in March.

1 (4) Establishment of a center for excel-2 LENCE IN REINTEGRATION.—The Chief shall estab-3 lish a Center for Excellence in Reintegration. The Center shall collect and analyze "lessons learned" 5 and suggestions from State National Guard organi-6 zations with existing or developing reintegration programs. The Center shall also assist in developing 7 training aids and briefing materials and training 8 9 representatives from State National Guard organiza-10 tions.

- (5)STATE DEPLOYMENT CYCLE SUPPORT TEAMS.—The Office for Reintegration Programs shall employ 270 full-time employees to administer the Yellow Ribbon Reintegration Program at the State level. The Chief of the National Guard Bureau shall assign State Deployment Cycle Support Team members based on State need, geographical dispersion, and military population. The Office for Reintegration Programs is encouraged to employ wounded service members and returning combat veterans whenever possible. The primary function of team members should be—
- 23 (A) developing and managing the re-24 integration curriculum;

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1	(B) contracting and recruiting for nec-
2	essary service providers; and
3	(C) ensuring that providers' skills adapt to
4	the unique military nature of the reintegration
5	program.
6	(e) Program.—
7	(1) In General.—The Office for Reintegration
8	Programs shall analyze the demographics, placement
9	of State Family Assistance Centers (FAC), and
10	FAC resources before a mobilization alert is issued
11	to affected State National Guard organizations. The
12	Office of Reintegration Programs shall consult with
13	affected State National Guard organizations fol-
14	lowing the issuance of a mobilization alert and im-
15	plement the reintegration events in accordance with
16	the Reintegration Program phase model.
17	(2) Pre-deployment phase.—The Pre-De-
18	ployment Phase shall constitute the time from first
19	notification of mobilization until deployment of the
20	mobilized National Guard unit. Events and activities
21	shall focus on providing education and ensuring the
22	readiness of service members, families, and commu-
23	nities for the rigors of a combat deployment and
24	shall include the following:

(A) Service member readiness.

1	(B) Marriage counseling.
2	(C) Youth counseling.
3	(D) Family counseling.
4	(E) Single service member counseling.
5	(F) Information on resources available to
6	service members and families.
7	(G) Introduction to the Military OneSource
8	program.
9	(H) Department of Veterans Affairs re-
10	sources.
11	(I) Small business planning.
12	(J) Financial planning and education.
13	(3) Deployment phase.—
14	(A) In General.—The Deployment Phase
15	shall constitute the period from deployment of
16	the mobilized National Guard unit until the
17	unit arrives at a demobilization station inside
18	the continental United States. Events and serv-
19	ices provided shall focus on the challenges and
20	stress associated with separation and having a
21	service member in a combat zone. Events and
22	services include support activities listed in sub-
23	paragraph (B) and reintegration preparation
24	activities listed in subparagraph (C). Informa-
25	tion sessions should utilize State National

1	Guard resources in coordination with the Em-
2	ployer Support of Guard and Reserve Office,
3	Transition Assistance Advisors, and the State
4	Family Programs Director.
5	(B) Support activities.—
6	(i) Youth counseling.
7	(ii) Family counseling.
8	(iii) Community outreach.
9	(iv) Continued contact with spouses
10	and parents.
11	(v) Information on resources available
12	to family members, to include access to
13	Military OneSource and child care.
14	(vi) TRICARE and healthcare.
15	(vii) Military pay and allowances.
16	(C) Reintegration preparation activi-
17	TIES.—
18	(i) Family information ses-
19	sions.—Family information sessions
20	should prepare family members for the
21	homecoming of their service member and
22	to inform them on what they can do to
23	make this transition as easy as possible.
24	The sessions are designed to increase the
25	family member's knowledge of the re-

integration process and to provide resources to them as they go through the steps of reintegration. Information sessions should be offered at locations and times so as to accommodate as many family members as possible.

(ii) Community information sessions should educate community leaders, clergy, schools, employers, mental health professionals, and family readiness groups (FRG) about the challenges of reintegration, and what they can do to assist combat veterans and their families to successfully reintegrate back into the community. Information sessions should be offered at locations and times so as to accommodate as many participants as possible.

(4) Demobilization Phase.—

(A) In GENERAL.—The Demobilization Phase shall constitute the period from arrival of the National Guard unit at the demobilization station until its departure for home station. In the interest of returning service members as soon as possible to their home stations, re-

integration briefings during the Demobilization
Phase shall be minimized. State Deployment
Cycle Support Teams are encouraged, however,
to assist demobilizing service members in enrolling in the Department of Veterans Affairs system using form 1010EZ during the Demobilization Phase. State Deployment Cycle Support
Teams may provide other events from the Initial Reintegration Activity as determined by the
State National Guard organizations. Remaining
events shall be conducted during the Post-Deployment-Reconstitution Phase.

- (B) Initial reintegration activity.—
 The purpose of this reintegration program is to educate service members about the resources that are available to them and to connect service members to service providers who can assist them in overcoming the challenges of reintegration. The Initial Reintegration Activity should include, but is not limited to—
 - (i) informing service members of their veterans' benefits;
 - (ii) assisting with unemployment and enrollment in employment transition services;

1	(iii) a driver safety briefing given by
2	qualified law enforcement officials;
3	(iv) identification of high-risk service
4	members and establishment of plans for
5	follow-on care;
6	(v) identification of service members
7	requiring follow-on health care;
8	(vi) legal briefings and legal assist-
9	ance; and
10	(vii) an opportunity for sexual assault
11	victims to confidentially report such
12	crimes.
13	(5) Post-deployment-reconstitution
14	PHASE.—
15	(A) IN GENERAL.—The Post-Deployment-
16	Reconstitution Phase shall constitute the period
17	from arrival at home station until 180 days fol-
18	lowing demobilization. Activities and services
19	provided shall focus on reconnecting service
20	members with their families and communities
21	and providing resources and information nec-
22	essary for successful reintegration. Reintegra-
23	tion events shall begin with elements of the Ini-
24	tial Reintegration Activity program that were
25	not completed during the Demobilization Phase.

1 (B) 30-DAY, 60-DAY, AND 90-DAY RE-2 INTEGRATION ACTIVITIES.—The State National 3 Guard organizations shall hold reintegration ac-4 tivities at the 30-day, 60-day, and 90-day interval following demobilization. These activities 6 shall focus on reconnecting service members 7 and family members with the service providers 8 from Initial Reintegration Activity to ensure 9 service members and their families understand 10 what benefits they are entitled to and what re-11 sources are available to help them overcome the 12 challenges of reintegration. The Reintegration 13 Activities should also provide a forum for serv-14 ice members and families to address negative 15 behaviors related to combat stress and transi-16 tion. One of the Reintegration Activities shall 17 be for service members only to conduct a thor-18 ough Post-Deployment Health Re-Assessment 19 (PDHRA) of combat veterans and provide any 20 remaining medical or dental services. Activities, 21 events, and services provided at the 30-day, 60-22 day, and 90-day Reintegration Activities shall 23 include, but not be limited to—

1	(I) Battlemind Training II for
2	service members and their families.
3	(II) Prevention and Relationship
4	Enhancement Program (PREP) Mar-
5	riage Enrichment Workshop to focus
6	on assisting service members to recon-
7	nect with their spouses.
8	(III) Single service member chal-
9	lenges workshop.
10	(IV) Parenting workshop to as-
11	sist service members to reconnect with
12	their children.
13	(V) Local services station pro-
14	gram with representatives from legal,
15	TRICARE, Education Services, the
16	Department of Veterans Affairs, State
17	Veterans Centers, State Workforce of-
18	fices, chaplain's office, County Vet-
19	erans Service Officers, Military
20	OneSource, State tax officials, State
21	Youth Programs, and National Guard
22	unit administration offices.
23	(VI) Anger management work-
24	shop.
25	(VII) Substance abuse workshop.

1	(VIII) Gambling abuse workshop.
2	(IX) Law enforcement briefing.
3	(X) TRICARE and Military
4	OneSource representatives.
5	(XI) PDHRA with on-site sup-
6	port from Department of Veterans Af-
7	fairs Medical Centers, State veterans'
8	office representatives, and case man-
9	agers provided by the Department of
10	Defense.
11	(XII) Periodic Health Assess-
12	ment (PHA), if not provided during
13	the Demobilization Phase.
14	(XIII) Hearing audiogram, if not
15	provided during the Demobilization
16	Phase.
17	(XIV) Dental examination, if not
18	provided during the Demobilization
19	Phase.
20	(XV) Tuberculosis test.
21	(XVI) Reintegration program as-
22	sessment.
23	(XVII) Completion of any pend-
24	ing personnel or administrative ac-
25	tions.

	(ii) Service member pay.—Service
2	members shall receive appropriate pay for
3	days spent attending the Reintegration Ac-
1	tivities.

(C) Monthly individual reintegration Programs, in coordination with State National Guard organizations, shall offer a monthly reintegration program for individual service members released from active duty or formerly in a medical hold status. The program shall focus on the special needs of this service member subset and the Office for Reintegration Programs shall develop an appropriate program of services and information.

16 (f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—For the 17 purpose of carrying out this section, there are authorized 18 to be appropriated \$23,000,000 for subsection (d) and 19 such sums as may be necessary for subsection (e).

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
