## <sup>114TH CONGRESS</sup> **H. R. 5048**

### **AN ACT**

To require a study by the Comptroller General of the United States on Good Samaritan laws that pertain to treatment of opioid overdoses, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Good Samaritan As-3 sessment Act of 2016".

#### 4 SEC. 2. FINDING.

5 The Congress finds that the executive branch, including the Office of National Drug Control Policy, has a pol-6 7 icy focus on preventing and addressing prescription drug 8 misuse and heroin use, and has worked with States and 9 municipalities to enact Good Samaritan laws that would 10 protect caregivers, law enforcement personnel, and first 11 responders who administer opioid overdose reversal drugs 12 or devices.

## 13 SEC. 3. GAO STUDY ON GOOD SAMARITAN LAWS PER14 TAINING TO TREATMENT OF OPIOID 15 OVERDOSES.

16 The Comptroller General of the United States shall 17 submit to the Committee on the Judiciary of the House 18 of Representatives, the Committee on Oversight and Gov-19 ernment Reform of the House of Representatives, the 20 Committee on the Judiciary of the Senate, and the Com-21 mittee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs 22 of the Senate a report on—

(1) the extent to which the Director of National
Drug Control Policy has reviewed Good Samaritan
laws, and any findings from such a review, including

1 findings related to the potential effects of such laws, 2 if available; 3 (2) efforts by the Director to encourage the en-4 actment of Good Samaritan laws; and (3) a compilation of Good Samaritan laws in ef-5 6 fect in the States, the territories, and the District of 7 Columbia. 8 **SEC. 4. DEFINITIONS.** 9 In this Act— 10 (1) the term "Good Samaritan law" means a 11 law of a State or unit of local government that ex-12 empts from criminal or civil liability any individual 13 who administers an opioid overdose reversal drug or 14 device, or who contacts emergency services providers 15 in response to an overdose; and (2) the term "opioid" means any drug, includ-16 17 ing heroin, having an addiction-forming or addiction-

sustaining liability similar to morphine or being capable of conversion into a drug having such addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability.
