A BILL

To authorize funds to the Local Initiatives Support Corporation to carry out its Community Safety Initiative.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Community Safety Ini-
5 tiative Act of 2008”.

6 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS.**

7 Congress finds the following:

8 (1) The Local Initiatives Support Corporation
9 (in this section referred to as the “LISC”) is a na-

1 tional community development support organization
2 which provides capital, technical expertise, training,
3 and information to help community-based organiza-
4 tions transform distressed neighborhoods into
5 healthy and sustainable places to live, do business,
6 work, and raise families. Since 1994, LISC's Com-
7 munity Safety Initiative has promoted partnerships
8 between community developers and law enforcement
9 agencies in low-income communities to reduce crime,
10 encourage economic revitalization, and respond to
11 the challenges faced by people returning home upon
12 release from jail or prison.

13 (2) Community Safety Initiative activities spe-
14 cifically accomplish the following:

15 (A) Address crime and disorder, including
16 drug and gang activity involving youth.

17 (B) Spur economic investment.

18 (C) Build trust between communities and
19 police.

20 (D) Respond to prisoner reentry challenges
21 related to housing, employment, social services,
22 and systems coordination.

23 (E) Foster national knowledge-sharing be-
24 tween law enforcement agencies and community

1 organizations about best-practice crime preven-
2 tion strategies.

3 (3) The Community Safety Initiative improves
4 safety and quality of life in more than 20 low-income
5 communities across the country each year, resulting
6 in measurable reductions in crime, better commu-
7 nity-police relations, quality affordable housing in
8 place of problem properties, viable businesses in pre-
9 viously blighted commercial corridors, effective pris-
10 oner reentry programs, and more strategic and effi-
11 cient use of public- and private-sector resources.

12 (4) The Community Safety Initiative program
13 has effectively utilized Federal funds since fiscal
14 year 1999.

15 (5) The Community Safety Initiative has a
16 long-standing partnership with the United States
17 Department of Justice Community Capacity Devel-
18 opment Office and has been endorsed by police
19 chiefs and community development leaders across
20 the country.

21 **SEC. 3. GRANT PROGRAM FOR EXPANDING THE COMMU-**
22 **NITY SAFETY INITIATIVE.**

23 In each of fiscal years 2009 through 2014, the Assist-
24 ant Attorney General for the Office of Justice Programs
25 of the Department of Justice may make grants to the

1 Local Initiatives Support Corporation to carry out its
2 Community Safety Initiative.

3 **SEC. 4. ANNUAL REPORT.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Local Initiatives Support
5 Corporation shall, in each of fiscal years 2009 through
6 2014, submit a report to the Assistant Attorney General.

7 (b) REQUIRED CONTENT.—Each report required to
8 be submitted under subsection (a) shall include a detailed
9 statement—

10 (1) regarding the progress made by the Com-
11 munity Safety Initiative in using Federal funds to
12 reduce crime, encourage economic revitalization, im-
13 prove community-police relations, respond to the
14 challenges faced by people returning home upon re-
15 lease from jail or prison, and promoting community
16 safety knowledge-sharing in low-income and minority
17 communities; and

18 (2) of the activities for which the appropriated
19 funds were spent by the Community Safety Initia-
20 tive.

21 **SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.**

22 There are authorized to be appropriated to carry out
23 this Act \$2,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2009 through
24 2014.

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
