AN ACT

To reauthorize the United States Fire Administration, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "United States Fire3 Administration Reauthorization Act of 2008".

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

5 Congress finds the following:

6 (1) The loss of life due to fire has dropped sig-7 nificantly over the last 25 years in the United 8 States. However, the United States still has one of 9 the highest fire death rates in the industrialized 10 world. For 2006, the National Fire Protection Asso-11 ciation reported 3,245 civilian fire deaths, 17,925 ci-12 vilian fire injuries, and \$11,307,000,000 in direct 13 losses due to fire.

14 (2) Every year, over 100 firefighters die in the
15 line of duty. The United States Fire Administration
16 should continue its leadership to help local fire agen17 cies dramatically reduce these fatalities.

18 (3) Members of the fire service community
19 should continue to work together to further the pro20 motion of national voluntary consensus standards
21 that increase firefighter safety.

(4) The United States Fire Administration provides crucial support to the Nation's 30,300 fire departments through training, data collection, fire
awareness and education, and other activities for im-

proving fire prevention, control, and suppression
 technologies.

(5) The collection of data on fire and other 3 4 emergency incidents is a vital tool both for policy 5 makers and emergency responders to identify and 6 develop responses to emerging hazards. Improving 7 the United States Fire Administration's data collec-8 tion capabilities is essential for accurately tracking 9 and responding to the magnitude and nature of the 10 Nation's fire problem.

(6) The research and development performed by
the Federal Government and non-government organizations on fire technologies, techniques, and tools
advance the capabilities of the Nation's fire service
to prevent and suppress fires.

16 (7) The United States Fire Administration is
17 one of the strongest voices representing the Nation's
18 fire service within the Federal Government, and, as
19 such, it should have a prominent place within the
20 Federal Government.

21 SEC. 3. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS FOR UNITED 22 STATES FIRE ADMINISTRATION.

19	(b) TRIENNIAL REPORTS.—Section 7 of such Act (15
20	U.S.C. 2206) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
21	lowing new subsection:
22	"(m) TRIENNIAL REPORT.—In the first annual re-
23	port filed pursuant to section 16 for which the deadline
24	for filing is after the expiration of the 18-month period
25	that begins on the date of the enactment of the United

States Fire Administration Reauthorization Act of 2008,
 and in every third annual report thereafter, the Adminis trator shall include information about changes made to the
 Academy curriculum, including—

5 "(1) the basis for such changes, including a re6 view of the incorporation of lessons learned by emer7 gency response personnel after significant emergency
8 events and emergency preparedness exercises per9 formed under the National Exercise Program; and

10 "(2) the desired training outcome of all such11 changes.".

12 (c) AUTHORIZING THE ADMINISTRATOR TO ENTER 13 INTO CONTRACTS TO PROVIDE ON-SITE TRAINING 14 THROUGH CERTAIN ACCREDITED ORGANIZATIONS.—Sec-15 tion 7(f) of such Act (15 U.S.C. 2206(f)) is amended to 16 read as follows:

17 "(f) Assistance.—

18 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator is au19 thorized to provide assistance to State and local fire
20 service training programs through grants, contracts,
21 or otherwise.

22 "(2) AUTHORIZATION TO ENTER INTO CON23 TRACTS TO PROVIDE ON-SITE TRAINING THROUGH
24 CERTAIN ACCREDITED ORGANIZATIONS.—

"(A) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator is 1 2 authorized to enter into a contract with one or 3 more nationally recognized organizations that 4 have established on-site training programs that 5 prepare fire service personnel to meet national 6 voluntary consensus standards for fire service 7 personnel and that facilitate the delivery of the 8 education and training programs outlined in 9 subsection (d)(1) directly to fire service per-10 sonnel. "(B) RESTRICTIONS.—The Administrator 11 12 shall not enter into a contract with such organi-13 zation unless such organization— 14 "(i) provides training that leads to 15 certification by a program accredited by a 16 nationally recognized accreditation organi-17 zation; or 18 "(ii) at the time the Administrator en-19 ters into the contract, provides training 20 under such a program under a cooperative 21 agreement with a Federal agency. 22 "(3) RESTRICTION ON USE OF FUNDS.—The 23 amounts expended by the Administrator to carry out this subsection in any fiscal year shall not exceed 4 24 25 percent of the amount authorized to be appropriated in such fiscal year pursuant to section 17 of this
 Act.".

3 (d) Incident Command Training Course for FIRES AT PORTS REQUIRED.—Not later than 2 years 4 5 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Administrator of the United States Fire Administration, in con-6 7 sultation with the Superintendent of the National Acad-8 emy for Fire Prevention and Control, shall consolidate and 9 integrate into the current Academy curriculum a course 10 on incident command training for fire service personnel for fighting fires at United States ports and in marine 11 12 environments, including fires on the water and aboard ves-13 sels. Such course shall not relate to border and port secu-14 rity.

15 SEC. 5. NATIONAL FIRE INCIDENT REPORTING SYSTEM UP16 GRADES.

(a) INCIDENT REPORTING SYSTEM DATABASE.—Sec18 tion 9 of the Federal Fire Prevention and Control Act of
19 1974 (15 U.S.C. 2208) is amended by adding at the end
20 the following new subsection:

"(d) NATIONAL FIRE INCIDENT REPORTING SYSTEM
UPDATE.—Of the amounts made available pursuant to
subparagraphs (E), (F), and (G) of section 17(g)(1), the
Administrator shall use no more than an aggregate
amount of \$5,000,000 during the 3-year period consisting

of fiscal years 2009, 2010, and 2011 to carry out activities
 necessary to update the National Fire Incident Reporting
 system to an Internet-based, real-time incident reporting
 database, including capital investment, contractor engage ment, and user education.".

6 (b) TECHNICAL CORRECTION.—Section 9(b)(2) of
7 such Act (15 U.S.C. 2208(b)(2)) is amended by striking
8 "assist State," and inserting "assist Federal, State,".

9 SEC. 6. FIRE TECHNOLOGY ASSISTANCE AND DISSEMINA-10 TION.

(a) ASSISTANCE TO FIRE SERVICES FOR FIRE PREVENTION AND CONTROL IN WILDLAND-URBAN INTERFACE.—Section 8(d) of the Federal Fire Prevention and
Control Act of 1974 (15 U.S.C. 2207(d)) is amended—
(1) by striking "RURAL ASSISTANCE" in the
heading and inserting "RURAL AND WILDLANDURBAN INTERFACE ASSISTANCE";

18 (2) by striking "The Administrator" and insert19 ing "(1) The Administrator"; and

20 (3) by adding at the end the following new21 paragraph:

"(2) The Administrator is authorized to assist the
Nation's fire services, directly or through contracts,
grants, or other forms of assistance, for activities and

equipment to improve fire prevention and control in the
 wildland-urban interface.".

3 (b) DISSEMINATION.—Section 8 of such Act (15
4 U.S.C. 2207) is amended by adding at the end the fol5 lowing new subsection:

6 "(h) DISSEMINATION.—Beginning 1 year after the 7 date of the enactment of the United States Fire Adminis-8 tration Reauthorization Act of 2008, the Administrator, 9 in collaboration with the relevant departments and agen-10 cies of the Federal Government, shall make available to the public information regarding United States Fire Ad-11 12 ministration funded activities to advance new knowledge 13 and best practices in firefighting, through a regularly updated Internet database.". 14

15 SEC. 7. ENCOURAGING ADOPTION OF STANDARDS FOR 16 FIREFIGHTER HEALTH AND SAFETY.

17 The Federal Fire Prevention and Control Act of 1974
18 (15 U.S.C. 2201 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end
19 the following new sections:

20 "SEC. 37. ENCOURAGING ADOPTION OF STANDARDS FOR
21 FIREFIGHTER HEALTH AND SAFETY.

22 "The Administrator shall promote adoption by fire 23 services of national voluntary consensus standards for fire-24 fighter health and safety, including such standards for 25 firefighter operations, training, staffing, and fitness, by educating fire services about such standards, encouraging
 the adoption at all levels of government of such standards,
 and making recommendations on other ways in which the
 Federal Government can promote the adoption of such
 standards by fire services.

6 "SEC. 38. TRAINING AGENCIES ON IMPORTANCE OF CLEAR7 ING BIOMASS IN WILDLAND AREAS TO PRO8 MOTE FIREFIGHTER SAFETY.

9 "In collaboration with the relevant departments and 10 agencies of the Federal Government, the Administrator 11 shall develop and provide information and training to rel-12 evant departments and agencies of the Federal Govern-13 ment on the importance of clearing biomass in wildland 14 areas of Federal lands to promote the safety of fire-15 fighters.".

16 SEC. 8. COORDINATION REGARDING FIRE SERVICE-BASED

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES.

18 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 21(e) of the Federal Fire
19 Prevention and Control Act of 1974 (15 U.S.C. 2218(e))
20 is amended to read as follows:

21 "(e) Coordination.—

"(1) IN GENERAL.—To the extent practicable,
the Administrator shall utilize existing programs,
data, information, and facilities already available in
other Federal Government departments and agencies

and, where appropriate, existing research organiza tions, centers, and universities.

3 "(2) Coordination of fire prevention and 4 CONTROL PROGRAMS.—The Administrator shall provide liaison at an appropriate organizational level to 5 6 assure coordination of the Administrator's activities 7 with State and local government agencies, depart-8 ments, bureaus, or offices concerned with any matter 9 related to programs of fire prevention and control 10 with private and other Federal organizations and of-11 fices so concerned.

12 "(3) COORDINATION OF FIRE SERVICE-BASED 13 EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES PROGRAMS.—The 14 Administrator shall provide liaison at an appropriate 15 organizational level to assure coordination of the Administrator's activities with State and local govern-16 17 ment agencies, departments, bureaus, or offices con-18 cerned with programs related to emergency medical 19 services provided by fire service-based systems with 20 private and other Federal organizations and offices 21 so concerned.".

(b) FIRE SERVICE-BASED EMERGENCY MEDICAL
SERVICES BEST PRACTICES.—Section 8(c) of such Act
(15 U.S.C. 2207(c)) is amended—

(1) by redesignating paragraphs (2) through
 (4) as paragraphs (3) through (5), respectively; and
 (2) by inserting after paragraph (1) the fol lowing new paragraph:

5 "(2) The Administrator is authorized to conduct, directly or through contracts or grants, studies of the oper-6 7 ations and management aspects of fire service-based emer-8 gency medical services and coordination between emer-9 gency medical services and fire services. Such studies may 10 include the optimum protocols for on-scene care, the allo-11 cation of resources, and the training requirements for fire 12 service-based emergency medical services.".

13 SEC. 9. DEFINITIONS.

Section 4 of the Federal Fire Prevention and Control
Act of 1974 (15 U.S.C. 2203) is amended—

12	SEC. 10. SUPPORTING THE ADOPTION OF FIRE SPRIN-
13	KLERS.

17	programs to raise awareness of the importance of install-
18	ing fire sprinklers in residential buildings.
