SECTION 1. TRAVEL ON MILITARY AIRCRAFT OF CERTAIN DISABLED FORMER MEMBERS OF THE ARMED FORCES.

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 53 of title 10, United
5 States Code, is amended by inserting after section 1060b
6 the following new section:

7 "§ 1060c. Travel on military aircraft: certain disabled 8 former members of the armed forces

9 "The Secretary of Defense shall permit any former member of the armed forces who is entitled to compensa-10 11 tion under the laws administered by the Secretary of Veterans Affairs for a service-connected disability rated as 12 13 total to travel, in the same manner and to the same extent 14 as retired members of the armed forces, on unscheduled military flights within the continental United States and 15 on scheduled overseas flights operated by the Air Mobility 16 17 Command. The Secretary of Defense shall permit such travel on a space-available basis.". 18

(b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections
at the beginning of such chapter is amended by inserting
after the item relating to section 1060b the following new
item:
