A BILL

To end the use of body-gripping traps in the National Wildlife Refuge System.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Refuge from Cruel
5 Trapping Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. POSSESSION OR USE OF BODY-GRIPPING TRAP PRO-**
2 **HIBITED.**

3 The National Wildlife Refuge System Administration
4 Act of 1966 (16 U.S.C. 668dd et seq.) is amended by add-
5 ing at the end the following:

6 **“SEC. 6. POSSESSION OR USE OF BODY-GRIPPING TRAP**
7 **PROHIBITED.**

8 “(a) IN GENERAL.—No person may possess or use
9 a body-gripping trap in the System.

10 “(b) ENFORCEMENT PROVISIONS.—Notwithstanding
11 section 4(f), a person who possesses or uses a body-grip-
12 ping trap in the System shall be subject to the following:

13 “(1) In the case of a first offense, a civil fine
14 of not more than \$500 imposed by the Secretary for
15 each body-gripping trap possessed or used.

16 “(2) In the case of a subsequent offense—

17 “(A) a civil fine of not more than \$1,000
18 imposed by the Secretary for each body-grip-
19 ping trap possessed or used;

20 “(B) imprisonment for not more than 180
21 days; or

22 “(C) both a civil fine and imprisonment in
23 accordance with subparagraphs (A) and (B).

24 “(c) FORFEITURE OF BODY-GRIPPING TRAP.—Any
25 body-gripping trap that is possessed or used in violation
26 of this section, and any wildlife captured by the use of

1 such trap, including the pelt or raw fur, shall be subject
2 to forfeiture to the United States in accordance with the
3 provisions of chapter 46 of title 18, United States Code,
4 relating to civil forfeitures.

5 “(d) PAYMENT OF COURT COSTS AND OTHER ASSO-
6 CIATED EXPENSES.—A person found to be in violation of
7 subsection (a) shall pay all court costs associated there-
8 with.

9 “(e) REGULATIONS.—Not later than 120 days after
10 the date of the enactment of this section, the Secretary
11 shall issue any regulations necessary to carry out this sec-
12 tion.

13 “(f) DEFINITION.—As used in this section, the term
14 ‘body-gripping trap’—

15 “(1) means any device that is intended to kill
16 or capture wildlife by physically restraining any part
17 of the animal;

18 “(2) includes any steel-jaw, padded, or other
19 modified leghold trap, kill-type trap, snare trap, or
20 any modified version of any such trap; and

21 “(3) does not include any cage or box trap or
22 suitcase-type live beaver trap.”.
