14	"(3) the alleged offender is an alien lawfully ad-				
15	mitted for permanent residence in the United States				
16	(as that term is defined in section 101 of the Immi-				
17	gration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1101));				
18	"(4) the alleged offender is a stateless person				
19	whose habitual residence is in the United States; or				
20	"(5) after the conduct required for the offense				
21	occurs, the alleged offender is brought into, or found				
22	in, the United States, even if that conduct occurred				

outside the United States.".
