A BILL

To approve the United States-India Agreement for Cooperation
on Peaceful Uses of Nuclear Energy, and for other
purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE AND TABLE OF CONTENTS.**

4 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
5 “United States-India Nuclear Cooperation Approval and
6 Nonproliferation Enhancement Act”.

3 **SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.**

4 In this Act:

5 (1) AGREEMENT.—The term “United States-
 6 India Agreement for Cooperation on Peaceful Uses
 7 of Nuclear Energy” or “Agreement” means the
 8 Agreement for Cooperation Between the Government
 9 of the United States of America and the Govern-
 10 ment of India Concerning Peaceful Uses of Nuclear
 11 Energy that was transmitted to Congress by the
 12 President on September 10, 2008.

13 (2) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMIT-
 14 TEES.—The term “appropriate congressional com-
 15 mittees” means the Committee on Foreign Affairs of

1 the House of Representatives and the Committee on
2 Foreign Relations of the Senate.

3 **TITLE I—APPROVAL OF UNITED**
4 **STATES-INDIA AGREEMENT**
5 **FOR COOPERATION ON**
6 **PEACEFUL USES OF NUCLEAR**
7 **ENERGY**

8 **SEC. 101. APPROVAL OF AGREEMENT.**

9 (a) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding the provisions
10 for congressional consideration and approval of a proposed
11 agreement for cooperation in section 123 b. and d. of the
12 Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2153 (b) and (d)),
13 Congress hereby approves the United States-India Agree-
14 ment for Cooperation on Peaceful Uses of Nuclear En-
15 ergy, subject to subsection (b).

16 (b) APPLICABILITY OF ATOMIC ENERGY ACT OF
17 1954, HYDE ACT, AND OTHER PROVISIONS OF LAW.—
18 The Agreement shall be subject to the provisions of the
19 Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2011 et seq.), the
20 Henry J. Hyde United States-India Peaceful Atomic En-
21 ergy Cooperation Act of 2006 (22 U.S.C. 8001 et. seq;
22 Public Law 109–401), and any other applicable United
23 States law as if the Agreement had been approved pursu-
24 ant to the provisions for congressional consideration and

1 approval of a proposed agreement for cooperation in sec-
2 tion 123 b. and d. of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954.

3 (c) SUNSET OF EXEMPTION AUTHORITY UNDER
4 HYDE ACT.—Section 104(f) of the Henry J. Hyde United
5 States-India Peaceful Atomic Energy Cooperation Act of
6 2006 (22 U.S.C. 8003(f)) is amended by striking “the en-
7 actment of” and all that follows through “agreement” and
8 inserting “the date of the enactment of the United States-
9 India Nuclear Cooperation Approval and Nonproliferation
10 Enhancement Act”.

11 **SEC. 102. DECLARATIONS OF POLICY; CERTIFICATION RE-**
12 **QUIREMENT; RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.**

13 (a) DECLARATIONS OF POLICY RELATING TO MEAN-
14 ING AND LEGAL EFFECT OF AGREEMENT.—Congress de-
15 clares that it is the understanding of the United States
16 that the provisions of the United States-India Agreement
17 for Cooperation on Peaceful Uses of Nuclear Energy have
18 the meanings conveyed in the authoritative representa-
19 tions provided by the President and his representatives to
20 the Congress and its committees prior to September 20,
21 2008, regarding the meaning and legal effect of the Agree-
22 ment.

23 (b) DECLARATIONS OF POLICY RELATING TO TRANS-
24 FER OF NUCLEAR EQUIPMENT, MATERIALS, AND TECH-

1 NOLOGY TO INDIA.—Congress makes the following dec-
2 larations of policy:

3 (1) Pursuant to section 103(a)(6) of the Henry
4 J. Hyde United States-India Peaceful Atomic En-
5 ergy Cooperation Act of 2006 (22 U.S.C.
6 8002(a)(6)), in the event that nuclear transfers to
7 India are suspended or terminated pursuant to title
8 I of such Act (22 U.S.C. 8001 et seq.), the Atomic
9 Energy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2011 et seq.), or
10 any other United States law, it is the policy of the
11 United States to seek to prevent the transfer to
12 India of nuclear equipment, materials, or technology
13 from other participating governments in the Nuclear
14 Suppliers Group (NSG) or from any other source.

15 (2) Pursuant to section 103(b)(10) of the
16 Henry J. Hyde United States-India Peaceful Atomic
17 Energy Cooperation Act of 2006 (22 U.S.C.
18 8002(b)(10)), any nuclear power reactor fuel reserve
19 provided to the Government of India for use in safe-
20 guarded civilian nuclear facilities should be commen-
21 surate with reasonable reactor operating require-
22 ments.

23 (c) CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENT.—Before ex-
24 changing diplomatic notes pursuant to Article 16(1) of the
25 Agreement, the President shall certify to Congress that

1 entry into force and implementation of the Agreement
2 pursuant to its terms is consistent with the obligation of
3 the United States under the Treaty on the Non-Prolifera-
4 tion of Nuclear Weapons, done at Washington, London,
5 and Moscow July 1, 1968, and entered into force March
6 5, 1970 (commonly known as the “Nuclear Non-Prolifera-
7 tion Treaty”), not in any way to assist, encourage, or in-
8 duce India to manufacture or otherwise acquire nuclear
9 weapons or other nuclear explosive devices.

10 (d) **RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.**—Nothing in the
11 Agreement shall be construed to supersede the legal re-
12 quirements of the Henry J. Hyde United States-India
13 Peaceful Atomic Energy Cooperation Act of 2006 or the
14 Atomic Energy Act of 1954.

15 **SEC. 103. ADDITIONAL PROTOCOL BETWEEN INDIA AND**
16 **THE IAEA.**

17 Congress urges the Government of India to sign and
18 adhere to an Additional Protocol with the International
19 Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), consistent with IAEA
20 principles, practices, and policies, at the earliest possible
21 date.

22 **SEC. 104. IMPLEMENTATION OF SAFEGUARDS AGREEMENT**
23 **BETWEEN INDIA AND THE IAEA.**

24 Licenses may be issued by the Nuclear Regulatory
25 Commission for transfers pursuant to the Agreement only

1 after the President determines and certifies to Congress
2 that—

3 (1) the Agreement Between the Government of
4 India and the International Atomic Energy Agency
5 for the Application of Safeguards to Civilian Nuclear
6 Facilities, as approved by the Board of Governors of
7 the International Atomic Energy Agency on August
8 1, 2008 (the “Safeguards Agreement”), has entered
9 into force; and

10 (2) the Government of India has filed a declara-
11 tion of facilities pursuant to paragraph 13 of the
12 Safeguards Agreement that is not materially incon-
13 sistent with the plan described in India’s Separation
14 Plan tabled in Parliament on May 11, 2006, taking
15 into account the later initiation of safeguards than
16 was anticipated in the Separation Plan.

17 **SEC. 105. MODIFIED REPORTING TO CONGRESS.**

18 (a) INFORMATION ON NUCLEAR ACTIVITIES OF
19 INDIA.—Subsection (g)(1) of section 104 of the Henry J.
20 Hyde United States-India Peaceful Atomic Energy Co-
21 operation Act of 2006 (22 U.S.C. 8003) is amended—

22 (1) by redesignating subparagraphs (B), (C),
23 and (D) as subparagraphs (C), (D), and (E), respec-
24 tively; and

1 (2) by inserting after subparagraph (A) the fol-
2 lowing new subparagraph:

3 “(B) any material inconsistencies between
4 the content or timeliness of notifications by the
5 Government of India pursuant to paragraph
6 14(a) of the Safeguards Agreement and the fa-
7 cilities and schedule described in paragraph
8 (14) of the separation plan presented in the na-
9 tional parliament of India on May 11, 2006,
10 taking into account the later initiation of safe-
11 guards than was anticipated in the Separation
12 Plan;”.

13 (b) IMPLEMENTATION AND COMPLIANCE REPORT.—
14 Subsection (g)(2) of such section is amended—

15 (1) in subparagraph (K)(iv), by striking “and”
16 at the end;

17 (2) in subparagraph (L), by striking the period
18 at the end and inserting “; and”; and

19 (3) by adding at the end the following new sub-
20 paragraph:

21 “(M) with respect to the United States-
22 India Agreement for Cooperation on Peaceful
23 Uses of Nuclear Energy (hereinafter in this
24 subparagraph referred to as the ‘Agreement’)
25 approved under section 101(a) of the United

1 States-India Nuclear Cooperation Approval and
2 Nonproliferation Enhancement Act—

3 “(i) a listing of—

4 “(I) all provision of sensitive nu-
5 clear technology to India, and other
6 such information as may be so des-
7 ignated by the United States or India
8 under Article 1(Q); and

9 “(II) all facilities in India noti-
10 fied pursuant to Article 7(1) of the
11 Agreement;

12 “(ii) a description of—

13 “(I) any agreed safeguards or
14 any other form of verification for by-
15 product material decided by mutual
16 agreement pursuant to the terms of
17 Article 1(A) of the Agreement;

18 “(II) research and development
19 undertaken in such areas as may be
20 agreed between the United States and
21 India as detailed in Article 2(2)(a.) of
22 the Agreement;

23 “(III) the civil nuclear coopera-
24 tion activities undertaken under Arti-
25 cle 2(2)(d.) of the Agreement;

1 “(IV) any United States efforts
2 to help India develop a strategic re-
3 serve of nuclear fuel as called for in
4 Article 2(2)(e.) of the Agreement;

5 “(V) any United States efforts to
6 fulfill political commitments made in
7 Article 5(6) of the Agreement;

8 “(VI) any negotiations that have
9 occurred or are ongoing under Article
10 6(iii.) of the Agreement; and

11 “(VII) any transfers beyond the
12 territorial jurisdiction of India pursu-
13 ant to Article 7(2) of the Agreement,
14 including a listing of the receiving
15 country of each such transfer;

16 “(iii) an analysis of—

17 “(I) any instances in which the
18 United States or India requested con-
19 sultations arising from concerns over
20 compliance with the provisions of Ar-
21 ticle 7(1) of the Agreement, and the
22 results of such consultations; and

23 “(II) any matters not otherwise
24 identified in this report that have be-
25 come the subject of consultations pur-

1 suant to Article 13(2) of the Agree-
2 ment, and a statement as to whether
3 such matters were resolved by the end
4 of the reporting period; and

5 “(iv) a statement as to whether—

6 “(I) any consultations are ex-
7 pected to occur under Article 16(5) of
8 the Agreement; and

9 “(II) any enrichment is being
10 carried out pursuant to Article 6 of
11 the Agreement.”.

12 **TITLE II—STRENGTHENING**
13 **UNITED STATES NON-**
14 **PROLIFERATION LAW RELAT-**
15 **ING TO PEACEFUL NUCLEAR**
16 **COOPERATION**

17 **SEC. 201. PROCEDURES REGARDING A SUBSEQUENT AR-**
18 **RANGEMENT ON REPROCESSING.**

19 (a) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding section 131 of
20 the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2160), no pro-
21 posed subsequent arrangement concerning arrangements
22 and procedures regarding reprocessing or other alteration
23 in form or content, as provided for in Article 6 of the
24 Agreement, shall take effect until the requirements speci-
25 fied in subsection (b) are met.

1 (b) REQUIREMENTS.—The requirements referred to
2 in subsection (a) are the following:

3 (1) The President transmits to the appropriate
4 congressional committees a report containing—

5 (A) the reasons for entering into such pro-
6 posed subsequent arrangement;

7 (B) a detailed description, including the
8 text, of such proposed subsequent arrangement;
9 and

10 (C) a certification that the United States
11 will pursue efforts to ensure that any other na-
12 tion that permits India to reprocess or other-
13 wise alter in form or content nuclear material
14 that the nation has transferred to India or nu-
15 clear material and by-product material used in
16 or produced through the use of nuclear mate-
17 rial, non-nuclear material, or equipment that it
18 has transferred to India requires India to do so
19 under similar arrangements and procedures.

20 (2) A period of 30 days of continuous session
21 (as defined by section 130 g.(2) of the Atomic En-
22 ergy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2159 (g)(2)) has
23 elapsed after transmittal of the report required
24 under paragraph (1).

1 (c) RESOLUTION OF DISAPPROVAL.—Notwith-
2 standing the requirements in subsection (b) having been
3 met, a subsequent arrangement referred to in subsection
4 (a) shall not become effective if during the time specified
5 in subsection (b)(2), Congress adopts, and there is en-
6 acted, a joint resolution stating in substance that Con-
7 gress does not favor such subsequent arrangement. Any
8 such resolution shall be considered pursuant to the proce-
9 dures set forth in section 130 i. of the Atomic Energy Act
10 of 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2159 (i)), as amended by section 205
11 of this Act.

12 **SEC. 202. INITIATIVES AND NEGOTIATIONS RELATING TO**
13 **AGREEMENTS FOR PEACEFUL NUCLEAR CO-**
14 **OPERATION.**

15 Section 123 of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42
16 U.S.C. 2153) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
17 lowing:

18 “e. The President shall keep the Com-
19 mittee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Rep-
20 resentatives and the Committee on Foreign Re-
21 lations of the Senate fully and currently in-
22 formed of any initiative or negotiations relating
23 to a new or amended agreement for peaceful
24 nuclear cooperation pursuant to this section
25 (except an agreement arranged pursuant to sec-

1 tion 91 c., 144 b., 144 c., or 144 d., or an
2 amendment thereto).”.

3 **SEC. 203. ACTIONS REQUIRED FOR RESUMPTION OF**
4 **PEACEFUL NUCLEAR COOPERATION.**

5 Section 129 a. of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42
6 U.S.C. 2158 (a)) is amended by striking “Congress adopts
7 a concurrent resolution” and inserting “Congress adopts,
8 and there is enacted, a joint resolution”.

9 **SEC. 204. UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT POLICY AT THE**
10 **NUCLEAR SUPPLIERS GROUP TO STRENGTH-**
11 **EN THE INTERNATIONAL NUCLEAR NON-**
12 **PROLIFERATION REGIME.**

13 (a) CERTIFICATION.—Before exchanging diplomatic
14 notes pursuant to Article 16(1) of the Agreement, the
15 President shall certify to the appropriate congressional
16 committees that it is the policy of the United States to
17 work with members of the Nuclear Suppliers Group
18 (NSG), individually and collectively, to agree to further
19 restrict the transfers of equipment and technology related
20 to the enrichment of uranium and reprocessing of spent
21 nuclear fuel.

22 (b) PEACEFUL USE ASSURANCES FOR CERTAIN BY-
23 PRODUCT MATERIAL.—The President shall seek to
24 achieve, by the earliest possible date, either within the
25 NSG or with relevant NSG Participating Governments,

1 the adoption of principles, reporting, and exchanges of in-
2 formation as may be appropriate to assure peaceful use
3 and accounting of by-product material in a manner that
4 is substantially equivalent to the relevant provisions of the
5 Agreement.

6 (c) REPORT.—

7 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than six months
8 after the date of the enactment of this Act, and
9 every six months thereafter, the President shall
10 transmit to the appropriate congressional commit-
11 tees a report on efforts by the United States pursu-
12 ant to subsections (a) and (b).

13 (2) TERMINATION.—The requirement to trans-
14 mit the report under paragraph (1) terminates on
15 the date on which the President transmits a report
16 pursuant to such paragraph stating that the objec-
17 tives in subsections (a) and (b) have been achieved.

18 **SEC. 205. CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.**

19 Section 130 i. of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42
20 U.S.C. 2159 (i)) is amended—

21 (1) in paragraph (1), by striking “means a joint
22 resolution” and all that follows through “, with the
23 date” and inserting the following: “means—

24 “(A) for an agreement for cooperation pursuant
25 to section 123 of this Act, a joint resolution, the

1 matter after the resolving clause of which is as fol-
2 lows: ‘That the Congress (does or does not) favor
3 the proposed agreement for cooperation transmitted
4 to the Congress by the President on _____ .’,

5 “(B) for a determination under section 129 of
6 this Act, a joint resolution, the matter after the re-
7 solving clause of which is as follows: ‘That the Con-
8 gress does not favor the determination transmitted
9 to the Congress by the President on _____ .’,
10 or

11 “(C) for a subsequent arrangement under sec-
12 tion 201 of the United States-India Nuclear Co-
13 operation Approval and Nonproliferation Enhance-
14 ment Act, a joint resolution, the matter after the re-
15 solving clause of which is as follows: ‘That the Con-
16 gress does not favor the subsequent arrangement to
17 the Agreement for Cooperation Between the Govern-
18 ment of the United States of America and the Gov-
19 ernment of India Concerning Peaceful Uses of Nu-
20 clear Energy that was transmitted to Congress by
21 the President on September 10, 2008.’,

22 with the date”; and

23 (2) in paragraph (4)—

24 (A) by inserting after “45 days after its in-
25 troduction” the following “(or in the case of a

1 joint resolution related to a subsequent ar-
2 rangement under section 201 of the United
3 States-India Nuclear Cooperation Approval and
4 Nonproliferation Enhancement Act, 15 days
5 after its introduction)”; and

6 (B) by inserting after “45-day period” the
7 following: “(or in the case of a joint resolution
8 related to a subsequent arrangement under sec-
9 tion 201 of the United States-India Nuclear Co-
10 operation Approval and Nonproliferation En-
11 hancement Act, 15-day period)”.
