Resolved, That the bill from the House of Representatives (H.R. 710) entitled "An Act to require the Secretary of Homeland Security to prepare a comprehensive security assessment of the transportation security card program, and for other purposes.", do pass with the following

## **AMENDMENT:**

Strike all after the enacting clause and insert the following:

SECTION 1. TRANSPORTATION WORKER IDENTIFICATION 2 CREDENTIAL SECURITY CARD PROGRAM IM-3 PROVEMENTS AND ASSESSMENT. 4 (a) Credential Improvements.— 5 (1) In General.—Not later than 60 days after 6 the date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator 7 of the Transportation Security Administration shall 8 commence actions, consistent with section 70105 of 9 title 46, United States Code, to improve the Transpor-

2	individuals with access to secure areas of vessels and			
3	maritime facilities.			
4	(2) Required actions.—The actions described			
5	under paragraph (1) shall include—			
6	(A) conducting a comprehensive risk anal-			
7	ysis of security threat assessment procedures, in-			
8	cluding—			
9	(i) identifying those procedures that			
10	need additional internal controls; and			
11	(ii) identifying best practices for qual-			
12	ity assurance at every stage of the security			
13	$threat\ assessment;$			
14	(B) implementing the additional internal			
15	controls and best practices identified under sub-			
16	paragraph (A);			
17	(C) improving fraud detection techniques,			
18	such as—			
19	(i) by establishing benchmarks and a			
20	process for electronic document validation;			
21	(ii) by requiring annual training for			
22	Trusted Agents; and			
23	(iii) by reviewing any security threat			
24	assessment-related information provided by			
25	Trusted Agents and incorporating any new			

1	threat information into updated guidance					
2	$under\ subparagraph\ (D);$					
3	(D) updating the guidance provided to					
4	Trusted Agents regarding the vetting process and					
5	related regulations;					
6	(E) finalizing a manual for Trusted Agent					
7	and adjudicators on the vetting process; and					
8	(F) establishing quality controls to ensure					
9	consistent procedures to review adjudication de					
10	cisions and terrorism vetting decisions.					
11	(3) Report.—Not later than 2 years after the					
12	date of enactment of this Act, the Inspector Genera					
13	of the Department of Homeland Security shall submi					
14	a report to Congress that evaluates the implementa					
15	tion of the actions described in paragraph (1).					
16	(b) Comprehensive Security Assessment of the					
17	Transportation Security Card Program.—					
18	(1) In general.—Not later than 60 days after					
19	the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of					
20	Homeland Security shall commission an assessment					
21	of the effectiveness of the transportation security card					
22	program (referred to in this section as "Program")					
23	required under section 70105 of title 46, United					
24	States Code, at enhancing security and reducing secu-					

1	rity risks for facilities and vessels regulated under					
2	chapter 701 of that title.					
3	(2) Location.—The assessment commissioned					
4	under paragraph (1) shall be conducted by a research					
5	organization with significant experience in port or					
6	maritime security, such as—					
7	(A) a national laboratory;					
8	(B) a university-based center within the					
9	Science and Technology Directorate's centers of					
10	excellence network; or					
11	(C) a qualified federally-funded research					
12	and development center.					
13	(3) Contents.—The assessment commissioned					
14	under paragraph (1) shall—					
15	(A) review the credentialing process by de-					
16	termining—					
17	(i) the appropriateness of vetting					
18	standards;					
19	(ii) whether the fee structure ade-					
20	quately reflects the current costs of vetting;					
21	(iii) whether there is unnecessary re-					
22	dundancy or duplication with other					
23	Federal- or State-issued transportation se-					
24	curity credentials; and					

1	(iv) the appropriateness of having var-					
2	ied Federal and State threat assessments					
3	and access controls;					
4	(B) review the process for renewing applica-					
5	tions for Transportation Worker Identification					
6	Credentials, including the number of days					
7	takes to review application, appeal, and waiver					
8	requests for additional information; and					
9	(C) review the security value of the Pr					
10	gram by—					
11	(i) evaluating the extent to which the					
12	Program, as implemented, addresses known					
13	or likely security risks in the maritime and					
14	port environments;					
15	(ii) evaluating the potential for a non-					
16	$biometric\ credential\ alternative;$					
17	(iii) identifying the technology, busi-					
18	ness process, and operational impacts of the					
19	use of the transportation security card and					
20	transportation security card readers in the					
21	maritime and port environments;					
22	(iv) assessing the costs and benefits of					
23	the Program, as implemented; and					
24	(v) evaluating the extent to which the					
25	Secretary of Homeland Security has ad-					

- dressed the deficiencies in the Program

  identified by the Government Accountability

  Office and the Inspector General of the Department of Homeland Security before the

  date of enactment of this Act.
  - (4) Deadlines.—The assessment commissioned under paragraph (1) shall be completed not later than 1 year after the date on which the assessment is commissioned.
- 10 (5) Submission to congress.—Not later than 11 60 days after the date that the assessment is com-12 pleted, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and 13 14 Transportation and the Committee on Homeland Se-15 curity and Governmental Affairs of the Senate and 16 the Committee on Homeland Security and the Com-17 mittee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the 18 House of Representatives the results of the assessment 19 commissioned under this subsection.
- 20 (c) Corrective Action Plan; Program Re-21 Forms.—If the assessment commissioned under subsection 22 (b) identifies a deficiency in the effectiveness of the Pro-23 gram, the Secretary of Homeland Security, not later than 24 60 days after the date on which the assessment is completed, 25 shall submit a corrective action plan to the Committee on

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1	Commerce, Science, and Transportation and the Committee
2	on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the
3	Senate, the Committee on Homeland Security and the Com-
4	mittee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the House
5	of Representatives that—
6	(1) responds to findings of the assessment;
7	(2) includes an implementation plan with bench-
8	marks;
9	(3) may include programmatic reforms, revisions
10	to regulations, or proposals for legislation; and
11	(4) shall be considered in any rulemaking by the
12	Department of Homeland Security relating to the
13	Program.
14	(d) Inspector General Review.—If a corrective ac-
15	tion plan is submitted under subsection (c), the Inspector
16	General of the Department of Homeland Security shall—
17	(1) not later than 120 days after the date of such
18	submission, review the extent to which such plan im-
19	plements the requirements under subsection (c); and
20	(2) not later than 18 months after the date of
21	such submission, and annually thereafter for 3 years,
22	submit a report to the congressional committees set

- 1 forth in subsection (c) that describes the progress of
- 2 the implementation of such plan.
