3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Anti-Border Corrup-5 tion Act of 2010".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2	Congress makes the following findings:

3	(1) According to the Office of the Inspector
4	General of the Department of Homeland Security,
5	since 2003, 129 U.S. Customs and Border Protec-
6	tion officials have been arrested on corruption
7	charges and, during 2009, 576 investigations were
8	opened on allegations of improper conduct by U.S.
9	Customs and Border Protection officials.
10	(2) To foster integrity in the workplace, estab-
11	lished policy of U.S. Customs and Border Protection
12	calls for—
13	(A) all job applicants for law enforcement
14	positions at U.S. Customs and Border Protec-
15	tion to receive a polygraph examination and a
16	background investigation before being offered
17	employment; and
18	(B) relevant employees to receive a peri-
19	odic background reinvestigation every 5 years.
20	(3) According to the Office of Internal Affairs
21	of U.S. Customs and Border Protection—
22	(A) in 2009, less than 15 percent of appli-
23	cants for jobs with U.S. Customs and Border
24	Protection received polygraph examinations;
25	(B) as of March 2010, U.S. Customs and
26	Border Protection had a backlog of approxi-

3	(C) without additional resources, by the
4	end of fiscal year 2010, the backlog of periodic
5	background reinvestigations will increase to ap-

7	SEC. 3. REQUIREMENTS WITH RESPECT TO ADMIN-
8	ISTERING POLYGRAPH EXAMINATIONS TO
9	LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL OF U.S.
10	CUSTOMS AND BORDER PROTECTION.
11	The Secretary of Homeland Security shall ensure
12	that—
13	(1) by not later than 2 years after the date of
14	the enactment of this Act, all applicants for law en-
15	forcement positions with U.S. Customs and Border
16	Protection receive polygraph examinations before
17	being hired for such a position; and
18	(2) by not later than 180 days after the date
19	of the enactment of this Act, U.S. Customs and Bor-
20	der Protection initiates all periodic background re-
21	investigations for all law enforcement personnel of
22	U.S. Customs and Border Protection that should re-
23	ceive periodic background reinvestigations pursuant
24	to relevant policies of U.S. Customs and Border

Protection in effect on the day before the date of the
enactment of this Act.

3 SEC. 4. PROGRESS REPORT.

Not later than 180 days after the date of the enact-4 5 ment of this Act, and every 180 days thereafter through the date that is 2 years after such date of enactment, the 6 7 Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs 8 9 of the Senate and the Committee on Homeland Security of the House of Representatives a report on the progress 10 11 made by U.S. Customs and Border Protection toward complying with section 3. 12
