# S. 1073

To amend the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 to improve the coordination of refinery outages, and for other purposes.

Ms. KLOBUCHAR (for herself, Mr. FRANKEN, and Mr. HOEVEN) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

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## A BILL

To amend the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 to improve the coordination of refinery outages, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Gas Price and Refinery  
5 Capacity Relief Act of 2013”.

6 **SEC. 2. COORDINATION OF REFINERY OUTAGES.**

7 Section 804 of the Energy Independence and Security  
8 Act of 2007 (42 U.S.C. 17283) is amended to read as  
9 follows:

1 **“SEC. 804. COORDINATION OF REFINERY OUTAGES.**

2 “(a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

3 “(1) ADMINISTRATOR.—The term ‘Adminis-  
4 trator’ means the Administrator of the Energy In-  
5 formation Administration.

6 “(2) PLANNED REFINERY OUTAGE.—The term  
7 ‘planned refinery outage’ means a removal, sched-  
8 uled before the date on which the removal occurs, of  
9 a refinery, or any unit of a refinery, from service for  
10 maintenance, repair, or modification.

11 “(3) REFINED PETROLEUM PRODUCT.—The  
12 term ‘refined petroleum product’ means any gaso-  
13 line, diesel fuel, fuel oil, lubricating oil, liquid petro-  
14 leum gas, or other petroleum distillate that is pro-  
15 duced through the refining or processing of crude oil  
16 or an oil derived from tar sands, shale, or coal.

17 “(4) REFINERY.—The term ‘refinery’ means a  
18 facility used in the production of a refined petroleum  
19 product through distillation, cracking, or any other  
20 process.

21 “(5) UNPLANNED REFINERY OUTAGE.—The  
22 ‘unplanned refinery outage’ means the removal of a  
23 refinery, or any unit of a refinery, from service that  
24 is not scheduled in advance.

1       “(b) REPORTING REQUIREMENT.—The owner or op-  
2 erator of a refinery shall submit to the Administrator in-  
3 formation describing—

4           “(1) the schedule of the refinery for any  
5 planned refinery outage, including—

6               “(A) the dates for the planned refinery  
7 outage at least 1 year in advance of the date of  
8 the expected outage or the date the outage is  
9 scheduled; and

10              “(B) the estimated inventories and produc-  
11 tion of refined petroleum products during the  
12 period described in subparagraph (A); and

13           “(2) any unplanned refinery outages as soon as  
14 practicable

15       “(c) REVIEW AND ANALYSIS OF AVAILABLE INFOR-  
16 MATION.—The Administrator shall, on an ongoing basis—

17           “(1) review information on planned refinery  
18 outages and unplanned refinery outages—

19               “(A) reported by refineries under sub-  
20 section (b); and

21               “(B) that is available from commercial re-  
22 porting services;

23           “(2) analyze that information to determine  
24 whether the scheduling of a planned refinery outage  
25 or an unplanned refinery outage may nationally or

1 regionally substantially affect the price or supply of  
2 any refined petroleum product by—

3 “(A) decreasing the production of the re-  
4 fined petroleum product; and

5 “(B) causing or contributing to a retail or  
6 wholesale supply shortage or disruption; and

7 “(3) alert the Secretary of any refinery outage  
8 that the Administrator determines may nationally or  
9 regionally substantially affect the price or supply of  
10 a refined petroleum product.

11 “(d) ACTION BY SECRETARY.—On a determination  
12 by the Secretary that a refinery outage may affect the  
13 price or supply of a refined petroleum product, the Sec-  
14 retary shall make available to refinery operators informa-  
15 tion on planned refinery outages or unplanned refinery  
16 outages to prevent significant market disruptions.

17 “(e) LIMITATION.—Nothing in this section—

18 “(1) alters any existing legal obligation or re-  
19 sponsibility of a refinery operator;

20 “(2) creates any legal right of action; or

21 “(3) authorizes the Secretary—

22 “(A) to prohibit a refinery operator from  
23 conducting a planned refinery outage; or

24 “(B) to require a refinery operator to con-  
25 tinue to operate a refinery.

1       “(f) STUDY ON NATIONAL STRATEGIC REFINED PE-  
2 TROLEUM PRODUCTS RESERVE.—

3           “(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days  
4 after the date of enactment of this subsection, the  
5 Secretary shall study and submit to Congress a re-  
6 port on the costs and benefits of creating a national  
7 strategic refined petroleum products reserve for re-  
8 fined petroleum products.

9           “(2) INFORMATION.—The report required  
10 under paragraph (1) shall include information on—

11           “(A) the days of existing storage capabili-  
12 ties within the different petroleum administra-  
13 tion defense districts based on normal usage of  
14 refined petroleum products;

15           “(B) the feasibility of increasing storage  
16 capacity for refined petroleum products on a re-  
17 gional basis; and

18           “(C) the impact additional storage capacity  
19 would have on the retail price of refined petro-  
20 leum products for consumers in the event of a  
21 supply shortage or market disruption from a  
22 natural disaster or refinery outage.”.

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
