A BILL

To authorize the establishment of a body under the National Science and Technology Council to identify and coordinate international science and technology cooperation opportunities.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “International Science
5 and Technology Cooperation Act of 2015”.

6 **SEC. 2. COORDINATION OF INTERNATIONAL SCIENCE AND**
7 **TECHNOLOGY PARTNERSHIPS.**

8 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Director of the Office of
9 Science and Technology Policy shall establish a body
10 under the National Science and Technology Council with
11 the responsibility to identify and coordinate international
12 science and technology cooperation that can strengthen
13 the United States science and technology enterprise, im-
14 prove economic and national security, and support United
15 States foreign policy goals.

16 (b) NSTC BODY LEADERSHIP.—The body estab-
17 lished under subsection (a) shall be co-chaired by senior
18 level officials from the Office of Science and Technology
19 Policy and the Department of State.

20 (c) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The body established under
21 subsection (a) shall—

22 (1) plan and coordinate interagency inter-
23 national science and technology cooperative research
24 and training activities and partnerships supported or
25 managed by Federal agencies and work with other

1 National Science and Technology Council commit-
2 tees to help plan and coordinate the international
3 component of national science and technology prior-
4 ities;

5 (2) establish Federal priorities and policies for
6 aligning, as appropriate, international science and
7 technology cooperative research and training activi-
8 ties and partnerships supported or managed by Fed-
9 eral agencies with the foreign policy goals of the
10 United States;

11 (3) identify opportunities for new international
12 science and technology cooperative research and
13 training partnerships that advance both the science
14 and technology and the foreign policy priorities of
15 the United States;

16 (4) in carrying out paragraph (3), solicit input
17 and recommendations from non-Federal science and
18 technology stakeholders, including universities, sci-
19 entific and professional societies, industry, and rel-
20 evant organizations and institutions; and

21 (5) identify broad issues that influence the abil-
22 ity of United States scientists and engineers to col-
23 laborate with foreign counterparts, including bar-
24 riers to collaboration and access to scientific infor-
25 mation.

1 (d) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—The Director of the Of-
2 fice of Science and Technology Policy shall transmit a re-
3 port, to be updated every 2 years, to the Committee on
4 Science, Space, and Technology and the Committee on
5 Foreign Affairs of the House of Representatives, and to
6 the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation
7 and the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate.
8 The report shall also be made available to the public on
9 the reporting agency’s website. The report shall contain
10 a description of—

11 (1) the priorities and policies established under
12 subsection (c)(2);

13 (2) the ongoing and new partnerships estab-
14 lished since the last update to the report;

15 (3) the means by which stakeholder input was
16 received, as well as summary views of stakeholder
17 input; and

18 (4) the issues influencing the ability of United
19 States scientists and engineers to collaborate with
20 foreign counterparts.

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
