A BILL

To amend the Communications Act of 1934 to consolidate the reporting obligations of the Federal Communications Commission in order to improve congressional oversight and reduce reporting burdens.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Federal Communica-
5 tions Commission Consolidated Reporting Act of 2015”.

6 **SEC. 2. COMMUNICATIONS MARKETPLACE REPORT.**

7 Title I of the Communications Act of 1934 (47
8 U.S.C. 151 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end the
9 following:

10 **“SEC. 13. COMMUNICATIONS MARKETPLACE REPORT.**

11 “(a) IN GENERAL.—In the last quarter of every even-
12 numbered year, the Commission shall publish on its
13 website and submit to the Committee on Energy and Com-
14 merce of the House of Representatives and the Committee
15 on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the Senate
16 a report on the state of the communications marketplace.

17 “(b) CONTENTS.—Each report required by sub-
18 section (a) shall—

19 “(1) assess the state of competition in the com-
20 munications marketplace, including competition to
21 deliver voice, video, audio, and data services among
22 providers of telecommunications, providers of com-
23 mercial mobile service (as defined in section 332),
24 multichannel video programming distributors (as de-
25 fined in section 602), broadcast stations, providers

1 of satellite communications, Internet service pro-
2 viders, and other providers of communications serv-
3 ices;

4 “(2) assess the state of deployment of commu-
5 nications capabilities, including advanced tele-
6 communications capability (as defined in section 706
7 of the Telecommunications Act of 1996 (47 U.S.C.
8 1302)), regardless of the technology used for such
9 deployment, including whether advanced tele-
10 communications capability is being deployed to all
11 Americans in a reasonable and timely fashion;

12 “(3) assess whether laws, regulations, or regu-
13 latory practices (whether those of the Federal Gov-
14 ernment, States, political subdivisions of States, In-
15 dian tribes or tribal organizations (as such terms are
16 defined in section 4 of the Indian Self-Determination
17 and Education Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 450b)), or
18 foreign governments) pose a barrier to competitive
19 entry into the communications marketplace or to the
20 competitive expansion of existing providers of com-
21 munications services;

22 “(4) describe the agenda of the Commission for
23 the next 2-year period for addressing the challenges
24 and opportunities in the communications market-

1 place that were identified through the assessments
2 under paragraphs (1) through (3); and

3 “(5) describe the actions that the Commission
4 has taken in pursuit of the agenda described pursu-
5 ant to paragraph (4) in the previous report sub-
6 mitted under this section.

7 “(c) EXTENSION.—If the President designates a
8 Commissioner as Chairman of the Commission during the
9 last quarter of an even-numbered year, the portion of the
10 report required by subsection (b)(4) may be published on
11 the website of the Commission and submitted to the Com-
12 mittee on Energy and Commerce of the House of Rep-
13 resentatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science,
14 and Transportation of the Senate as an addendum during
15 the first quarter of the following odd-numbered year.

16 “(d) SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS.—

17 “(1) ASSESSING COMPETITION.—In assessing
18 the state of competition under subsection (b)(1), the
19 Commission shall consider all forms of competition,
20 including the effect of intermodal competition, facili-
21 ties-based competition, and competition from new
22 and emergent communications services, including the
23 provision of content and communications using the
24 Internet.

1 “(2) ASSESSING DEPLOYMENT.—In assessing
2 the state of deployment under subsection (b)(2), the
3 Commission shall compile a list of geographical
4 areas that are not served by any provider of ad-
5 vanced telecommunications capability.

6 “(3) INTERNATIONAL COMPARISONS AND DEMO-
7 GRAPHIC INFORMATION.—The Commission may use
8 readily available data to draw appropriate compari-
9 sons between the United States communications
10 marketplace and the international communications
11 marketplace and to correlate its assessments with
12 demographic information.

13 “(4) CONSIDERING SMALL BUSINESSES.—In as-
14 sessing the state of competition under subsection
15 (b)(1) and regulatory barriers under subsection
16 (b)(3), the Commission shall consider market entry
17 barriers for entrepreneurs and other small busi-
18 nesses in the communications marketplace in accord-
19 ance with the national policy under section 257(b).

20 “(5) CONSIDERING CABLE RATES.—In assess-
21 ing the state of competition under subsection (b)(1),
22 the Commission shall include in each report required
23 by subsection (a) the aggregate average total
24 amount paid by cable systems in compensation

1 under section 325 during the period covered by such
2 report.”.

3 **SEC. 3. CONSOLIDATION OF REDUNDANT REPORTS; CON-**
4 **FORMING AMENDMENTS.**

5 (a) ORBIT ACT REPORT.—Section 646 of the Com-
6 munications Satellite Act of 1962 (47 U.S.C. 765e; 114
7 Stat. 57) is repealed.

8 (b) SATELLITE COMPETITION REPORT.—Section 4 of
9 Public Law 109–34 (47 U.S.C. 703) is repealed.

10 (c) INTERNATIONAL BROADBAND DATA REPORT.—
11 Section 103 of the Broadband Data Improvement Act (47
12 U.S.C. 1303) is amended—

13 (1) by striking subsection (b); and

14 (2) by redesignating subsections (c) through (e)
15 as subsections (b) through (d), respectively.

16 (d) STATUS OF COMPETITION IN THE MARKET FOR
17 THE DELIVERY OF VIDEO PROGRAMMING REPORT.—Sec-
18 tion 628 of the Communications Act of 1934 (47 U.S.C.
19 548) is amended—

20 (1) by striking subsection (g);

21 (2) by redesignating subsection (j) as sub-
22 section (g); and

23 (3) by transferring subsection (g) (as redesign-
24 nated) so that it appears after subsection (f).

25 (e) REPORT ON CABLE INDUSTRY PRICES.—

1 (1) IN GENERAL.—Section 623 of the Commu-
2 nications Act of 1934 (47 U.S.C. 543) is amended—

3 (A) by striking subsection (k); and

4 (B) by redesignating subsections (l)
5 through (o) as subsections (k) through (n), re-
6 spectively.

7 (2) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—Section
8 613(a)(3) of the Communications Act of 1934 (47
9 U.S.C. 533(a)(3)) is amended by striking “623(l)”
10 and inserting “623(k)”.

11 (f) TRIENNIAL REPORT IDENTIFYING AND ELIMI-
12 NATING MARKET ENTRY BARRIERS FOR ENTRE-
13 PRENEURS AND OTHER SMALL BUSINESSES.—Section
14 257 of the Communications Act of 1934 (47 U.S.C. 257)
15 is amended by striking subsection (c).

16 (g) SECTION 706 REPORT.—Section 706 of the Tele-
17 communications Act of 1996 (47 U.S.C. 1302) is amend-
18 ed—

19 (1) by amending subsection (b) to read as fol-
20 lows:

21 “(b) DETERMINATION.—If the Commission deter-
22 mines in its report under section 13 of the Communica-
23 tions Act of 1934, after considering the availability of ad-
24 vanced telecommunications capability to all Americans (in-
25 cluding, in particular, elementary and secondary schools

1 and classrooms), that advanced telecommunications capa-
 2 bility is not being deployed to all Americans in a reason-
 3 able and timely fashion, the Commission shall take imme-
 4 diate action to accelerate deployment of such capability
 5 by removing barriers to infrastructure investment and by
 6 promoting competition in the telecommunications mar-
 7 ket.”;

8 (2) by striking subsection (c);

9 (3) in subsection (d), by striking “this sub-
 10 section” and inserting “this section”; and

11 (4) by redesignating subsection (d) as sub-
 12 section (c).

13 (h) STATE OF COMPETITIVE MARKET CONDITIONS
 14 WITH RESPECT TO COMMERCIAL MOBILE RADIO SERV-
 15 ICES.—Section 332(c)(1)(C) of the Communications Act
 16 of 1934 (47 U.S.C. 332(c)(1)(C)) is amended by striking
 17 the first and second sentences.

18 (i) PREVIOUSLY ELIMINATED ANNUAL REPORT.—

19 (1) IN GENERAL.—Section 4 of the Commu-
 20 nications Act of 1934 (47 U.S.C. 154) is amended—

21 (A) by striking subsection (k); and

22 (B) by redesignating subsections (l)
 23 through (o) as subsections (k) through (n), re-
 24 spectively.

1 (2) CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.—The Commu-
2 nications Act of 1934 is amended—

3 (A) in section 9(i), by striking “In the
4 Commission’s annual report, the Commission
5 shall prepare an analysis of its progress in de-
6 veloping such systems and” and inserting “The
7 Commission”; and

8 (B) in section 309(j)(8)(B), by striking the
9 last sentence.

10 (j) ADDITIONAL OUTDATED REPORTS.—The Com-
11 munications Act of 1934 is further amended—

12 (1) in section 4—

13 (A) in subsection (b)(2)(B)(ii), by striking
14 “and shall furnish notice of such action” and
15 all that follows through “subject of the waiver”;
16 and

17 (B) in subsection (g), by striking para-
18 graph (2);

19 (2) in section 215—

20 (A) by striking subsection (b); and

21 (B) by redesignating subsection (c) as sub-
22 section (b);

23 (3) in section 227(e), by striking paragraph (4);

24 (4) in section 309(j)—

25 (A) by striking paragraph (12); and

1 (B) in paragraph (15)(C), by striking
2 clause (iv);

3 (5) in section 331(b), by striking the last sen-
4 tence;

5 (6) in section 336(e), by amending paragraph
6 (4) to read as follows:

7 “(4) REPORT.—The Commission shall annually
8 advise the Congress on the amounts collected pursu-
9 ant to the program required by this subsection.”;

10 (7) in section 339(c), by striking paragraph (1);

11 (8) in section 396—

12 (A) by striking subsection (i);

13 (B) in subsection (k)—

14 (i) in paragraph (1), by striking sub-
15 paragraph (F); and

16 (ii) in paragraph (3)(B)(iii), by strik-
17 ing subclause (V);

18 (C) in subsection (l)(1)(B), by striking
19 “shall be included” and all that follows through
20 “The audit report”; and

21 (D) by striking subsection (m);

22 (9) in section 398(b)(4), by striking the third
23 sentence;

24 (10) in section 624A(b)(1)—

1 (A) by striking “REPORT; REGULATIONS”
2 and inserting “REGULATIONS”;

3 (B) by striking “Within 1 year after” and
4 all that follows through “on means of assuring”
5 and inserting “The Commission shall issue such
6 regulations as are necessary to assure”; and

7 (C) by striking “Within 180 days after”
8 and all that follows through “to assure such
9 compatibility.”; and

10 (11) in section 713, by striking subsection (a).

11 **SEC. 4. EFFECT ON AUTHORITY.**

12 Nothing in this Act or the amendments made by this
13 Act shall be construed to expand or contract the authority
14 of the Federal Communications Commission.

15 **SEC. 5. OTHER REPORTS.**

16 Nothing in this Act or the amendments made by this
17 Act shall be construed to prohibit or otherwise prevent the
18 Federal Communications Commission from producing any
19 additional reports otherwise within the authority of the
20 Commission.

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
