# A BILL

To provide for a rail worker emergency training program.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

# **3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the "Rail Worker Emer-5 gency Training Act of 2007".

#### 6 SEC. 2. RAIL WORKER EMERGENCY TRAINING GRANTS.

7 (a) RAIL WORKER EMERGENCY TRAINING
8 GRANTS.—The Secretary of Homeland Security, in coordi9 nation with the Secretary of Transportation, is authorized

to make grants to railroad carriers for costs incurred in
 compliance with section 3.

3 (b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There 4 are authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary of 5 Homeland Security \$100,000,000 to carry out the pur-6 poses of this Act. Amounts appropriated pursuant to this 7 subsection shall remain available until expended.

## 8 SEC. 3. RAIL WORKER EMERGENCY TRAINING PROGRAM.

9 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 90 days after the 10 date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of Transpor-11 12 tation and appropriate rail entities, shall issue detailed 13 guidelines for a rail worker emergency training program designed to enhance rail worker training in preparation 14 15 for and response to potential or actual terrorist attacks, natural disasters, and other emergencies. 16

(b) PROGRAM ELEMENTS.—The guidelines developed
under subsection (a) shall require such a program to include, at a minimum, elements that comprehensively address the following:

- 21 (1) Critical infrastructure and equipment secu-22 rity inspection.
- 23 (2) Hazardous material storage, transport, and24 monitoring.

(3) Evacuation procedures in the event of fire, explosion, natural disaster, and other emergencies.

3 (4) Unauthorized rail yard access and rail yard4 security.

5 (5) Procedure for reporting suspicious activity,
6 critical infrastructure, rail yard, and equipment se7 curity breaches, hazardous material storage or trans8 port safety breaches, and other security or safety
9 breaches.

10 (6) Notification of law enforcement, emergency
11 response, and other appropriate officials in the event
12 of a terrorist attack, natural disaster, hazardous ma13 terial explosion, and other emergencies.

14 (7) Rail worker notification and training on
15 railroad security plans, including a railroad carrier's
16 threat level identification system, employee notifica17 tion when such levels change, employee roles and re18 sponsibilities regarding the security plan, and lines
19 of communication and coordination in the event of
20 an emergency.

21 (8) Passenger communication and coordination22 in the event of an emergency.

23 (9) Live situational training exercises regarding
24 various emergency scenarios, including terrorist at-

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1 tacks, natural disasters, and hazardous material ex-2 plosions. 3 (10) Protective equipment and device use. 4 (11) Locomotive cab securement. (12) Background, skills, and "fitness for duty" 5 6 checks for railroad contractors, subcontractors, and 7 their employees equal to those applicable to railroad 8 employees. (13) Distress codes for use by train crews, 9 10 bridge tenders, and others as the Secretary of 11 Homeland Security considers appropriate. 12 (14) Appropriate responses to defend oneself. 13 (15) Any other subject the Secretary of Home-14 land Security considers appropriate. 15 (c) RAILROAD CARRIER PROGRAMS.—Not later than 90 days after the Secretary of Homeland Security issues 16 17 guidelines under subsection (a) in final form, each railroad 18 carrier shall develop a rail worker emergency training program in accordance with those guidelines and submit it 19 20 to the Secretary of Homeland Security for approval. Not 21 later than 60 days after receiving a railroad carrier's pro-22 gram under this subsection, the Secretary shall review the 23 program and approve it or require the railroad carrier to

24 make any revisions the Secretary considers necessary for25 the program to meet the guideline requirements.

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(d) TRAINING.—Not later than 1 year after the Sec retary of Homeland Security approves the training pro gram developed by a railroad carrier under this section,
 the railroad carrier shall complete the training of all rail
 workers in accordance with that program.

6 (e) UPDATES.—The Secretary of Homeland Security 7 shall update the training guidelines issued under sub-8 section (a) from time to time to reflect new or different security threats, and shall require railroad carriers to re-9 10 vise their programs accordingly and provide additional 11 training to their rail workers. Not later than 60 days after the Secretary of Homeland Security notifies railroad car-12 13 riers to revise their programs to reflect updated guidelines issued by the Secretary under this section, each railroad 14 15 carrier shall make all required revisions and submit their revised emergency training program to the Secretary of 16 17 Homeland Security for approval. Not later than 60 days after receiving a railroad carrier's revised program under 18 19 this subsection, the Secretary shall review the program 20and approve it or require the railroad carrier to make any 21 revisions the Secretary considers necessary for the pro-22 gram to meet updated guideline requirements. Not later 23 than 180 days after the Secretary approves the revised 24 training program developed by a railroad carrier under 25 this subsection, the railroad carrier shall complete the

training of all rail workers in accordance with the Sec retary's updated guidelines.

## 3 SEC. 4. NONCOMPLIANCE.

The Secretary of Homeland Security may issue a letter of noncompliance to any rail carrier that has failed to comply with the obligations imposed by this Act. Any such letters issued shall be transmitted to Congress and published in the Federal Register.

# 9 SEC. 5. DEFINITIONS.

10 For purposes of this Act:

11 (1) APPROPRIATE RAIL ENTITIES.—The term "appropriate rail entities" means freight and pas-12 13 senger railroad carriers, nonprofit employee organi-14 zations representing rail workers, nonprofit employee 15 organizations representing emergency responders, 16 owners or lessors of rail cars used to transport haz-17 ardous materials, shippers of hazardous materials, 18 manufacturers of rail tank cars, State Departments 19 of Transportation, public safety officials, and other 20 relevant parties.

(2) RAILROAD.—The term "railroad" has the
meaning given that term in section 20102(1) of title
49, United States Code.

1	(3) RAILROAD CARRIER.—The term "railroad
2	carrier" has the meaning given that term in section
3	20102(2) of title 49, United States Code.
4	(4) RAIL WORKER.—The term "rail worker" in-
5	cludes any employee of a railroad carrier, or of a
6	railroad carrier contractor or subcontractor, who—
7	(A) inspects, tests, maintains, or repairs
8	brakes, other mechanical systems or compo-
9	nents, or safety appliances on railroad cars or
10	locomotives;
11	(B) is engaged in the operation of any
12	train, including an employee that performs the
13	duties of a hostler;
14	(C) dispatches, reports, transmits, receives,
15	or delivers orders pertaining to train move-
16	ments via telegraph, telephone, radio, or any
17	other electrical or mechanical device;
18	(D) installs, repairs, tests, or maintains
19	signal systems;
20	(E) inspects, constructs, or repairs railroad
21	track, bridges, roadway, electrical traction sys-
22	tems, roadway facilities, or roadway mainte-
23	nance machinery; or

(F) is otherwise considered appropriate by
 the Secretary of Transportation.

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
