A BILL

To establish programs to provide services to individuals with autism and the families of such individuals, and to increase public education and awareness of autism, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Autism Spectrum Dis-
- 5 orders Services Act of 2011".

1	SEC. 2. INTERAGENCY AUTISM COORDINATING COM-
2	MITTEE.
3	Section 399CC of the Public Health Service Act (42
4	U.S.C. 280i–2) is amended—
5	(1) in subsection (a), by striking "within the
6	Department of Health and Human Services" and in-
7	serting "of Federal agencies";
8	(2) in subsection (b)—
9	(A) in paragraph (1), by inserting "and
10	the families of such individuals" before the
11	semicolon at the end;
12	(B) in paragraph (2)—
13	(i) by inserting ", evaluate, and as-
14	sess" after "monitor"; and
15	(ii) by inserting "and facilitate col-
16	laboration among Federal agencies regard-
17	ing such activities" before the semicolon at
18	the end;
19	(C) in paragraph (3), by inserting "and
20	other appropriate Federal Government depart-
21	ment and agency heads" after "Secretary";
22	(D) in paragraph (4), by inserting "and
23	other appropriate Federal Government depart-
24	ment and agency heads" after "Secretary";
25	(E) in paragraph (5), by inserting "and
26	services and supports for individuals with au-

1	ferences. The Committee shall establish a sub-
2	committee on research on autism spectrum dis-
3	orders, a subcommittee on services and supports for
4	individuals with autism spectrum disorders and the
5	families of such individuals, and such other sub-
6	committees as the Committee determines appro-
7	priate. Such subcommittees shall vote separately on
8	matters within their respective jurisdictions."; and
9	(6) by adding at the end the following:
10	"(f) Report.—Not later than 1 year after the date
11	of enactment of the Autism Spectrum Disorders Services
12	Act of 2011 and annually thereafter, the Comptroller Gen-
13	eral of the United States shall submit a report to Congress
14	concerning the progress of the Federal Government in im-
15	plementing the strategic plan for autism spectrum dis-
16	order research and services and supports for individuals
17	with autism spectrum disorder and the families of such
18	individuals.".
19	SEC. 3. SERVICES FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH AUTISM SPEC-
20	TRUM DISORDERS.
21	Part R of title III of the Public Health Service Act
22	(42 U.S.C. 280i et seq.) is amended—
23	(1) by redesignating section 399EE (relating to
24	authorization of appropriations) as section 399FF;
25	and

1	(2) by inserting after section 399DD the fol-
2	lowing:
3	"SEC. 399EE. PLANNING AND DEMONSTRATION GRANT FOR
4	SERVICES FOR CHILDREN, TRANSITIONING
5	YOUTH, AND ADULTS.
6	"(a) In General.—To assist selected eligible enti-
7	ties in providing appropriate services to children, youth
8	with autism spectrum disorders who are transitioning
9	from secondary education to careers or postsecondary edu-
10	cation (referred to in this section as 'transitioning youth'),
11	adults with autism spectrum disorders, and individuals of
12	any age with autism spectrum disorders who may be at
13	risk due to behavioral and preventable environmental fac-
14	tors, such as wandering (referred to in this section as 'in-
15	dividuals at risk'), the Secretary shall establish—
16	"(1) a one-time, single-year planning grant pro-
17	gram for eligible entities; and
18	"(2) a multiyear service provision demonstra-
19	tion grant program for selected eligible entities.
20	"(b) Purpose of Grants.—Grants shall be award-
21	ed to eligible entities to provide all or part of the funding
22	needed to carry out programs that focus critical aspects
23	of life for children, transitioning youth, and adults with
24	autism spectrum disorders (including adults not eligible

1	for developmental disability services provided by a State),
2	such as—
3	"(1) postsecondary education, peer support, vo-
4	cational training, self-advocacy skills, and employ-
5	ment;
6	"(2) community-based behavioral supports and
7	interventions;
8	"(3) residential services, housing, and transpor-
9	tation;
10	"(4) nutrition, health and wellness, and rec-
11	reational and social activities; and
12	"(5) personal safety for individuals at risk and
13	the needs of individuals with autism spectrum dis-
14	orders who become involved with the criminal justice
15	system.
16	"(c) Eligible Entity.—An eligible entity desiring
17	to receive a grant under this section shall be a State or
18	other public or private nonprofit organization, including
19	a State Council on Developmental Disabilities, as defined
20	in section 102 of the Developmental Disabilities Assist-
21	ance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000.
22	"(d) Planning Grants.—
23	"(1) In general.—The Secretary shall award
24	one-time grants to eligible entities to support the
25	planning and development of initiatives that will ex-

1	pand and enhance service delivery systems for chil-
2	dren, individuals at risk, transitioning youth, and
3	adults with autism spectrum disorders.
4	"(2) Application.—In order to receive such a
5	grant, an eligible entity shall—
6	"(A) submit an application at such time
7	and containing such information as the Sec-
8	retary may require; and
9	"(B) demonstrate the ability to carry out
10	such planning grant in coordination with the
11	applicable State Council on Developmental Dis-
12	abilities and organizations representing or serv-
13	ing individuals with autism spectrum disorders
14	and the families of such individuals.
15	"(e) Implementation Grants.—
16	"(1) In general.—The Secretary shall award
17	grants to eligible entities that have received a plan-
18	ning grant under subsection (d) to enable such enti-
19	ties to provide appropriate services to children, indi-
20	viduals at risk, transitioning youth, and adults with
21	autism spectrum disorders.
22	"(2) Application.—In order to receive a grant
23	under paragraph (1), the eligible entity shall submit
24	an application at such time and containing such in-

formation as the Secretary may require, including—

25

1	"(A) the services that the eligible entity
2	proposes to provide and the expected outcomes
3	for the individuals who receive such services;
4	"(B) the number of individuals who will be
5	served by such grant, including an estimate of
6	the individuals in underserved areas who will be
7	served by such grant;
8	"(C) the ways in which services will be co-
9	ordinated among both public and nonprofit pro-
10	viders of services for children, transitioning
11	youth, and adults with disabilities, including
12	community-based services;
13	"(D) where applicable, the process through
14	which the eligible entity will distribute funds to
15	a range of community-based or nonprofit pro-
16	viders of services, including local governments,
17	and the capacity of such entity to provide such
18	services;
19	"(E) the process through which the eligible
20	entity will monitor and evaluate the outcome of
21	activities funded through the grant, including
22	the effect of the activities upon individuals who

receive such services;

"(F) where applicable, the plans of the eli-1 2 gible entity to coordinate and streamline transi-3 tions from youth to adult services; "(G) the process by which the eligible enti-4 ty will ensure compliance with the integration 6 requirement under section 302 of the Ameri-7 cans With Disabilities Act of 1990; and "(H) a description of how such services 8 9 may be sustained following the grant period. 10 "(f) EVALUATION.—The Secretary shall contract with a third-party organization with expertise in evaluation to evaluate such demonstration grant program and, 12 not later than 180 days after the conclusion of the grant program under subsection (e), submit a report to the Sec-14 retary. The evaluation and report may include an analysis of whether and to what extent the services provided 16 through the grant program described in this section re-17 18 sulted in improved safety, health, education, employment, 19 and community integration outcomes or other measures, 20 as the Secretary determines appropriate. "(g) Administrative Expenses.—Of the amounts 21 22 appropriated to carry out this section, the Secretary shall 23 set aside not more than 7 percent for administrative expenses, including the expenses related to carrying out the evaluation described in subsection (f).

3	ment, not supplant, existing treatments, interventions,

7	FOR AUTISM TREATMENTS, INTERVENTIONS,
8	AND SERVICES.
9	"(a) Establishment of National Technical As-
10	SISTANCE CENTER FOR AUTISM TREATMENTS, INTER-
11	VENTIONS, AND SERVICES.—The Secretary shall award a
12	grant to a national nonprofit organization for the estab-
13	lishment and maintenance of a national technical assist-
14	ance center.
15	"(b) Eligibility.—An organization shall be eligible
16	to receive a grant under subsection (a) if the organiza-
17	tion—
18	"(1) has demonstrated knowledge and expertise
19	in serving children with autism and adults with au-
20	tism and the families of such individuals;
21	"(2) has demonstrated knowledge of how to
22	translate research to practice, and present informa-
23	tion in a way that is easily accessible and under-
24	standable to the family members of individuals with
25	autism;

1	"(3) has demonstrated capacity of training edu-
2	cators, health care providers, family members, and
3	others to support the needs of individuals with au-
4	tism;
5	"(4) has demonstrated capacity of dissemi-
6	nating information throughout the United States;
7	and
8	"(5) has demonstrated capacity to establish and
9	maintain a Web site through which to disseminate
10	information in an easily accessible manner.
11	"(c) Use of Funds.—The national technical assist-
12	ance center established under this section shall—
13	"(1) gather and disseminate information on evi-
14	dence-based treatments, interventions, and services
15	for children with autism and adults with autism, in-
16	cluding best practices in delivering such treatments,
17	interventions, and services, and make this informa-
18	tion available to State agencies with responsibilities
19	under section 399BB(c)(2), local communities, and
20	individuals;
21	"(2) gather and disseminate information on ac-
22	tivities of the Interagency Autism Coordinating
23	Committee established under section 399CC;

1	"(3) provide analysis of activities funded under
2	the Autism Spectrum Disorders Services Act of
3	2011, including—
4	"(A) the effectiveness of State and commu-
5	nity-based models for delivering comprehensive
6	services to individuals with autism;
7	"(B) identification and dissemination of
8	best practices emerging from States, commu-
9	nity-based organizations, nonprofit providers,
10	and local governments receiving demonstration
11	grants under this subpart;
12	"(C) the State-by-State availability of, and
13	gaps in, services for individuals with autism
14	spectrum disorders, including information on
15	services or service gaps in rural areas; and
16	"(D) levels of funding and funding sources
17	of services for individuals with autism spectrum
18	disorders in States;
19	"(4) provide technical assistance to States and
20	organizations funded under this part;
21	"(5) gather and disseminate information about
22	autism spectrum disorders;
23	"(6) establish and maintain a Web site through
24	which to disseminate the information gathered under
25	this section in an easily accessible manner:

5	SEC. 5. GAO STUDY ON SERVICE PROVISION AND FINANC-
6	ING.
7	Not later than 1 year after the date of enactment
8	of this Act, the Comptroller General of the United States
9	shall release a report that examines the following issues:
10	(1) The ways in which autism services and
11	treatments are currently financed in the United
12	States.
13	(2) Current policies for public and private
14	health insurance coverage of autism treatments,
15	interventions, and services.
16	(3) Geographic and regional disparities in provi-
17	sion of services across the lifespan of individuals
18	with autism, levels of community-based versus insti-
19	tutional services, and coverage for such services.
20	(4) Ways in which to improve financing of au-
21	tism treatments, interventions, and services, so as to
22	ensure a minimum level of coverage across the
23	United States.
24	(5) Gaps in financing and availability of serv-
25	ices for adults on the autism spectrum, focusing par-

1	ticularly on the needs of adults not eligible for devel-
2	opmental disability services provided by the State.
3	(6) Areas of need to improve the quality of
4	services available to individuals on the autism spec-
5	trum in cross-disability contexts, such as vocational
6	rehabilitation and centers for independent living.
7	(7) Findings from replicable studies that indi-
8	cate an increased risk of mortality for individuals
9	with autism due to preventable circumstances such
10	as wandering, exposure, drowning, and untreated
11	seizure disorders.

15	appropriated under subsection (i) is less than
16	\$6,700,000, the Secretary shall make grants from
17	such amount to protection and advocacy systems

19	amounts described in paragraph (3).
20	"(2) Appropriations of \$6,700,000 or
21	MORE.—
22	"(A) In General.—With respect to any
23	fiscal year for which the amount appropriated
24	under subsection (i) is \$6,700,000 or more, the

14	"(A) Consortium.—The term 'Consor-
15	tium' means an American Indian Consortium,
16	as defined in section $102(1)$.
17	"(B) State.—The term 'State' means
18	each of the 50 States of the United States, the
19	District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of
20	Puerto Rico.
21	"(C) Territory.—The term 'Territory'
22	means American Samoa, the Commonwealth of
23	the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the
24	United States Virgin Islands.

- 1 "(e) CARRYOVER.—Any amount paid to a protection
- 2 and advocacy system that serves a Consortium, State, or
- 3 Territory for a fiscal year under this section that remains
- 4 unobligated at the end of such fiscal year shall remain
- 5 available to such system for obligation during the next fis-
- 6 cal year for the purposes for which such amount was origi-
- 7 nally provided.
- 8 "(f) DIRECT PAYMENT.—Notwithstanding any other
- 9 provision of law, the Secretary shall pay directly to any
- 10 protection and advocacy system that complies with the
- 11 provisions of this section, the total amount of the grant
- 12 for such system, unless the system provides otherwise for
- 13 such payment.
- 14 "(g) Administrative, Reporting, and Oversight
- 15 REQUIREMENTS.—To the extent practicable, reporting,
- 16 monitoring, program financing, and other administrative
- 17 and oversight requirements established by the Secretary
- 18 under this section shall be consistent with the other ad-

- 20 protection and advocacy system.
- 21 "(h) Annual Report.—Each protection and advo-
- 22 cacy system that receives a payment under this section

"(a) Grants and Technical Assistance.—

11 SEC. 7. REPORT TO CONGRESS.

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Not later than January 1, 2013, and each January 1 thereafter, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall submit to the appropriate committees of Congress a report concerning the implementation of this Act, including the amendments made by this Act.

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
