## 111TH CONGRESS 1ST SESSION H.R. 3341

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of Ronald Wilson Reagan, the 40th President of the United States.

# A BILL

- To require the Secretary of the Treasury to mint coins in commemoration of Ronald Wilson Reagan, the 40th President of the United States.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Ronald Reagan Com-
- 5 memorative Coin Act of 2009".

1	SEC. 2. COIN SPECIFICATIONS.
2	(a) DENOMINATIONS.—The Secretary of the Treas-
3	ury (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Secretary")
4	shall mint and issue the following coins:
5	(1) $5$ GOLD COIN.—Not more than 50,000 $5$
6	coins, which shall—
7	(A) weigh 8.359 grams;
8	(B) have a diameter of 0.850 inches; and
9	(C) contain 90 percent gold and 10 percent
10	alloy.
11	(2) $1$ SILVER COIN.—Not more than 300,000
12	\$1 coins, which shall—
13	(A) weigh 26.73 grams;
14	(B) have a diameter of 1.500 inches; and
15	(C) contain 90 percent silver and 10 per-
16	cent copper.
17	(b) LEGAL TENDER.—The coins minted under this
18	Act shall be legal tender, as provided in section 5103 of
19	title 31, United States Code.
20	(c) NUMISMATIC ITEMS.—For purposes of sections
21	5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all coins
22	minted under this Act shall be considered to be numis-
23	matic items.
24	SEC. 3. DESIGN OF COINS.
25	(a) Design Requirements.—

1	(1) IN GENERAL.—The design of the coins
2	minted under this Act shall—
3	(A) bear an image of former President
4	Ronald Wilson Reagan on the obverse side; and
5	(B) bear a design on the reverse side that
6	is similar to the depiction of an American eagle
7	carrying an olive branch, flying above a nest
8	containing another eagle and hatchlings.
9	(2) DESIGNATION AND INSCRIPTIONS.—On
10	each coin minted under this Act, there shall be—
11	(A) a designation of the value of the coin;
12	(B) an inscription of the year "2013"; and
13	(C) inscriptions of the words "Liberty",
14	"In God We Trust", "United States of Amer-
15	ica", and "E Pluribus Unum".
16	(b) DESIGN SELECTION.—The design for the coins
17	minted under this Act shall be—
18	(1) selected by the Secretary, after consultation
19	with the Commission of Fine Arts; and
20	(2) reviewed by the Citizens Commemorative
21	Coin Advisory Committee.
22	SEC. 4. ISSUANCE OF COINS.
23	(a) QUALITY OF COINS.—Coins minted under this
24	Act shall be issued in uncirculated and proof qualities.

(b) MINT FACILITY.—Only 1 facility of the United
 States Mint may be used to strike any particular quality
 of the coins minted under this Act.

4 (c) COMMENCEMENT OF ISSUANCE.—The Secretary
5 may issue coins minted under this Act beginning on Janu6 ary 1, 2013, except that the Secretary may initiate sales
7 of such coins, without issuance, before such date.

8 (d) TERMINATION OF MINTING AUTHORITY.—No
9 coins shall be minted under this Act after December 31,
10 2013.

### 11 SEC. 5. SALE OF COINS.

(a) SALE PRICE.—The coins issued under this Act
shall be sold by the Secretary at a price equal to the sum
of—

15 (1) the face value of the coins;

16 (2) the surcharge provided in section 6(a) with17 respect to such coins; and

(3) the cost of designing and issuing the coins
(including labor, materials, dies, use of machinery,
overhead expenses, marketing, and shipping).

(b) BULK SALES.—The Secretary shall make bulk
sales of the coins issued under this Act at a reasonable
discount.

24 (c) Prepaid Orders.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall accept
 prepaid orders for the coins minted under this Act
 before the issuance of such coins.

4 (2) DISCOUNT.—Sale prices with respect to pre5 paid orders under paragraph (1) shall be at a rea6 sonable discount.

### 7 SEC. 6. SURCHARGES.

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—All sales of coins minted under9 this Act shall include a surcharge as follows:

10 (1) A surcharge of \$35 per coin for the \$5 coin. 11 (2) A surcharge of \$10 per coin for the \$1 coin. 12 (b) DISTRIBUTION.—Subject to section 5134(f) of 13 title 31, United States Code, the proceeds from the surcharges received by the Secretary from the sale of coins 14 15 issued under this Act shall be paid promptly by the Secretary to the Army Emergency Fund to be used by the 16 17 Army Emergency Fund for the purposes of providing fi-18 nancial assistance to any of the following individuals:

19 (1) An individual who is an Army active duty
20 soldier, single or married, or a dependent of such a
21 soldier.

(2) A member of the Army National Guard or
Army Reserve on continuous active duty under title
10, United States Code, for more than 30 consecutive days, or a dependent of such a member.

(3) A soldier retired from active duty because
 of longevity or physical disability, including any
 Army National Guard or Army Reserve soldier who
 is in receipt of Army retired pay, or any authorized
 dependent of such soldier.

6 (4) A surviving spouse or dependent child of a
7 soldier who died while on active duty or after retire8 ment.

9 (c) AUDITS.—The Army Emergency Fund shall be 10 subject to the audit requirements of section 5134(f)(2) of title 31, United States Code, with regard to such funds. 11 12 (d) LIMITATION.—Notwithstanding subsection (a), 13 no surcharge may be included with respect to the issuance under this Act of any coin during a calendar year if, as 14 15 of the time of such issuance, the issuance of such coin would result in the number of commemorative coin pro-16 17 grams issued during such year to exceed the annual 2 18 commemorative coin program issuance limitation under 19 section 5112(m)(1) of title 31, United States Code (as in 20 effect on the date of the enactment of this Act). The Sec-21 retary of the Treasury may issue guidance to carry out 22 this subsection.
