AN ACT

To repeal the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act and health care-related provisions in the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. REPEAL OF PPACA AND HEALTH CARE-RE-**
2 **LATED PROVISIONS IN THE HEALTH CARE**
3 **AND EDUCATION RECONCILIATION ACT OF**
4 **2010.**

5 (a) PPACA.—Effective on the date that is 180 days
6 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Patient
7 Protection and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111–
8 148) is repealed, and the provisions of law amended or
9 repealed by such Act are restored or revived as if such
10 Act had not been enacted.

11 (b) HEALTH CARE-RELATED PROVISIONS IN THE
12 HEALTH CARE AND EDUCATION RECONCILIATION ACT OF
13 2010.—Effective on the date that is 180 days after the
14 date of the enactment of this Act, title I and subtitle B
15 of title II of the Health Care and Education Reconciliation
16 Act of 2010 (Public Law 111–152) are repealed, and the
17 provisions of law amended or repealed by such title or sub-
18 title, respectively, are restored or revived as if such title
19 and subtitle had not been enacted.

20 **SEC. 2. BUDGETARY EFFECTS.**

21 The budgetary effects of this Act shall not be entered
22 on either PAYGO scorecard maintained pursuant to sec-
23 tion 4(d) of the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010.

24 **SEC. 3. REPORTING REPLACEMENT LEGISLATION.**

25 The Committee on Education and the Workforce, the
26 Committee on Energy and Commerce, the Committee on

1 the Judiciary, and the Committee on Ways and Means of
2 the House of Representatives shall each report to the
3 House of Representatives legislation proposing changes to
4 existing law within each committee's jurisdiction with pro-
5 visions that—

6 (1) foster economic growth and private sector
7 job creation by eliminating job-killing policies and
8 regulations;

9 (2) lower health care premiums through in-
10 creased competition and choice;

11 (3) preserve a patient's ability to keep his or
12 her health plan if he or she likes it;

13 (4) provide people with pre-existing conditions
14 access to affordable health coverage;

15 (5) reform the medical liability system to re-
16 duce unnecessary and wasteful health care spending;

17 (6) increase the number of insured Americans;

18 (7) protect the doctor-patient relationship;

19 (8) provide the States greater flexibility to ad-
20 minister Medicaid programs while reducing costs
21 under such programs;

22 (9) expand incentives to encourage personal re-
23 sponsibility for health care coverage and costs;

1 (10) prohibit taxpayer funding of abortions and
2 provide conscience protections for health care pro-
3 viders;

4 (11) eliminate duplicative government programs
5 and wasteful spending; or

6 (12) do not accelerate the growth of entitlement
7 programs or increase the tax burden on Americans.
