## A BILL

To amend sections 33 and 34 of the Federal Fire Prevention and Control Act of 1974, and for other purposes.

1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Fire Grants Reauthor-
5	ization Act of 2009".
6	SEC. 2. ASSISTANCE TO FIREFIGHTERS GRANT PROGRAM
7	REAUTHORIZATION.
8	(a) In General.—Section 33 of the Federal Fire Pre-
9	vention and Control Act of 1974 (15 U.S.C. 2229) is
10	amended to read as follows:
11	"SEC. 33. FIREFIGHTER ASSISTANCE.
12	"(a) Assistance Program.—
13	"(1) AUTHORITY.—In accordance with this sec-
14	tion, the Director may—
15	"(A) make grants on a competitive basis di-
16	rectly to fire departments of a State, in consulta-
17	tion with the chief executive of the State, for the
18	purpose of protecting the health and safety of the
19	public and firefighting personnel throughout the
20	Nation against fire and fire-related hazards;
21	"(B) make grants on a competitive basis di-
22	rectly to State fire training academies, in con-
23	sultation with the chief executive of the State, in
24	accordance with paragraph $(11)(C)$ ;

1	"(C) provide assistance for fire prevention
2	and firefighter safety research and development
3	programs and fire prevention or fire safety pro-
4	grams and activities in accordance with para-
5	graph (4); and
6	"(D) provide assistance for volunteer, non-
7	fire service EMS and rescue organizations for the
8	purpose of paragraph $(3)(F)$ .
9	"(2) Administrative assistance.—The Direc-
10	tor shall establish specific criteria for the selection of
11	recipients of assistance under this section and shall
12	provide grant-writing assistance to applicants.
13	"(3) USE OF FIRE DEPARTMENT GRANT
14	FUNDS.—The Director may make a grant under
15	paragraph (1)(A) only if the applicant for the grant
16	agrees to use the grant funds for one or more of the
17	following purposes:
18	"(A) To hire additional firefighting per-
19	sonnel.
20	"(B) To train firefighting personnel in fire-
21	fighting, emergency medical services and other
22	emergency response (including response to a ter-
23	rorism incident or use of a weapon of mass de-
24	struction), arson prevention and detection, mari-
25	time firefighting, or the handling of hazardous

1	materials or to train firefighting personnel to
2	provide any of the training described in this sub-
3	paragraph.
4	"(C) To fund the creation of rapid interven-
5	tion teams to protect firefighting personnel at the
6	scenes of fires and other emergencies.
7	"(D) To certify fire and building inspectors
8	employed by a fire department or serving as a
9	volunteer building inspector with a fire depart-
10	ment.
11	"(E) To establish wellness and fitness pro-
12	grams for firefighting personnel to ensure that
13	the firefighting personnel can carry out their du-
14	ties, including programs dedicated to raising
15	awareness of, and prevention of, job-related men-
16	tal health issues.
17	"(F) To fund emergency medical services
18	provided by fire departments and volunteer, non-
19	fire service EMS and rescue organizations.
20	"(G) To acquire additional firefighting ve-
21	hicles, including fire trucks.
22	"(H) To acquire additional firefighting
23	equipment, including equipment for communica-
24	tions, monitoring, and response to a terrorism
25	incident or use of a weapon of mass destruction.

1	"(I) To acquire personal protective equip-
2	ment required for firefighting personnel by the
3	Occupational Safety and Health Administration
4	and other personal protective equipment for fire-
5	fighting personnel, including protective equip-
6	ment to respond to a terrorism incident or the
7	use of a weapon of mass destruction.
8	"(J) To modify fire stations, fire training
9	facilities, and other facilities to protect the health
10	and safety of firefighting personnel.
11	"(K) To enforce fire codes and standards.
12	"(L) To fund fire prevention programs.
13	"(M) To educate the public about arson pre-
14	vention and detection.
15	"(N) To provide incentives for the recruit-
16	ment and retention of volunteer firefighting per-
17	sonnel for volunteer firefighting departments and
18	other firefighting departments that utilize volun-
19	teers.
20	"(4) Fire prevention and firefighter safe-
21	TY RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS.—
22	"(A) In General.—For each fiscal year,
23	the Director shall use not less than 10 percent of
24	the funds made available under subsection (e)—

1	"(i) to make grants to fire departments
2	for the purpose described in paragraph
3	(3)(L);
4	"(ii) to make grants to, or enter into
5	contracts or cooperative agreements with,
6	national, State, local, or community orga-
7	nizations that are not fire departments
8	but—
9	"(I) that are recognized for their
10	experience and expertise with respect to
11	fire prevention or fire safety programs
12	and activities and that partner with
13	fire departments, for the purpose of
14	carrying out such programs and ac-
15	tivities;
16	"(II) engage in fire- and life safe-
17	ty-related activities as a primary pur-
18	pose or function, for the purpose of
19	carrying out fire prevention or fire
20	safety programs and activities; or
21	"(III) that are recognized for their
22	experience and expertise with respect to
23	firefighter research and development
24	programs, for the purpose of carrying
25	out research on fire prevention or fire

1	safety programs and activities or to
2	improve firefighter health and life safe-
3	ty; and
4	"(iii) if the Director determines that it
5	is necessary, to make grants or enter into
6	contracts in accordance with subsection (c).
7	"(B) Priority.—In selecting organizations
8	described in subparagraph (A)(ii) to receive as-
9	sistance under this paragraph, the Director shall
10	give priority to organizations that focus on pre-
11	vention of injuries to high risk groups from fire,
12	as well as research programs that demonstrate
13	the potential to improve firefighter safety.
14	"(C) Grant limitation.—A grant under
15	this paragraph shall not exceed \$1,500,000 for a
16	fiscal year.
17	"(D) Limitation.—None of the funds made
18	available under this paragraph may be provided
19	to the Association of Community Organizations
20	for Reform Now (ACORN) or any of its affili-
21	ates, subsidiaries, or allied organizations.
22	"(5) APPLICATION.—The Director may provide
23	assistance to a fire department or organization (in-
24	cluding a State fire training academy) under this
25	subsection only if the fire department or organization

1	seeking the assistance submits to the Director an ap-
2	plication that meets the following requirements:
3	"(A) FORM.—The application shall be in
4	such form as the Director may require.
5	"(B) Information.—The application shall
6	include the following information:
7	"(i) Information that demonstrates the
8	financial need of the applicant for the as-
9	sistance for which applied.
10	"(ii) An analysis of the costs and bene-
11	fits, with respect to public safety, of the use
12	of the assistance.
13	"(iii) An agreement to provide infor-
14	mation to the national fire incident report-
15	ing system for the period covered by the as-
16	sistance.
17	"(iv) A list of other sources of Federal
18	funding received by the applicant.
19	"(v) Any other information that the
20	Director may require.
21	"(C) Unnecessary duplication.—The Di-
22	rector, in coordination with the Secretary of
23	Homeland Security, shall use the list provided
24	under subparagraph (B)(iv) to prevent the un-
25	necessary duplication of grant funds.

## 1 "(6) Matching requirement.— 2 "(A) In general.—Subject to subpara-

graphs (B) and (C) and paragraph (8), the Director may provide assistance under this subsection only if the applicant for such assistance agrees to match 10 percent of such assistance for any fiscal year with an equal amount of non-Federal funds.

"(B) REQUIREMENT FOR SMALL COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS.—In the case of an applicant whose personnel serve jurisdictions of 20,000 or fewer residents, the percent applied under the matching requirement of subparagraph (A) shall be 5 percent.

"(C) Fire prevention and firefighter

SAFETY GRANTS EXCEPTION.—There shall be no
matching requirement for a grant described in
paragraph (4).

"(7) MAINTENANCE OF EXPENDITURES.—Subject to paragraph (8), the Director may provide assistance under this subsection only if the applicant for the assistance agrees to maintain in the fiscal year for which the assistance will be received the applicant's aggregate expenditures for the uses described in paragraph (3) or (4) at or above 80 percent of the average

1	level of such expenditures in the 2 fiscal years pre-
2	ceding the fiscal year for which the assistance will be
3	received.
4	"(8) Economic Hardship Waiver.—
5	"(A) In General.—In exceptional cir-
6	cumstances, the Director may waive or reduce
7	the matching requirement under paragraph (6)
8	and the maintenance of expenditures require-
9	ment under paragraph (7) for applicants facing
10	demonstrated economic hardship.
11	"(B) Criteria development.—The cri-
12	teria under which the Director may waive or re-
13	duce such requirements shall be developed in con-
14	sultation with individuals who are—
15	"(i) recognized for expertise in fire-
16	fighting, emergency medical services pro-
17	vided by fire services, or the economic af-
18	fairs of State and local governments; and
19	"(ii) members of national fire service
20	organizations or national organizations
21	representing the interests of State and local
22	governments.
23	"(C) Public Availability.—The Director
24	shall make the criteria developed under subpara-
25	graph (B) publicly available.

1	"(9) Variety of fire department grant re-
2	CIPIENTS.—
3	"(A) In general.—Of the amounts made
4	available under subsection (e), the Director shall
5	ensure that grants under paragraph (1)(A) for a
6	fiscal year are allocated, to the extent that there
7	are eligible applicants to carry out the activities
8	under paragraph (3), as follows:
9	"(i) 25 percent shall be made available
10	to career fire departments.
11	"(ii) 25 percent shall be made avail-
12	able to volunteer fire departments.
13	"(iii) 25 percent shall be made avail-
14	able to combination fire departments.
15	"(B) Evaluation criteria.—
16	"(i) In General.—In awarding
17	grants under paragraph (1)(A), the Director
18	shall, within each category of applicants
19	under subparagraph (A), consider a broad
20	range of factors important to the appli-
21	cant's ability to respond to fires and related
22	hazards, such as population served, geo-
23	graphic response area, hazard vulnerability,
24	call volume, financial situation, and need
25	for training or equipment.

1	"(ii) High population and incident
2	RESPONSE.—In considering such factors
3	under clause (i), applicants serving areas
4	with high population and with a high num-
5	ber of incidents requiring a response shall
6	receive a higher level of consideration.
7	"(C) Remainder.—Of the amounts made
8	available under subsection (e) that are not allo-
9	cated for use and awarded under subparagraph
10	(A) or designated for use under any other provi-
11	sion of this section, the Director shall provide for
12	an open competition for grants among career fire
13	departments, volunteer fire departments, and
14	combination fire departments to carry out the
15	activities under paragraph (3).
16	"(10) Report to the director.—The Director
17	may provide assistance under this subsection only if
18	the applicant for the assistance agrees to submit to
19	the Director a report, including a description of how
20	the assistance was used, with respect to each fiscal
21	year for which the assistance was received.
22	"(11) Grant limitations.—
23	"(A) Recipient limitations.—A grant re-
24	cinient under paragraph $(1)(A)$ —

1	"(i) that serves a jurisdiction with
2	100,000 people or less may not receive
3	grants in excess of \$1,000,000 for any fiscal
4	year;
5	"(ii) that serves a jurisdiction with
6	more than 100,000 people but less than
7	500,000 people may not receive grants in
8	excess of \$2,000,000 for any fiscal year;
9	"(iii) that serves a jurisdiction with
10	500,000 people or more but less than
11	1,000,000 people may not receive grants in
12	excess of \$3,000,000 for any fiscal year;
13	"(iv) that serves a jurisdiction with
14	1,000,000 people or more but less than
15	2,500,000 people may not receive grants in
16	excess of \$6,000,000 for any fiscal year; and
17	"(v) that serves a jurisdiction with
18	2,500,000 people or more may not receive
19	grants in excess of \$9,000,000 for any fiscal
20	year.
21	The Director may award grants in excess of the
22	limitations provided in clauses (i), (ii), (iii),
23	and (iv) if the Director determines that extraor-
24	dinary need for assistance by a jurisdiction war-
25	rants a waiver.

1	"(B) Limitation on expenditures for
2	FIREFIGHTING VEHICLES.—Not more than 25
3	percent of the funds appropriated to provide
4	grants under this section for a fiscal year may
5	be used to assist grant recipients to purchase ve-
6	hicles, as authorized by paragraph (3)(G).
7	"(C) State fire training academies.—
8	"(i) In general.—In accordance with
9	clause (ii), the Director shall award not
10	more than 3 percent of the amounts made
11	available under subsection (e) for a fiscal
12	year for grants under this subsection for
13	State fire training academies.
14	"(ii) Limitation.—The Director
15	shall—
16	"(I) award not more than 1 grant
17	under this subparagraph per State in
18	a fiscal year;
19	"(II) limit the amount of a grant
20	to a State fire training academy to less
21	than or equal to\$1,000,000 in each fis-
22	cal year; and
23	"(III) ensure that any grant
24	awarded to a State fire training acad-
25	emy shall be used for the purposes de-

1	scribed in paragraphs $3(G)$ , $3(H)$ , or
2	3(I).
3	"(D) Requirements for grants for
4	EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES.—The Director
5	shall award not more than 2 percent of the
6	amounts made available under subsection (e) for
7	a fiscal year to volunteer, non-fire service EMS
8	and rescue organizations for the purposes de-
9	scribed in paragraph $(3)(F)$ .
10	"(E) Application of selection criteria
11	TO GRANT APPLICATIONS FROM VOLUNTEER,
12	NON-FIRE SERVICE EMS AND RESCUE ORGANIZA-
13	TIONS.—In reviewing applications submitted by
14	volunteer, non-fire service EMS and rescue orga-
15	nizations, the Director shall consider the extent
16	to which other sources of Federal funding are
17	available to provide the assistance requested in
18	such grant applications.
19	"(F) Consensus standards.—
20	"(i) In general.—Any grant amounts
21	used to obtain training under this section
22	shall be limited to training that complies
23	with applicable national voluntary con-
24	sensus standards (if applicable national vol-
25	untary consensus standards have been estab-

1	lished), unless a waiver has been granted
2	under clause (ii).
3	"(ii) Waiver.—
4	"(I) Explanation for non-
5	STANDARD TRAINING.—If an applicant
6	for a grant seeks to use the assistance
7	provided under the grant to obtain
8	training that does not meet or exceed
9	applicable voluntary consensus stand-
10	ards, the applicant shall include in the
11	application an explanation of why
12	such training will serve the needs of
13	the applicant better than training that
14	does meet or exceed such standards.
15	"(II) Procedures.—In making
16	a determination whether or not to
17	waive the requirement under clause (i)
18	with respect to a specific standard, the
19	Director shall, to the greatest extent
20	practicable—
21	"(aa) consult with other
22	members of the fire services re-
23	garding the impact on fire depart-
24	ments of the requirement to meet
25	or exceed the specific standard;

1	"(bb) take into consideration
2	the explanation provided by the
3	applicant under subclause (I);
4	and
5	"(cc) seek to minimize the
6	impact of the requirement to meet
7	or exceed the specific standard on
8	the applicant, particularly if
9	meeting the standard would im-
10	$pose\ additional\ costs.$
11	"(III) Additional requests.—
12	Applicants that apply for a grant
13	under the terms of subclause (I) may
14	include a second grant request in the
15	application to be considered by the Di-
16	rector in the event that the Director
17	does not approve the primary grant re-
18	quest on the grounds of the training
19	not meeting applicable voluntary con-
20	sensus standards.
21	"(12) Eligible grantee on behalf of Alas-
22	KA NATIVE VILLAGES.—The Alaska Village Initiatives,
23	a non-profit organization incorporated in the State of
24	Alaska, shall be considered an eligible grantee for pur-

1	poses of receiving assistance under this section on be-
2	half of Alaska Native villages.
3	"(13) Annual meeting.—The Director shall
4	convene an annual meeting of individuals who are
5	members of national fire service organizations and
6	are recognized for expertise in firefighting or emer-
7	gency medical services provided by fire services, and
8	who are not employees of the Federal Government, for
9	the purpose of recommending criteria for awarding
10	grants under this section for the next fiscal year and
11	any necessary administrative changes to the grant
12	program.
13	"(14) Guidelines.—
14	"(A) In General.—Each year, prior to
15	making any grants under this section, the Direc-
16	tor shall publish in the Federal Register—
17	"(i) guidelines that describe the process
18	for applying for grants and the criteria for
19	awarding grants;
20	"(ii) an explanation of any differences
21	between the guidelines and the recommenda-
22	tions made pursuant to paragraph (13);
23	and
24	"(iii) the criteria developed under
25	paragraph (8) which the Director will use

1	to evaluate applicants for waivers from pro-
2	gram requirements.
3	"(B) Specific requirement.—The cri-
4	teria for awarding grants under paragraph
5	(1)(A) shall include the extent to which the grant
6	would enhance the daily operations of the appli-
7	cant and the impact of such a grant on the pro-
8	tection of lives and property.
9	"(15) Peer review.—The Director, after con-
10	sultation with national fire service organizations,
11	shall appoint fire service personnel to conduct peer re-
12	view of applications received under paragraph (5). In
13	making grants under this section, the Director shall
14	consider the results of such peer review evaluations.
15	"(16) Applicability of federal advisory
16	COMMITTEE ACT.—The Federal Advisory Committee
17	Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to activities
18	under paragraphs (13) and (15).
19	"(17) Accounting Determination.—Notwith-
20	standing any other provision of law, rule, regulation,
21	or guidance, for purposes of receiving assistance
22	under this section, equipment costs shall include all
23	costs attributable to any design, purchase of compo-

nents, assembly, manufacture, and transportation of

 $equipment\ not\ otherwise\ commercially\ available.$ 

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- 1 "(b) AUDITS.—A recipient of a grant under this sec2 tion shall be subject to audits to ensure that the grant pro3 ceeds are expended for the intended purposes and that the
  4 grant recipient complies with the requirements of para5 graphs (6) and (7) of subsection (a) unless the Director has
  6 granted a waiver under subsection (a)(8).
  - "(c) Fire Safety Research Centers.—

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- 8 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The Director may make a 9 grant under subsection (a)(4)(A)(iii) to an institution 10 of higher education, a national fire service organiza-11 tion, or a national fire safety organization to estab-12 lish and operate a fire safety research center.
  - "(2) OBJECTIVES.—A grant received under this subsection shall be used by such an institution or organization to advance significantly the Nation's ability to reduce the number of fire-related deaths and injuries among firefighters and the general public through research, development, and technology transfer activities.
  - "(3) Limitation.—The Director may establish no more than 3 fire safety research centers. An institution of higher education, a national fire service organization, or a national fire safety organization may not directly receive a grant under this section for

1	a fiscal year for more than 1 fire safety research cen-
2	ter.
3	"(4) APPLICATION.—In order to be eligible to re-
4	ceive a fire safety research center grant, an institu-
5	tion of higher education, a national fire service orga-
6	nization, or a national fire safety organization shall
7	submit to the Director an application that is in such
8	form and contains such information and assurances
9	as the Director may require.
10	"(5) General selection criteria.—The Di-
11	rector shall select each recipient of a grant under this
12	subsection through a competitive process on the basis
13	of the following:
14	"(A) The demonstrated research and exten-
15	sion resources available to the recipient to carry
16	out the research, development, and technology
17	transfer activities.
18	"(B) The capability of the recipient to pro-
19	vide leadership in making national contributions
20	to fire safety.
21	"(C) The recipient's ability to disseminate
22	the results of fire safety research.
23	"(D) The strategic plan the recipient pro-
24	poses to carry out under the grant.

1	"(6) Consideration.—The Director shall give
2	special consideration under paragraph (5) to an ap-
3	plicant for a grant that consists of a partnership be-
4	tween a national fire service organization or a na-
5	tional fire safety organization and at least 1 of the
6	following:
7	"(A) An institution of higher education.
8	"(B) A minority-serving institution (de-
9	fined as an eligible institution under section
10	371(a) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20
11	$U.S.C.\ 1067q(a))).$
12	"(7) Research needs.—Within 90 days after
13	the date of enactment of the Fire Grants Reauthoriza-
14	tion Act of 2009, the Director shall convene a work-
15	shop of the fire safety research community, fire service
16	organizations, and other appropriate stakeholders to
17	identify and prioritize fire safety research needs. The
18	results of the workshop shall be made public, and the
19	Director shall consider such results in making awards
20	under this section.
21	"(d) Definitions.—In this section, the following defi-
22	nitions apply:
23	"(1) Career fire department.—The term 'ca-
24	reer fire department' means a firefighting department

1	that has an all professional force of firefighting per-
2	sonnel.
3	"(2) Combination fire department.—The
4	term 'combination fire department' means a fire-
5	fighting department that has a combined force of pro-
6	fessional and volunteer firefighting personnel.
7	"(3) DIRECTOR.—The term 'Director' means the
8	Director, acting through the Administrator.
9	"(4) Firefighting personnel.—The term
10	'firefighting personnel' means individuals, including
11	volunteers, who are firefighters, officers of fire depart-
12	ments, or emergency medical service personnel of fire
13	departments.
14	"(5) Institution of higher education.—The
15	term 'institution of higher education' has the meaning
