1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2 The Congress finds as follows:

3 (1) The terrorist attacks of September 11,
4 2001, and the Gulf Coast hurricanes of 2005 re5 vealed substantial shortcomings in the Nation's abil6 ity to provide for the medical and other health-re7 lated needs of disaster victims when a community's
8 basic medical infrastructure is overwhelmed or sud9 denly compromised.

10 (2) The dental workforce can do much to en-11 hance the Nation's medical surge capacity. Dentists 12 take many of the same core health care courses as 13 do physicians, and their training may even exceed 14 the basic health care curricula of most paramedics 15 and emergency medical technicians. Most dental fa-16 cilities can also be used as decentralized treatment 17 centers and drug storage and distribution sites when 18 hospital facilities become overwhelmed.

19 (3) Most Federal disaster response policies,20 plans, and programs do not reflect the full extent to

1 which dentists and auxiliary dental personnel can 2 contribute to the Nation's medical surge capacity. 3 Dental schools, for example, have at times been de-4 nied Federal public health and medical response 5 training funds on the grounds that dentists are not 6 identified by name in the Federal definitions of "public health worker" and "emergency response 7 8 provider".

9 (4) Dentists and allied dental personnel are 10 often willing to support the medical and public 11 health response to disasters and, with little addi-12 tional training, could easily be incorporated into an 13 all-hazards emergency health care paradigm.

5 "public health or medical" and inserting "public health,
6 medical, or dental".

9 Paragraph (6) of section 2 of the Homeland Security
10 Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 101) is amended by inserting "and
11 dental" after "emergency medical".

12 SEC. 202. NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS SYSTEM.

Subparagraph (B) of section 653(b)(4) of the PostKatrina Emergency Management Reform Act of 2006 (6
U.S.C. 753(b)(4)) is amended by striking "public health
and medical" and inserting "public health, medical, and
dental".

18 SEC. 203. CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER.

Paragraph (5) of section 516(c) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 321e(c)) is amended by striking "medical community" and inserting "medical and dental communities".
