A BILL

To amend the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act to authorize the President to dispose of excess materials, supplies, and equipment acquired pursuant to that Act to assist victims of major disasters, emergencies, and incidents, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. DISPOSAL OF EXCESS MATERIALS, SUPPLIES,**
2 **AND EQUIPMENT.**

3 Title III of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief
4 and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 5141 et seq.)
5 is amended by adding at the end the following:

6 **“SEC. 327. DISPOSAL OF EXCESS MATERIALS, SUPPLIES,**
7 **AND EQUIPMENT.**

8 “Notwithstanding any other provision of law, if the
9 President determines that materials, supplies, or equip-
10 ment acquired by the President pursuant to title IV or
11 V for response or recovery efforts in connection with a
12 major disaster or emergency are in excess of the amount
13 needed for those efforts, the President may transfer the
14 excess materials, supplies, or equipment, by sale, donation,
15 or otherwise, directly to a State or other governmental en-
16 tity or to a voluntary organization for the purpose of as-
17 sisting disaster victims in other major disasters and emer-
18 gencies and in incidents that do not result in a declaration
19 of a major disaster or emergency.”.

20 **SEC. 2. DISPOSAL OF TEMPORARY HOUSING UNITS.**

21 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:

22 (1) The Federal Emergency Management Agen-
23 cy has a large number of temporary housing units
24 that are underutilized.

25 (2) These units could be helpful to States in
26 their efforts to assist disaster victims in incidents

1 that do not result in a Federal declaration of a
2 major disaster or emergency.

3 (b) DISPOSAL.—Section 408(d)(2)(B)(ii) of the Rob-
4 ert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance
5 Act (42 U.S.C. 5174(d)(2)(B)(ii)) is amended by striking
6 “victims in major disasters and emergencies” and insert-
7 ing “victims in major disasters and emergencies and in
8 incidents that do not result in a declaration of a major
9 disaster or emergency”.

10 (c) SPECIAL RULE.—In the case of an unused tem-
11 porary housing unit described in section 689k of the Post-
12 Katrina Emergency Management Reform Act of 2006
13 (Public Law 109–295; 120 Stat. 1456), the President may
14 dispose of the unit in accordance with the requirements
15 of that section or in accordance with section
16 408(d)(2)(B)(ii) of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief
17 and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C.
18 5174(d)(2)(B)(ii)), as amended by this section.

19 **SEC. 3. INDIVIDUAL ASSISTANCE FACTORS.**

20 In order to provide more objective criteria for evalu-
21 ating the need for assistance to individuals and to speed
22 a declaration of a major disaster or emergency under the
23 Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assist-
24 ance Act (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.), not later than 1 year
25 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator

1 of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, in co-
2 operation with representatives of State and local emer-
3 gency management associations, shall review, update, and
4 revise through rulemaking the factors considered under
5 section 206.48 of title 44, Code of Federal Regulations,
6 to measure the severity, magnitude, and impact of a dis-
7 aster.

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
