AN ACT

- To amend the Small Business Act to allow small business development centers to assist and advise small business concerns on relevant cyber security matters, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Improving Small Busi-3 ness Cyber Security Act of 2016".

4 SEC. 2. ROLE OF SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CEN-5 TERS IN CYBER SECURITY AND PREPARED-6 NESS.

7 Section 21 of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 648) 8 is amended—

(1) in subsection (a)(1), by striking "and pro-9 10 viding access to business analysts who can refer 11 small business concerns to available experts:" and 12 inserting "providing access to business analysts who 13 can refer small business concerns to available ex-14 perts; and, to the extent practicable, providing as-15 sistance in furtherance of the Small Business Devel-16 opment Center Cyber Strategy developed under sec-17 tion 5(b) of the Improving Small Business Cyber Se-18 curity Act of 2016:"; and 19 (2) in subsection (c)—

20 (A) in paragraph (2)—

21 (i) in subparagraph (E), by striking "and" at the end; 22

23 (ii) in subparagraph (F), by striking 24 the period and inserting "; and"; and

25 (iii) by adding at the end of the fol-26

lowing:

1	"(G) access to cyber security specialists to
2	counsel, assist, and inform small business concern
3	clients, in furtherance of the Small Business Devel-
4	opment Center Cyber Strategy developed under sec-
5	tion 5(b) of the Improving Small Business Cyber Se-
6	curity Act of 2016.".
7	SEC. 3. ADDITIONAL CYBER SECURITY ASSISTANCE FOR
8	SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CENTERS.
9	Section 21(a) of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C.
10	648(a)) is amended by adding at the end the following:
11	"(8) Cyber security assistance.—The De-
12	partment of Homeland Security, and any other Fed-
13	eral department or agency in coordination with the
14	Department of Homeland Security, may leverage
15	small business development centers to provide assist-
16	ance to small businesses by disseminating cyber se-
17	curity risk information and other homeland security
18	information to help small business concerns in devel-
19	oping or enhancing cyber security infrastructure,
20	cyber threat awareness, and cyber training programs
21	for employees.".
22	SEC. 4. CYBER SECURITY OUTREACH FOR SMALL BUSINESS
23	DEVELOPMENT CENTERS.
24	Section 227 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002
25	(6 U.S.C. 148) is amended—

1	(1) by redesignating subsection (l) as subsection
2	(m); and

3 (2) by inserting after subsection (k) the fol-4 lowing:

5 "(1) CYBERSECURITY OUTREACH.—

6 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may lever-7 age small business development centers to provide 8 assistance to small business concerns by dissemi-9 nating information on cyber threat indicators, defen-10 sive measures, cybersecurity risks, incidents, anal-11 yses, and warnings to help small business concerns 12 in developing or enhancing cybersecurity infrastruc-13 ture, cyber threat awareness, and cyber training pro-14 grams for employees.

15 "(2) DEFINITIONS.—For purposes of this sub16 section, the terms 'small business concern' and
17 'small business development center' have the mean18 ing given such terms, respectively, under section 3 of
19 the Small Business Act.".

20 SEC. 5. GAO STUDY ON SMALL BUSINESS CYBER SUPPORT

21 SERVICES AND SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOP22 MENT CENTER CYBER STRATEGY.

23 (a) REVIEW OF CURRENT CYBER SECURITY RE-24 SOURCES.—

1	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Comptroller General of
2	the United States shall conduct a review of current
3	cyber security resources at the Federal level aimed
4	at assisting small business concerns with developing
5	or enhancing cyber security infrastructure, cyber
6	threat awareness, or cyber training programs for
7	employees.
8	(2) CONTENT.—The review required under
9	paragraph (1) shall include the following:
10	(A) An accounting and description of all
11	Federal Government programs, projects, and
12	activities that currently provide assistance to
13	small business concerns in developing or en-
14	hancing cyber security infrastructure, cyber
15	threat awareness, or cyber training programs
16	for employees.
17	(B) An assessment of how widely utilized
18	the resources described under subparagraph (A)
19	are by small business concerns and a review of
20	whether or not such resources are duplicative of
21	other programs and structured in a manner
22	that makes them accessible to and supportive of
23	small business concerns.
24	(3) Report.—The Comptroller General shall
25	issue a report to the Congress, the Administrator of

the Small Business Administration, the Secretary of
 Homeland Security, and any association recognized
 under section 21(a)(3)(A) of the Small Business Act
 containing all findings and determinations made in
 carrying out the review required under paragraph
 (1).

7 (b) SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT CENTER8 CYBER STRATEGY.—

9 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 90 days after
10 the issuance of the report under subsection (a)(3),
11 the Administrator of the Small Business Administra12 tion and the Secretary of Homeland Security shall
13 work collaboratively to develop a Small Business De14 velopment Center Cyber Strategy.

(2) CONSULTATION.—In developing the strategy under this subsection, the Administrator of the
Small Business Administration and the Secretary of
Homeland Security shall consult with entities representing the concerns of small business development
centers, including any association recognized under
section 21(a)(3)(A) of the Small Business Act.

(3) CONTENT.—The strategy required under
paragraph (1) shall include, at minimum, the following:

1	(A) Plans for leveraging small business de-
2	velopment centers (SBDCs) to access existing
3	cyber programs of the Department of Home-
4	land Security and other appropriate Federal
5	agencies to enhance services and streamline
6	cyber assistance to small business concerns.
7	(B) To the extent practicable, methods for
8	the provision of counsel and assistance to im-
9	prove a small business concern's cyber security
10	infrastructure, cyber threat awareness, and
11	cyber training programs for employees, includ-
12	ing—
13	(I) working to ensure individuals are
14	aware of best practices in the areas of
15	cyber security, cyber threat awareness, and
16	cyber training;
17	(ii) working with individuals to de-
18	velop cost-effective plans for implementing
19	best practices in these areas;
20	(iii) entering into agreements, where
21	practical, with Information Sharing and
22	Analysis Centers or similar cyber informa-
23	tion sharing entities to gain an awareness
24	of actionable threat information that may

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1	be beneficial to small business concerns;
2	and
3	(iv) providing referrals to area special-
4	ists when necessary.
5	(c) An analysis of—
6	(I) how Federal Government pro-
7	grams, projects, and activities identified by
8	the Comptroller General in the report
9	issued under subsection $(a)(1)$ can be le-
10	veraged by SBDCs to improve access to
11	high-quality cyber support for small busi-
12	ness concerns;
13	(ii) additional resources SBDCs may
14	need to effectively carry out their role; and
15	(iii) how SBDCs can leverage existing
16	partnerships and develop new ones with
17	Federal, State, and local government enti-
18	ties as well as private entities to improve
19	the quality of cyber support services to
20	small business concerns.
21	(4) Delivery of strategy.—Not later than
22	180 days after the issuance of the report under sub-
23	section (a)(3), the Small Business Development Cen-
24	ter Cyber Strategy shall be issued to the Committees
25	on Homeland Security and Small Business of the

House of Representatives and the Committees on
 Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs and
 Small Business and Entrepreneurship of the Senate.
 (c) DEFINITION.—The term "small business develop ment center" has the meaning given such term in section
 3 of the Small Business Act (15 U.S.C. 632).

7 SEC. 6. PROHIBITION ON ADDITIONAL FUNDS.

8 No additional funds are authorized to be appro-9 priated to carry out the requirements of this Act or the 10 amendments made by this Act. Such requirements shall 11 be carried out using amounts otherwise authorized.
