AN ACT

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2015, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

- 1 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
- 2 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
- 3 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
- 4 30, 2015, and for other purposes, namely:

- 7 Salaries and Expenses
- 8 For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-
- 9 atives, \$1,180,736,000, as follows:
- 10 House Leadership Offices
- 11 For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,
- 12 \$22,278,891, including: Office of the Speaker,
- 13 \$6,645,417, including \$25,000 for official expenses of the
- 14 Speaker; Office of the Majority Floor Leader, \$2,180,048,
- 15 including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Majority
- 16 Leader; Office of the Minority Floor Leader, \$7,114,471,
- 17 including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Minority
- 18 Leader; Office of the Majority Whip, including the Chief
- 19 Deputy Majority Whip, \$1,886,632, including \$5,000 for
- 20 official expenses of the Majority Whip; Office of the Mi-
- 21 nority Whip, including the Chief Deputy Minority Whip,
- 22 \$1,459,639, including \$5,000 for official expenses of the

- 24 Democratic Caucus, \$1,487,258: Provided, That such

- 1 amount for salaries and expenses shall remain available
- 2 from January 3, 2015 until January 2, 2016.

- 6 For Members' representational allowances, including
- 7 Members' clerk hire, official expenses, and official mail,

- 10 STANDING COMMITTEES, SPECIAL AND SELECT
- 11 For salaries and expenses of standing committees,
- 12 special and select, authorized by House resolutions,
- 13 \$123,903,173: Provided, That such amount shall remain
- 14 available for such salaries and expenses until December
- 15 31, 2016, except that \$2,300,000 of such amount shall
- 16 remain available until expended for committee room up-
- 17 grading.
- 18 Committee on Appropriations
- 19 For salaries and expenses of the Committee on Ap-
- 20 propriations, \$23,271,004, including studies and examina-
- 21 tions of executive agencies and temporary personal serv-
- 22 ices for such committee, to be expended in accordance with
- 23 section 202(b) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
- 24 1946 and to be available for reimbursement to agencies
- 25 for services performed: *Provided*, That such amount shall

- 1 remain available for such salaries and expenses until De-
- 2 cember 31, 2016.
- 3 Salaries, Officers and Employees
- 4 For compensation and expenses of officers and em-
- 5 ployees, as authorized by law, \$171,344,864, including:
- 6 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, includ-
- 7 ing the positions of the Chaplain and the Historian, and
- 8 including not more than \$25,000 for official representative
- 9 and reception expenses, of which not more than \$20,000
- 10 is for the Family Room and not more than \$2,000 is for
- 11 the Office of the Chaplain, \$24,009,473; for salaries and
- 12 expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at Arms, including
- 13 the position of Superintendent of Garages and the Office
- 14 of Emergency Management, and including not more than
- 15 \$3,000 for official representation and reception expenses,
- 16 \$11,926,729 of which \$4,344,000 shall remain available
- 17 until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of
- 18 the Chief Administrative Officer including not more than
- 19 \$3,000 for official representation and reception expenses,
- 20 \$113,100,000, of which \$4,000,000 shall remain available
- 21 until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of
- 22 the Inspector General, \$4,741,809; for salaries and ex-
- 23 penses of the Office of General Counsel, \$1,340,987; for
- 24 salaries and expenses of the Office of the Parliamentarian,
- 25 including the Parliamentarian, \$2,000 for preparing the

- 1 Digest of Rules, and not more than \$1,000 for official rep-
- 2 resentation and reception expenses, \$1,952,249; for sala-
- 3 ries and expenses of the Office of the Law Revision Coun-
- 4 sel of the House, \$4,087,587, of which \$1,000,000 shall
- 5 remain available until expended for the completion of the
- 6 House Modernization Initiative; for salaries and expenses
- 7 of the Office of the Legislative Counsel of the House,
- 8 \$8,892,975, of which \$540,000 shall remain available
- 9 until expended for the completion of the House Moderniza-
- 10 tion Initiative; for salaries and expenses of the Office of
- 11 Interparliamentary Affairs, \$814,069; for other author-
- 12 ized employees, \$478,986.

13 Allowances and Expenses

- 14 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House
- 15 resolution or law, \$285,620,336, including: supplies, mate-
- 16 rials, administrative costs and Federal tort claims,
- 17 \$4,152,789; official mail for committees, leadership of-
- 18 fices, and administrative offices of the House, \$190,486;
- 19 Government contributions for health, retirement, Social
- 20 Security, and other applicable employee benefits,
- 21 \$256,635,776, to remain available until March 31, 2016;
- 22 Business Continuity and Disaster Recovery, \$16,217,008
- 23 of which \$5,000,000 shall remain available until expended;
- 24 transition activities for new members and staff,
- 25 \$3,737,000, to remain available until expended; Wounded

- 1 Warrior Program \$2,500,000, to remain available until
- 2 expended; Office of Congressional Ethics, \$1,467,030; and
- 3 miscellaneous items including purchase, exchange, mainte-
- 4 nance, repair and operation of House motor vehicles,
- 5 interparliamentary receptions, and gratuities to heirs of
- 6 deceased employees of the House, \$720,247.
- 7 Administrative Provisions
- 8 Sec. 101. (a) Requiring Amounts Remaining in
- 9 Members' Representational Allowances To Be
- 10 Used for Deficit Reduction or To Reduce the
- 11 Federal Debt.—Notwithstanding any other provision of
- 12 law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for
- 13 "HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND
- 14 Expenses—Members' Representational Allow-
- 15 ANCES" shall be available only for fiscal year 2015. Any
- 16 amount remaining after all payments are made under such
- 17 allowances for fiscal year 2015 shall be deposited in the
- 18 Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no
- 19 Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been
- 20 made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as
- 21 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate).
- 22 (b) Regulations.—The Committee on House Ad-
- 23 ministration of the House of Representatives shall have
- 24 authority to prescribe regulations to carry out this section.

- 6 Sec. 102. None of the funds made available in this
- 7 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of a bill, joint
- 8 resolution, or resolution to the office of a Member of the
- 9 House of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resi-
- 10 dent Commissioner to the Congress) unless the Member
- 11 requests a copy.
- 12 DELIVERY OF CONGRESSIONAL RECORD
- 13 Sec. 103. None of the funds made available by this
- 14 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of any version
- 15 of the Congressional Record to the office of a Member of
- 16 the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or
- 17 Resident Commissioner to the Congress).
- 18 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES
- 19 Sec. 104. None of the funds made available in this
- 20 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of
- 21 the House of Representatives to make any payments from
- 22 any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing
- 23 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-
- 24 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any
- 25 month.

1	LIMITATION ON PRINTED COPIES OF U.S. CODE TO

3	SEC. 105. None of the funds made available by this
4	Act may be used to provide an aggregate number of more
5	than 50 printed copies of any edition of the United States
6	Code to all offices of the House of Representatives.

7	Salaries and Expenses
8	For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compli-
9	ance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional

12	available until September 30, 2016: Provided, That not
13	more than \$500 may be expended on the certification of
14	the Executive Director of the Office of Compliance in con-
15	nection with official representation and reception ex-

18	Salaries and Expenses

3	For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and
