A BILL

 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1SECTION 1. PROTECTIVE APPROACH TO OIL AND GAS2LEASING, EXPLORATION, AND DEVELOPMENT3ON THE OUTER CONTINENTAL SHELF.

4 (a) REVISED NATIONAL OUTER CONTINENTAL
5 SHELF POLICY.—Section 3 of the Outer Continental Shelf
6 Lands Act (43 U.S.C. 1331) is amended by striking para7 graph (3) and inserting the following new paragraph:

8 "(3) while the outer Continental Shelf is a vital 9 national resource reserve held by the Federal Gov-10 ernment for the public, any leasing, exploration, or 11 development of the outer Continental Shelf nec-12 essarily impacts the marine environment and coastal 13 environment, so the protection and maintenance 14 (and, when necessary, restoration) of the marine en-15 vironment and coastal environment is of primary im-16 portance and leasing, exploration, or development of 17 the outer Continental Shelf will be authorized in lim-18 ited areas only when sound science shows that such 19 activities can proceed with minimal risk to the 20 health of the marine environment and coastal envi-21 ronment.".

(b) PROTECTIVE MANDATE.—Such section is furtheramended—

24 (1) by inserting "(a) DECLARATION OF POL25 ICY.—" before "It is hereby declared"; and

1 (2) by adding at the end the following new sub-2 section:

3 "(b) PROTECTIVE APPROACH TO LEASING, EXPLO4 RATION, AND DEVELOPMENT.—The leasing, exploration,
5 and development of oil and gas resources of the outer Con6 tinental Shelf may be authorized only if—

"(1) the Secretary has a thorough understanding of the marine environment and coastal environment impacted by the activity and an environmental baseline, the risks of exploration or development, and the potential consequences of accidents
and other emergencies; and

13 "(2) the Secretary determines, on the basis of 14 sound science, that risks are minimal, rigorous safe-15 ty measures are in place and will be enforced, and 16 there is a demonstrated ability to mount an effective 17 response to accidents in real-world conditions.".

18 SEC. 2. PROHIBITION ON OIL AND GAS ACTIVITIES IN IM-

19PORTANT ECOLOGICAL AREAS OF OUTER20CONTINENTAL SHELF.

21 Section 18 of the Outer Continental Shelf Lands Act
22 (43 U.S.C. 1344) is amended—

23 (1) in subsection (a)(2)(A), by inserting "sub24 ject to subsection (i)," before "existing"; and

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(2) by adding at the end the following new sub section:

3 "(i) The Secretary may not approve for inclusion in 4 an oil and gas leasing program under this section any area 5 of the outer Continental Shelf that, by itself or in a net-6 work, has distinguishing ecological characteristics, is im-7 portant for maintaining habitat heterogeneity or the via-8 bility of a species, or contributes disproportionately to the 9 health of an ecosystem, including its biodiversity, function, structure, or resilience. In designating an important eco-10 logical area of outer Continental Shelf, the Secretary 11 12 should give particular consideration to—

13 "(1) areas of high productivity or diversity;
14 "(2) areas that are important for feeding, mi15 gration, or the lifecycle of species; and

"(3) areas of biogenic habitat, structure forming habitat, or habitat for endangered or threatened
species.".

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
