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## A BILL

To amend title 38, United States Code, to expand and improve health care services available to women veterans, especially those serving in Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom, from the Department of Veterans Affairs, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
 2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.**

4       (a) **SHORT TITLE.**—This Act may be cited as the  
 5       “Women Veterans Health Care Improvement Act”.

6       (b) **TABLE OF CONTENTS.**—The table of contents of  
 7       this Act is as follows:

TITLE I—STUDIES AND ASSESSMENTS OF DEPARTMENT OF

Sec. 102. Comprehensive assessment of women’s health care programs of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

TITLE II—IMPROVEMENT AND EXPANSION OF HEALTH CARE  
 PROGRAMS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS FOR  
 WOMEN VETERANS

Sec. 201. Medical care for newborn children of women veterans receiving maternity care.

Sec. 202. Training and certification for mental health care providers of the Department of Veterans Affairs on care for veterans suffering from sexual trauma and post-traumatic stress disorder.

Sec. 203. Pilot program for provision of child care assistance to certain veterans receiving certain types of health care services at Department facilities.

Sec. 204. Addition of recently separated women and minority veterans to serve on advisory committees.

1 **TITLE I—STUDIES AND ASSESS-**  
2 **MENTS OF DEPARTMENT OF**  
3 **VETERANS AFFAIRS HEALTH**  
4 **SERVICES FOR WOMEN VET-**  
5 **ERANS**

6 **SEC. 101. STUDY OF BARRIERS FOR WOMEN VETERANS TO**  
7 **HEALTH CARE FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF**  
8 **VETERANS AFFAIRS.**

9 (a) **STUDY REQUIRED.**—The Secretary of Veterans  
10 Affairs shall conduct a comprehensive study of the bar-  
11 riers to the provision of comprehensive health care by the  
12 Department of Veterans Affairs encountered by women  
13 who are veterans. In conducting the study, the Secretary  
14 shall—

15 (1) survey women veterans who seek or receive  
16 hospital care or medical services provided by the De-  
17 partment of Veterans Affairs as well as women vet-  
18 erans who do not seek or receive such care or serv-  
19 ices;

20 (2) build on the work of the study of the De-  
21 partment of Veterans Affairs entitled “National Sur-  
22 vey of Women Veterans in Fiscal Year 2007–2008”;

1           (3) administer the survey to a representative  
2           sample of women veterans from each Veterans Inte-  
3           grated Service Network; and

4           (4) ensure that the sample of women veterans  
5           surveyed is of sufficient size for the study results to  
6           be statistically significant and is a larger sample  
7           than that of the study of the Department of Vet-  
8           erans Affairs entitled “National Survey of Women  
9           Veterans in Fiscal Year 2007–2008”.

10          (b) ELEMENTS OF STUDY.—In conducting the study  
11          required by subsection (a), the Secretary of Veterans Af-  
12          fairs shall conduct research on the effects of the following  
13          on the women veterans surveyed in the study:

14               (1) The perceived stigma associated with seek-  
15               ing mental health care services.

16               (2) The effect of driving distance or availability  
17               of other forms of transportation to the nearest med-  
18               ical facility on access to care.

19               (3) The availability of child care.

20               (4) The acceptability of integrated primary  
21               care, women’s health clinics, or both.

22               (5) The comprehension of eligibility require-  
23               ments for, and the scope of services available under,  
24               hospital care and medical services.

1           (6) The perception of the personal safety and  
2           comfort of women veterans in inpatient, outpatient,  
3           and behavioral health facilities of the Department.

4           (7) The gender sensitivity of health care pro-  
5           viders and staff to issues that particularly affect  
6           women.

7           (8) The effectiveness of outreach for health care  
8           services available to women veterans.

9           (9) The location and operating hours of health  
10          care facilities that provide services to women vet-  
11          erans.

12          (10) Such other significant barriers as the Sec-  
13          retary of Veterans Affairs may identify.

14          (c) AUTHORITY TO ENTER INTO CONTRACTS.—The  
15          Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall enter into a contract  
16          with a qualified independent entity or organization to  
17          carry out the studies and research required under this sec-  
18          tion.

19          (d) MANDATORY REVIEW OF DATA BY CERTAIN DI-  
20          VISIONS WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT.—

21                 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Veterans  
22          Affairs shall ensure that the head of each division of  
23          the Department of Veterans Affairs specified in  
24          paragraph (2) reviews the results of the study con-  
25          ducted under this section. The head of each such di-

1 vision shall submit findings with respect to the study  
2 to the Under Secretary for Health and to other per-  
3 tinent program offices within the Department of  
4 Veterans Affairs with duties relating to health care  
5 services for women veterans.

6 (2) SPECIFIED DIVISIONS OF THE DEPART-  
7 MENT.—The divisions of the Department of Vet-  
8 erans Affairs specified in this paragraph are—

9 (A) the Center for Women Veterans, estab-  
10 lished under section 318 of title 38, United  
11 States Code; and

12 (B) the Advisory Committee on Women  
13 Veterans, established under section 542 of title  
14 38, United States Code.

15 (e) REPORTS.—

16 (1) REPORT ON IMPLEMENTATION.—Not later  
17 than 6 months after the date on which the Depart-  
18 ment of Veterans Affairs publishes a final report on  
19 the study entitled “National Survey of Women Vet-  
20 erans in Fiscal Year 2007–2008”, the Secretary of  
21 Veterans Affairs shall submit to Congress a report  
22 on the status of the implementation of the section.

23 (2) REPORT ON STUDY.—Not later than 30  
24 months after the date on which the Department  
25 publishes such final report, the Secretary of Vet-

1       erans Affairs shall submit to Congress a report on  
2       the study required under this section. The report  
3       shall include recommendations for such administra-  
4       tive and legislative action as the Secretary of Vet-  
5       erans Affairs determines to be appropriate. The re-  
6       port shall also include the findings of the head of  
7       each specified division of the Department and of the  
8       Under Secretary for Health.

9       (f) DEFINITION OF FACILITY OF THE DEPART-  
10      MENT.—In this section the term “facility of the Depart-  
11      ment” has the meaning given that term in section 1701(3)  
12      of title 38, United States Code.

13      (g) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is  
14      authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary of Veterans  
15      Affairs \$4,000,000 to carry out this section.

16      **SEC. 102. COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENT OF WOMEN’S**  
17                                   **HEALTH CARE PROGRAMS OF THE DEPART-**  
18                                   **MENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS.**

19      (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Veterans Affairs  
20      shall conduct a comprehensive assessment of all health  
21      care services and programs provided by the Department  
22      of Veterans Affairs for the health care needs of women  
23      veterans. Such comprehensive assessment shall include as-  
24      sessments of specialized programs for women with post-  
25      traumatic stress disorder, for women who are homeless,

1 for women who require care for substance abuse or mental  
2 illnesses, and for women who require obstetric and  
3 gynecologic care.

4 (b) SPECIFIC MATTERS STUDIED.—

5 (1) IDENTIFICATION OF PROGRAMS.—For each  
6 medical facility of the Department of Veterans Af-  
7 fairs, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall identify  
8 each of the following types of programs for women  
9 veterans provided by the Department and determine  
10 whether effective health care services, including evi-  
11 denced-based health care services, are readily avail-  
12 able to and easily accessed by women veterans:

13 (A) Health promotion programs, including  
14 reproductive health promotion programs.

15 (B) Disease prevention programs.

16 (C) Health care programs.

17 (2) IDENTIFICATION OF RELEVANT ISSUES.—In  
18 making such determination, the Secretary of Vet-  
19 erans Affairs shall identify, for each medical facility  
20 of the Department of Veterans Affairs—

21 (A) the frequency with which such services  
22 are available and provided,

23 (B) the demographics of the women vet-  
24 erans population,



1 (C) the sites where such services are avail-  
2 able and provided, and

3 (D) whether, and to what extent, waiting  
4 lists, geographic distance, and other factors ob-  
5 struct the receipt of any of such services at any  
6 such site.

7 (c) AUTHORITY TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT.—The  
8 Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall enter into a contract  
9 with a qualified independent entity or organization to  
10 carry out the studies and research required under this sec-  
11 tion.

12 (d) DEVELOPMENT OF PLAN TO IMPROVE SERV-  
13 ICES.—

14 (1) PLAN REQUIRED.—After conducting the  
15 comprehensive assessment required by subsection  
16 (a), the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall develop  
17 a plan to improve the provision of health care serv-  
18 ices to women veterans and to project the future  
19 health care needs, including the mental health care  
20 needs of women serving in the combat theaters of  
21 Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi  
22 Freedom.

23 (2) LIST OF SERVICES.—In developing the plan  
24 under this subsection, the Secretary of Veterans Af-  
25 fairs shall list the types of services available for

1 women veterans at each medical center of the De-  
2 partment.

3 (e) REPORT.—Not later than one year after the date  
4 of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Veterans  
5 Affairs shall submit to Congress a report on the assess-  
6 ment conducted pursuant to subsection (a) and the plan  
7 required under subsection (d). The report shall include  
8 recommendations for such administrative and legislative  
9 action as the Secretary of Veterans Affairs determines to  
10 be appropriate.

11 (f) GAO REPORT.—Not later than 6 months after  
12 the date on which the Secretary of Veterans Affairs sub-  
13 mits the report required under subsection (e), the Comp-  
14 troller General shall submit to Congress a report con-  
15 taining the findings of the Comptroller General with re-  
16 spect to the report of the Secretary, which may include  
17 such recommendations for administrative or legislative ac-  
18 tions as the Comptroller General determines to be appro-  
19 priate.

20 (g) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is  
21 authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary of Veterans  
22 Affairs \$5,000,000 to carry out this section.

1 **TITLE II—IMPROVEMENT AND**  
 2 **EXPANSION OF HEALTH CARE**  
 3 **PROGRAMS OF THE DEPART-**  
 4 **MENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS**  
 5 **FOR WOMEN VETERANS**

6 **SEC. 201. MEDICAL CARE FOR NEWBORN CHILDREN OF**  
 7 **WOMEN VETERANS RECEIVING MATERNITY**  
 8 **CARE.**

9 (a) NEWBORN CARE.—Subchapter VIII of chapter  
 10 17 of title 38, United States Code, is amended by adding  
 11 at the end the following new section:

12 **“SEC. 1786. HOSPITAL CARE AND MEDICAL SERVICES FOR**  
 13 **NEWBORN CHILDREN OF WOMEN VETERANS**  
 14 **RECEIVING MATERNITY CARE.”.**

15 **“§ 1786. *Hospital care and medical services for new-***  
 16 ***born children of women veterans receiv-***  
 17 ***ing maternity care***

18 “In the case of a child of a woman veteran who is  
 19 receiving hospital care or medical services at a Depart-  
 20 ment facility (or in another facility pursuant to a contract  
 21 entered into by the Secretary) relating to the birth of that  
 22 child, the Secretary may furnish hospital care and medical  
 23 services to that child at that facility during the ~~14-day~~  
 24 *seven-day* period beginning on the date of the birth of the  
 25 child.”.

1 (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections  
 2 at the beginning of chapter 17 of such title is amended  
 3 by inserting after the item relating to section 1785 the  
 4 following new item:

“1786. Hospital care and medical services for newborn children of women veterans receiving maternity care.”.

5 **SEC. 202. TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION FOR MENTAL**  
 6 **HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS OF THE DEPART-**  
 7 **MENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS ON CARE FOR**  
 8 **VETERANS SUFFERING FROM SEXUAL TRAU-**  
 9 **MA AND POST-TRAUMATIC STRESS DIS-**  
 10 **ORDER.**

11 Section 1720D of title 38, United States Code, is  
 12 amended—

13 (1) by redesignating subsection (d) as sub-  
 14 section (f); and

15 (2) by inserting after subsection (e) the fol-  
 16 lowing new subsections:

17 “(d) The Secretary shall carry out a program to pro-  
 18 vide graduate medical education, training, certification,  
 19 and continuing medical education for mental health pro-  
 20 fessionals who provide counseling, care, and services under  
 21 subsection (a). In carrying out such program, the Sec-  
 22 retary shall ensure that all such mental health profes-  
 23 sionals have been trained in a consistent manner and that  
 24 such training includes principles of evidence-based treat-

1 ment and care for sexual trauma and post-traumatic  
2 stress disorder.

3 “(e) The Secretary shall submit to Congress an an-  
4 nual report on the counseling, care, and services provided  
5 to veterans pursuant to this section. Each report shall in-  
6 clude data for the year covered by the report with respect  
7 to each of the following:

8 “(1) The number of mental health profes-  
9 sionals, graduate medical education trainees, and  
10 primary care providers who have been certified  
11 under the program required by subsection (d) and  
12 the amount and nature of continuing medical edu-  
13 cation provided under such program to such profes-  
14 sionals, trainees, and providers who are so certified.

15 “(2) The number of women veterans who re-  
16 ceived counseling and care and services under sub-  
17 section (a) from professionals and providers who re-  
18 ceived training under subsection (d).

19 “(3) The number of graduate medical edu-  
20 cation, training, certification, and continuing med-  
21 ical education courses provided by reason of sub-  
22 section (d).

23 “(4) The number of trained full-time equivalent  
24 employees required in each facility of the Depart-  
25 ment to meet the needs of veterans requiring treat-

1       ment and care for sexual trauma and post-traumatic  
2       stress disorder.

3               “(5) Any recommended improvements for treat-  
4       ing women veterans with sexual trauma and post-  
5       traumatic stress disorder.

6               “(6) Such other information as the Secretary  
7       determines to be appropriate.”.

8       **SEC. 203. PILOT PROGRAM FOR PROVISION OF CHILD CARE**  
9               **ASSISTANCE TO CERTAIN VETERANS RECEIV-**  
10              **ING CERTAIN TYPES OF HEALTH CARE SERV-**  
11              **ICES AT DEPARTMENT FACILITIES.**

12       (a) IN GENERAL.—

13               (1) PILOT PROGRAM REQUIRED.—Not later  
14       than six months after the date of the enactment of  
15       this Act, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall  
16       carry out a two-year pilot program under which,  
17       subject to paragraph (2), the Secretary shall provide  
18       child care assistance to a qualified veteran child care  
19       needed by the veteran during the period of time de-  
20       scribed in paragraph (3).

21               (2) FORM OF CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE.—Child  
22       care assistance under this section may include—

23                   (A) stipends for the payment of child care  
24                   offered by licensed child care centers (either di-  
25                   rectly or through a voucher program);

1 (B) the development of partnerships with  
2 private agencies;

3 (C) collaboration with facilities or pro-  
4 grams of other Federal departments or agen-  
5 cies; and

6 (D) the arrangement of after-school care.

7 (3) PERIOD OF TIME.—Child care assistance  
8 under the pilot program may only be provided for  
9 the period of time that the qualified veteran—

10 (A) receives a health care service referred  
11 to in paragraph (4) at a facility of the Depart-  
12 ment; and

13 (B) requires to travel to and return from  
14 such facility for the receipt of such health care  
15 service.

16 (4) QUALIFIED VETERAN DEFINED.—In this  
17 section, the term “qualified veteran” means a vet-  
18 eran who is the primary caretaker of a child and  
19 who is receiving from the Department of Veterans  
20 Affairs one or more of the following health care serv-  
21 ices:

22 (A) Regular mental health care services.

23 (B) Intensive mental health care services.

24 (C) Any other intensive health care serv-  
25 ices for which the Secretary determines that the

1 provision of child care would improve access by  
2 qualified veterans.

3 (5) LOCATION OF PILOT PROGRAM.—The Sec-  
4 retary shall carry out the pilot program at no fewer  
5 than three Veterans Integrated Service Networks.

6 (b) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There is  
7 authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary of Veterans  
8 Affairs \$1,500,000 for each of fiscal years 2010 and 2011  
9 to carry out the pilot program under this section.

10 (c) REPORT.—Not later than six months after the  
11 completion of the pilot program, the Secretary shall sub-  
12 mit to Congress a report on the pilot program and shall  
13 include recommendations for the continuation or expan-  
14 sion of the pilot program.

15 **SEC. 204. ADDITION OF RECENTLY SEPARATED WOMEN**  
16 **AND MINORITY VETERANS TO SERVE ON AD-**  
17 **VISORY COMMITTEES.**

18 (a) ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON WOMEN VETERANS.—  
19 Subsection (a)(2)(a) of section 542 of title 38, United  
20 States Code, is amended—

21 (1) by striking “and” at the end of clause (ii);

22 (2) by striking the period at the end of clause  
23 (iii) and inserting “; and”; and

24 (3) by inserting after clause (iii) the following  
25 new clause:



1           “(iv) women who are recently separated vet-  
2           erans.”.

3           (b) ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON MINORITY VET-  
4           ERANS.—Subsection (a)(2)(a) of section 544 of title 38,  
5           United States Code, is amended—

6           (1) by striking “and” at the end of clause (iii);

7           (2) by striking the period at the end of clause  
8           (iv) and inserting “; and”; and

9           (3) by inserting after clause (iv) the following  
10          new clause:

11          “(v) recently separated veterans who are minor-  
12          ity group members.”.

13          (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by  
14          this section shall first apply to appointments made on or  
15          after the date of the enactment of this Act.
