A BILL

- To authorize the presentation of flags at the funerals of civilian Federal employees engaged in the support of military operations who have died in combat zones in the course of their duties.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Civilian Service Rec-

5 ognition Act of 2007".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 Congress finds the following:

1	(1) Many Americans are unaware that there are
2	thousands of civilian Federal employees serving the
3	Nation in the dangerous theaters of war in both Iraq
4	and Afghanistan, and elsewhere, in the Global War
5	on Terror.
6	(2) These employees voluntarily risk their lives
7	to serve the Nation overseas and support the cause
8	of freedom.
9	(3) The patriotism of these employees does not
10	begin or end in a uniform, but flows from the shin-
11	ing example of many of the Nation's founding fa-
12	thers, who, while not serving in the military, sac-
13	rificed everything for the sake of liberty.
14	(4) In light of the new and unconventional war-
15	fare that characterizes the Global War on Terror, it
16	is no surprise that thousands of these employees en-
17	dure danger and injury, and tragically death, while
18	serving beside the Nation's troops.
19	(5) These brave employees serve the Nation
20	openly and clandestinely, contributing to the cause
21	of freedom and democracy in Iraq and Afghanistan
22	and preserving the security of the United States.
23	(6) The dedication and service of these employ-
24	ees exemplify the giving nature of the United States,

as well as the resolve of the Nation, to spread democracy, freedom, and peace throughout the world.
(7) These valiant employees, who have lived and
died beside the Nation's troops in war zones in the
support of freedom, should be honored with a presentation of a flag from a Nation grateful for their
service.

8 SEC. 3. FLAG CEREMONY FOR CIVILIAN FEDERAL EMPLOY9 EES WHO DIE IN COMBAT ZONES.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Subject to the requirements of
this section, the head of an executive agency shall furnish,
upon receipt of a request under subsection (b), a flag of
the United States to drape the casket of an individual
who—

(1) was an employee of the agency engaged in
the performance of one or more functions in support
of military operations;

(2) was located or stationed in a combat zone
while so engaged in the course of the individual's
employment; and

(3) died while physically present in the combat
zone during the period in which the individual was
so engaged.

(b) REQUEST FOR FLAGS.—The head of an executive
 agency shall furnish a flag for a deceased individual under
 subsection (a) upon the request of—

4 (1) the deceased individual's next of kin; or

5 (2) a close friend or associate of the deceased
6 individual if no request is made for the flag by the
7 next of kin.

8 (c) PRESENTATION OF FLAG.—After the burial of an 9 individual described in subsection (a), the head of an exec-10 utive agency shall present a flag furnished under sub-11 section (a) to an individual making a request under sub-12 section (b).

(d) MANNER OF CEREMONY.—A flag shall be furnished and presented under this section in the same manner as a flag furnished and presented on behalf of a member of the Armed Services dying in active duty.

(e) LIMITATION ON FLAGS PROVIDED.—If a flag furnished under subsection (a) is given to an individual described in subsection (b)(2), no flag shall be given to any
other person on account of the death of such individual.

(f) CLASSIFIED INFORMATION.—The head of an executive agency may disclose information necessary to show
that the deceased individual is an individual described in
subsection (a) to the extent that such information is not

classified and to the extent that such disclosure does not
 endanger the national security of the United States.

3 SEC. 4. EMPLOYEE NOTIFICATION OF FLAG CEREMONY 4 BENEFIT.

5 The head of an executive agency shall notify employ-6 ees of the agency who are located or stationed in a combat 7 zone for purposes of the performance of one or more func-8 tions in support of military operations of the flag cere-9 mony benefit provided for under section 3.

10 SEC. 5. DEFINITIONS.

11 In this Act, the following definitions apply:

(1) COMBAT ZONE.—The term "combat zone"
means an area in which a member of the uniformed
service on duty in such area may qualify for special
pay under section 310 of title 37, United States
Code.

17 (2) EMPLOYEE.—The term "employee" has the
18 meaning given that term in section 2105 of title 5,
19 United States Code, and includes employees of and
20 donors of volunteer services to temporary organiza21 tions under section 3161 of such title.

22 (3) EXECUTIVE AGENCY.—The term "executive
23 agency" has the meaning given the term "Executive

- 1 agency" in section 501 of title 5, United States
- 2 Code.
