Mr. Moore of Kansas (for himself, Mr. Moran of Kansas, Mr. Thorn-Berry, Mr. Boswell, Mr. Tiahrt, and Mrs. Boyda of Kansas) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Natural Resources

## A BILL

To provide for certain administrative and support services for the Dwight D. Eisenhower Memorial Commission, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER MEMORIAL COMMIS-
- 4 SION.
- 5 Section 8162 of the Department of Defense Appro-
- 6 priations Act, 2000 (Public Law 106–79; 113 Stat. 1274)
- 7 is amended—
- 8 (1) by striking subsection (j), and inserting the
- 9 following:

1	"(j) Powers of the Commission.—
2	"(1) In general.—
3	"(A) Powers.—The Commission may—
4	"(i) make such expenditures for serv-
5	ices and materials for the purpose of car-
6	rying out this section as the Commission
7	considers advisable from funds appro-
8	priated or received as gifts for that pur-
9	pose;
10	"(ii) solicit and accept contributions
11	to be used in carrying out this section or
12	to be used in connection with the construc-
13	tion or other expenses of the memorial;
14	"(iii) hold hearings and enter into
15	contracts;
16	"(iv) enter into contracts for special-
17	ized or professional services as necessary
18	to carry out this section; and
19	"(v) take such actions as are nec-
20	essary to carry out this section.
21	"(B) Specialized or professional
22	SERVICES.—Services under subparagraph
23	(A)(iv) may be—

- 1 "(i) obtained without regard to the 2 provisions of title 5, United States Code, 3 including section 3109 of that title; and
  - "(ii) may be paid without regard to the provisions of title 5, United States Code, including chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of that title;
  - "(2) GIFTS OF PROPERTY.—The Commission may accept, use, and dispose of gifts, bequests, or devises of services or property, both real and personal, for the purpose of aiding or facilitating the work of the Commission. Gifts, bequests, or devises of money and proceeds from the sales of other property received as gifts, bequests, or devises shall be deposited in the Treasury and shall be available for disbursement upon the order of the Chair. For purposes of Federal income, estate, and gift taxes, property accepted under this subsection shall be considered as a gift, bequest, or devise to the United States.
  - "(3) Federal cooperation.—To ensure the overall success of the efforts of the Commission, the Commission may call upon any Federal department or agency to assist in and give support to the Commission. The head of each Federal department or

1	agency shall furnish such information or assistance
2	requested by the Commission, as appropriate, unless
3	prohibited by law.
4	"(4) Powers of members and agents.—
5	"(A) IN GENERAL.—If authorized by the
6	Commission, any member or agent of the Com-
7	mission may take any action that the Commis-
8	sion is authorized to take under this section.
9	"(B) Architect.—The Commission may
10	appoint an architect as an agent of the Com-
11	mission to—
12	"(i) represent the Commission on var-
13	ious governmental source selection and
14	planning boards on the selection of the
15	firms that will design and construct the
16	memorial; and
17	"(ii) perform other duties as des-
18	ignated by the Chairperson of the Commis-
19	sion.
20	"(C) Treatment.—An authorized mem-
21	ber or agent of the Commission (including an
22	individual appointed under subparagraph (B))
23	providing services to the Commission shall be
24	considered an employee of the Federal Govern-
25	ment in the performance of those services for

1	the purposes of chapter 171 of title 28, United
2	States Code, relating to tort claims.
3	"(5) Travel.—Each member of the Commis-
4	sion shall be allowed travel expenses, including per
5	diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates authorized for
6	employees of agencies under subchapter I of chapter
7	57 of title 5, United States Code, while away from
8	their homes or regular places of business in the per-
9	formance of services for the Commission.";
10	(2) by redesignating subsection (o) as sub-
11	section (q); and
12	(3) by inserting after subsection (n) the fol-
13	lowing new subsection (o):
14	"(0) STAFF AND SUPPORT SERVICES.—
15	(1) Executive director.—There shall be an
16	Executive Director appointed by the Commission to
17	be paid at a rate not to exceed the maximum rate
18	of basic pay for level IV of the Executive Schedule.
19	"(2) Staff.—
20	"(A) IN GENERAL.—The staff of the Com-
21	mission may be appointed and terminated with-
22	out regard to the provisions of title 5, United
23	States Code, governing appointments in the
24	
	competitive service, and may be paid without

chapter III of chapter 53 of that title, relating
to classification and General Schedule pay
rates, except that an individual appointed under
this paragraph may not receive pay in excess of
the maximum rate of basic pay for GS-15 of
the General Schedule.

- "(B) Senior staff.—Notwithstanding subparagraph (A), not more than 3 staff employees of the Commission (in addition to the Executive Director) may be paid at a rate not to exceed the maximum rate of basic pay for level IV of the Executive Schedule.
- "(3) STAFF OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—Upon request by the Chairperson of the Commission, the Vice-Chairperson, or the Executive Director, the head of any Federal department or agency may detail, on a nonreimbursable basis, any of the personnel of the department or agency to the Commission to assist the Commission to carry out its duties under this section.
- "(4) FEDERAL SUPPORT.—The Commission shall obtain administrative and support services from the General Services Administration on a reimbursable basis. The Commission may use all contracts, schedules, and acquisition vehicles allowed to

1	external clients through the General Services Admin-
2	istration.
3	"(5) Cooperative agreements.—The Com-
4	mission may enter into cooperative agreements with
5	Federal agencies, State, local, tribal and inter-
6	national governments, and private interests and or-
7	ganizations which will further the goals and pur-
8	poses of this section.
9	"(6) Temporary, intermittent, and part-
10	TIME SERVICES.—
11	"(A) In General.—The Commission may
12	obtain temporary, intermittent, and part-time
13	services under section 3109 of title 5, United
14	States Code, at rates not to exceed the max-
15	imum annual rate of basic pay payable under
16	section 5376 of that title.
17	"(B) Non-applicability to certain
18	SERVICES.—This paragraph shall not apply to
19	services under subsection $(j)(1)(A)(iv)$ .
20	"(7) Volunteer services.—
21	"(A) In general.—Notwithstanding sec-
22	tion 1342 of title 31, United States Code, the
23	Commission may accept and utilize the services
24	of volunteers serving without compensation.

1	"(B) REIMBURSEMENT.—The Commission
2	may reimburse such volunteers for local travel
3	and office supplies, and for other travel ex-
4	penses, including per diem in lieu of subsist-
5	ence, as authorized by section 5703 of title 5,
6	United States Code.
7	"(C) Treatment.—A person providing
8	volunteer services to the Commission shall be
9	considered an employee of the Federal govern-
10	ment in the performance of those services for
11	the purposes of—
12	"(i) chapter 81 of title 5, United
13	States Code, relating to compensation for
14	work-related injuries;
15	"(ii) chapter 171 of title 28, United
16	States Code, relating to tort claims; and
17	"(iii) chapter 11 of title 18, United
18	States Code, relating to conflicts of inter-
19	est.
20	"(p) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
21	are authorized to be appropriated such sums as necessary
22	to carry out this section.".

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
