AN ACT

To actively recruit members of the Armed Forces who are separating from military service to serve as Customs and Border Protection officers.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "Border Jobs for Vet-
- 3 erans Act of 2015".

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 5 Congress finds the following:
- 6 (1) Customs and Border Protection officers at 7 United States ports of entry carry out critical law 8 enforcement duties associated with screening foreign 9 visitors, returning United States citizens, and im-10 ported cargo entering the United States.
- 11 (2) It is in the national interest for United 12 States ports of entry to be adequately staffed with 13 Customs and Border Protection officers in a timely 14 fashion, including meeting the congressionally fund-15 ed staffing target of 23,775 officers for fiscal year 16 2015.
 - (3) An estimated 250,000 to 300,000 members of the Armed Forces separate from military service every year.
 - (4) Recruiting efforts and expedited hiring procedures must be enhanced to ensure that individuals separating from military service are aware of, and partake in, opportunities to fill vacant Customs and
- 24 Border Protection officer positions.

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1	SEC. 3. EXPEDITED HIRING OF APPROPRIATE SEPARATING
2	SERVICE MEMBERS.
3	The Secretary of Homeland Security shall consider
4	the expedited hiring of qualified candidates who have the
5	ability to perform the essential functions of the position
6	of a Customs and Border Protection officer and who are
7	eligible for a veterans recruitment appointment authorized
8	under section 4214 of title 38, United States Code.
9	SEC. 4. ENHANCEMENTS TO EXISTING PROGRAMS TO RE-
10	CRUIT SERVICE MEMBERS SEPARATING
11	FROM MILITARY SERVICE FOR CUSTOMS AND
12	BORDER PROTECTION OFFICER VACANCIES.
13	(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-
14	rity, in consultation with the Secretary of Defense, and
15	acting through existing programs, authorities, and agree-
16	ments, where applicable, shall enhance the efforts of the
17	Department of Homeland Security to recruit members of
18	the Armed Forces who are separating from military serv-
19	ice to serve as Customs and Border Protection officers.
20	(b) Elements.—The enhanced recruiting efforts
21	under subsection (a) shall—
22	(1) include Customs and Border Protection offi-
23	cer opportunities in relevant job assistance efforts
24	under the Transition Assistance Program;
25	(2) place U.S. Customs and Border Protection
26	officials or other relevant Department of Homeland

- Security officials at recruiting events and jobs fairs involving members of the Armed Forces who are separating from military service;
 - (3) provide opportunities for local U.S. Customs and Border Protection field offices to partner with military bases in the region;
 - (4) include outreach efforts to educate members of the Armed Forces with Military Occupational Specialty Codes and Officer Branches, Air Force Specialty Codes, Naval Enlisted Classifications and Officer Designators, and Coast Guard competencies that are transferable to the requirements, qualifications, and duties assigned to Customs and Border Protection officers of available hiring opportunities to become Customs and Border Protection officers;
 - (5) identify shared activities and opportunities for reciprocity related to steps in hiring Customs and Border Protection officers with the goal of minimizing the time required to hire qualified applicants;
 - (6) ensure the streamlined interagency transfer of relevant background investigations and security clearances; and
 - (7) include such other elements as may be necessary to ensure that members of the Armed Forces who are separating from military service are aware

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1	of opportunities to fill vacant Customs and Border
2	Protection officer positions.
3	SEC. 5. REPORT TO CONGRESS.
4	(a) In General.—Not later than 180 days after the
5	date of the enactment of this Act, and by December 31
6	of each of the next 3 years thereafter, the Secretary of
7	Homeland Security, in consultation with the Secretary of
8	Defense, shall submit a report to the Committee on Home-
9	land Security and the Committee on Armed Services of
10	the House of Representatives and the Committee on
11	Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs and the
12	Committee on Armed Services of the Senate that includes
13	a description and assessment of the efforts of the Depart-
14	ment of Homeland Security to hire members of the Armed
15	Forces who are separating from military service as Cus-
16	toms and Border Protection officers under section 4.
17	(b) CONTENT.—The report required under subsection
18	(a) shall include—
19	(1) a detailed description of the efforts to im-
20	plement section 4, including—
21	(A) elements of the enhanced recruiting ef-
22	forts and the goals associated with such ele-
23	ments; and
24	(B) a description of how the elements and
25	goals referred to in subparagraph (A) will assist

1	in meeting statutorily mandated staffing levels
2	and agency hiring benchmarks;
3	(2) a detailed description of the efforts that
4	have been undertaken under section 4;
5	(3) the estimated number of separating service
6	members made aware of Customs and Border Pro-
7	tection officer vacancies;
8	(4) the number of Customs and Border Protec-
9	tion officer vacancies filled with separating service
10	members; and
11	(5) the number of Customs and Border Protec-
12	tion officer vacancies filled with separating service
13	members under Veterans Recruitment Appointment
14	authorized under section 4214 of title 38, United
15	States Code.
16	SEC. 6. RULES OF CONSTRUCTION.
17	Nothing in this Act may be construed—
18	(1) as superseding, altering, or amending exist-
19	ing Federal veterans' hiring preferences or Federal
20	hiring authorities; or

- 1 (2) to authorize the appropriation of additional
- 2 amounts to carry out this Act.
