Mrs. CAPITO, from the Committee on Appropriations, reported the following original bill; which was read twice and placed on the calendar

A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2017, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6 30, 2017, and for other purposes, namely:

3 SENATE
4 EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

5 For expense allowances of the Vice President,
6 \$18,760; the President Pro Tempore of the Senate,
7 \$37,520; Majority Leader of the Senate, \$39,920; Minor-
8 ity Leader of the Senate, \$39,920; Majority Whip of the
9 Senate, \$9,980; Minority Whip of the Senate, \$9,980;
10 Chairmen of the Majority and Minority Conference Com-
11 mittees, \$4,690 for each Chairman; and Chairmen of the
12 Majority and Minority Policy Committees, \$4,690 for each
13 Chairman; in all, \$174,840.

14 REPRESENTATION ALLOWANCES FOR THE MAJORITY
15 AND MINORITY LEADERS

16 For representation allowances of the Majority and
17 Minority Leaders of the Senate, \$14,070 for each such
18 Leader; in all, \$28,140.

12 For expenses of inquiries and investigations ordered
 13 by the Senate, or conducted under paragraph 1 of rule
 14 XXVI of the Standing Rules of the Senate, section 112
 15 of the Supplemental Appropriations and Rescission Act,
 16 1980 (Public Law 96–304), and Senate Resolution 281,
 17 96th Congress, agreed to March 11, 1980, \$133,265,000,
 18 of which \$26,650,000 shall remain available until Sep-
 19 tember 30, 2019.

20 U.S. SENATE CAUCUS ON INTERNATIONAL NARCOTICS

21 CONTROL

22 For expenses of the United States Senate Caucus on
 23 International Narcotics Control, \$508,000.

1 SECRETARY OF THE SENATE

2 For expenses of the Office of the Secretary of the
3 Senate, \$10,250,000 of which \$4,350,000 shall remain
4 available until September 30, 2021 and of which
5 \$4,000,000 shall remain available until expended.

6 SERGEANT AT ARMS AND DOORKEEPER OF THE SENATE

7 For expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at Arms
8 and Doorkeeper of the Senate, \$126,535,000, which shall
9 remain available until September 30, 2021.

12 main available until September 30, 2019.

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

1
2 REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN SENATORS' OFFI-
3 CIAL PERSONNEL AND OFFICE EXPENSE ACCOUNT
4 TO BE USED FOR DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO RE-
5 DUCE THE FEDERAL DEBT

6 SEC. 1. Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
7 any amounts appropriated under this Act under the head-
8 ing "SENATE" under the heading "CONTINGENT EX-
9 PENSES OF THE SENATE" under the heading "SENATORS'
10 OFFICIAL PERSONNEL AND OFFICE EXPENSE ACCOUNT"
11 shall be available for obligation only during the fiscal year
12 or fiscal years for which such amounts are made available.
13 Any unexpended balances under such allowances remain-
14 ing after the end of the period of availability shall be re-
15 turned to the Treasury in accordance with the undesig-
16 nated paragraph under the center heading "GENERAL
17 PROVISION" under chapter XI of the Third Supple-
18 mental Appropriation Act, 1957 (2 U.S.C. 4107) and used
19 for deficit reduction (or, if there is no Federal budget def-
20 icit after all such payments have been made, for reducing
21 the Federal debt, in such manner as the Secretary of the
22 Treasury considers appropriate).

1 AUTHORITY FOR TRANSFER OF FUNDS

2 SEC. 2. Section 3(c)(3) of the Legislative Branch Ap-
 3 propriations Act, 2004 (2 U.S.C. 2108(c)(3)) is amend-
 4 ed—

5 (1) in the paragraph heading, by striking “**and**
 6 **disbursements**” and inserting “**disburse-**
 7 **ments, and transfers**”; and

8 (2) by adding at the end the following:

9 “(D) TRANSFERS.—

10 “(i) IN GENERAL.—The Commission
 11 may transfer amounts in the fund to the
 12 Architect of the Capitol for the cost of the
 13 conservation or restoration, in whole or in
 14 part, by the Architect of the Capitol of
 15 works of art, historical objects, documents,
 16 or material relating to historical matters
 17 placed or exhibited, or to be placed or ex-
 18 hibited, within the Senate wing of the
 19 United States Capitol or any Senate Office
 20 Building.

21 “(ii) AVAILABILITY.—Amounts trans-
 22 ferred to the Architect of the Capitol under
 23 clause (i) shall remain available until ex-
 24 pended.”.

1 ADJUSTMENTS TO COMPENSATION

2 SEC. 3. Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
 3 no adjustment shall be made under section 601(a) of the
 4 Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 (2 U.S.C. 4501)
 5 (relating to cost of living adjustments for Members of
 6 Congress) during fiscal year 2017.

7 JOINT ITEMS

8 For Joint Committees, as follows:

9 JOINT ECONOMIC COMMITTEE

10 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Economic
 11 Committee, \$4,203,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary
 12 of the Senate.

13 JOINT COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

14 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on
 15 Taxation, \$10,095,000, to be disbursed by the Chief Ad-
 16 ministrative Officer of the House of Representatives.

17 For other joint items, as follows:

18 OFFICE OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN

19 For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-
 20 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending
 21 Physician and his assistants, including:

- 22 (1) an allowance of \$2,175 per month to the
 23 Attending Physician;
 24 (2) an allowance of \$1,300 per month to the
 25 Senior Medical Officer;

1 (3) an allowance of \$725 per month each to
2 three medical officers while on duty in the Office of
3 the Attending Physician;

4 (4) an allowance of \$725 per month to 2 assist-
5 ants and \$580 per month each not to exceed 11 as-
6 sistants on the basis heretofore provided for such as-
7 sistants; and

8 (5) \$2,692,000 for reimbursement to the De-
9 partment of the Navy for expenses incurred for staff
10 and equipment assigned to the Office of the Attend-
11 ing Physician, which shall be advanced and credited
12 to the applicable appropriation or appropriations
13 from which such salaries, allowances, and other ex-
14 penses are payable and shall be available for all the
15 purposes thereof, \$3,784,000, to be disbursed by the
16 Chief Administrative Officer of the House of Rep-
17 resentatives.

18 OFFICE OF CONGRESSIONAL ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES

19 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

20 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Congres-
21 sional Accessibility Services, \$1,400,000, to be disbursed
22 by the Secretary of the Senate.

1 CAPITOL POLICE

2 SALARIES

3 For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, in-
4 cluding overtime, hazardous duty pay, and Government
5 contributions for health, retirement, social security, pro-
6 fessional liability insurance, and other applicable employee
7 benefits, \$320,000,000 of which overtime shall not exceed
8 \$35,305,000 unless the Committee on Appropriations of
9 the House and Senate are notified, to be disbursed by the
10 Chief of the Capitol Police or his designee.

11 GENERAL EXPENSES

12 For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, includ-
13 ing motor vehicles, communications and other equipment,
14 security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons,
15 supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensic
16 services, stenographic services, personal and professional
17 services, the employee assistance program, the awards pro-
18 gram, postage, communication services, travel advances,
19 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Fed-
20 eral Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more
21 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the
22 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-
23 resentation and reception expenses, \$67,000,000, to be
24 disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his des-
25 ignee: *Provided*, That, notwithstanding any other provi-

1 sion of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol Police
 2 at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center for fis-
 3 cal year 2017 shall be paid by the Secretary of Homeland
 4 Security from funds available to the Department of Home-
 5 land Security.

6 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

7 ACCEPTANCE AND DISPOSAL OF SURPLUS PROPERTY

8 SEC. 1001. 2 U.S.C. 1906 is amended by inserting
 9 “**and acceptance**” after “**Disposal**” in the title, by
 10 inserting “, including disposed, forfeited, voluntarily aban-
 11 doned and unclaimed property” after “surplus or obsolete
 12 property” and by inserting “and the Capitol Police may
 13 accept the surplus or obsolete property of Federal agencies
 14 upon notification to the Committees on Appropriations of
 15 the House of Representatives and the Senate” after
 16 “method” in subsection (a).

17 OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE

18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compli-
 20 ance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional
 21 Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$3,959,000,
 22 of which \$450,000 shall remain available until September
 23 30, 2018: *Provided*, That not more than \$500 may be ex-
 24 pended on the certification of the Executive Director of

1 the Office of Compliance in connection with official rep-
 2 resentation and reception expenses.

3 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

4 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

5 For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of
 6 the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than
 7 \$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director
 8 of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with offi-
 9 cial representation and reception expenses, \$46,500,000.

10 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

11 CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION AND OPERATIONS

12 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and
 13 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law;
 14 for all necessary expenses for surveys and studies, con-
 15 struction, operation, and general and administrative sup-
 16 port in connection with facilities and activities under the
 17 care of the Architect of the Capitol including the Botanic
 18 Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Senate and
 19 House office buildings, and other facilities under the juris-
 20 diction of the Architect of the Capitol; including fur-
 21 nishings and office equipment; including not more than
 22 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses,
 23 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-
 24 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-
 25 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$92,957,000, of which

1 \$1,368,000 shall remain available until September 30,
2 2021.

3 CAPITOL BUILDING

4 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
5 and operation of the Capitol, \$33,082,000, of which
6 \$9,082,000 shall remain available until September 30,
7 2021.

8 CAPITOL GROUNDS

9 For all necessary expenses for care and improvement
10 of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House
11 office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant,
12 \$11,712,000, of which \$2,000,000 shall remain available
13 until September 30, 2021.

14 SENATE OFFICE BUILDINGS

15 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
16 and operation of Senate office buildings; and furniture and
17 furnishings to be expended under the control and super-
18 vision of the Architect of the Capitol, \$88,406,000, of
19 which \$27,944,000 shall remain available until September
20 30, 2021.

21 CAPITOL POWER PLANT

22 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
23 and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heat-
24 ing, power (including the purchase of electrical energy)
25 and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and

1 House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and
 2 the grounds about the same, Botanic Garden, Senate ga-
 3 rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from
 4 plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government
 5 Publishing Office and Washington City Post Office, and
 6 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-
 7 preme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the
 8 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the
 9 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be
 10 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of
 11 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited
 12 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation,
 13 \$86,646,000, of which \$9,505,000 shall remain available
 14 until September 30, 2021: *Provided*, That not more than
 15 \$9,000,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed to
 16 this appropriation as herein provided shall be available for
 17 obligation during fiscal year 2017.

18 LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

19 For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and
 20 structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library
 21 buildings and grounds, \$42,179,000, of which
 22 \$17,236,000 shall remain available until September 30,
 23 2021.

1 CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS, AND SECURITY

2 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
 3 and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhance-
 4 ments of the United States Capitol Police, wherever lo-
 5 cated, the Alternate Computer Facility, and AOC security
 6 operations, \$29,649,000, of which \$12,500,000 shall re-
 7 main available until September 30, 2021.

8 BOTANIC GARDEN

9 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
 10 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries,
 11 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-
 12 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger
 13 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-
 14 mittee on the Library, \$14,067,000, of which \$4,054,000
 15 shall remain available until September 30, 2021: *Provided*,
 16 That, of the amount made available under this heading,
 17 the Architect of the Capitol may obligate and expend such
 18 sums as may be necessary for the maintenance, care and
 19 operation of the National Garden established under sec-
 20 tion 307E of the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act,
 21 1989 (2 U.S.C. 2146), upon vouchers approved by the Ar-
 22 chitect of the Capitol or a duly authorized designee.

23 CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER

24 For all necessary expenses for the operation of the
 25 Capitol Visitor Center, \$20,557,000.

1 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

2 NO BONUSES FOR CONTRACTORS BEHIND SCHEDULE OR
3 OVER BUDGET

4 SEC. 1101. None of the funds made available in this
5 Act for the Architect of the Capitol may be used to make
6 incentive or award payments to contractors for work on
7 contracts or programs for which the contractor is behind
8 schedule or over budget, unless the Architect of the Cap-
9 itol, or agency-employed designee, determines that any
10 such deviations are due to unforeseeable events, govern-
11 ment-driven scope changes, or are not significant within
12 the overall scope of the project and/or program.

13 SCRIMS

14 SEC. 1102. None of the funds made available by this
15 Act may be used for scrims containing photographs of
16 building facades during restoration or construction
17 projects performed by the Architect of the Capitol.

18 FLAG OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

19 SEC. 1103. (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is estab-
20 lished in the Treasury of the United States a revolving
21 fund to be known as the “Flag Office Revolving Fund”
22 (in this section referred to as the “Fund”) for services
23 provided by the Flag Office of the Architect of the Capitol
24 (in this section referred to as the “Flag Office”).

1 (b) DEPOSIT OF FEES.—The Architect of the Capitol
2 shall deposit any fees charged for services described in
3 subsection (a) into the Fund.

4 (c) CONTENTS OF FUND.—The Fund shall consist of
5 the following amounts:

6 (1) Amounts deposited by the Architect of the
7 Capitol under subsection (b).

8 (2) Any other amounts received by the Archi-
9 tect of the Capitol which are attributable to services
10 provided by the Flag Office.

11 (3) Such other amounts as may be appropriated
12 under law.

13 (d) USE OF AMOUNTS IN FUND.—Amounts in the
14 Fund shall be available for disbursement by the Architect
15 of the Capitol, without fiscal year limitation, for expenses
16 in connection with the services provided by the Flag Of-
17 fice, including—

18 (1) supplies, inventories, equipment, and other
19 expenses;

20 (2) the reimbursement of any applicable appro-
21 priations account for amounts used from such ap-
22 propriations account to pay the salaries of employees
23 of the Flag Office; and

24 (3) amounts necessary to carry out the author-
25 ized levels in the Fallen Heroes Flag Act of 2016.

1 USE OF EXPIRED FUNDS FOR UNEMPLOYMENT

2 COMPENSATION PAYMENTS

3 SEC. 1104. (a) Available balances of expired Archi-
4 tect of the Capitol appropriations shall be available to the
5 Architect of the Capitol for reimbursing the Secretary of
6 Labor for any amounts paid with respect to unemployment
7 compensation payments for former employees of the Ar-
8 chitect of the Capitol, notwithstanding any other provision
9 of law, without regard to the fiscal year for which the obli-
10 gation to make such payments is incurred.

11 (b) This section shall apply with respect to fiscal year
12 2017 and each succeeding fiscal year.

13 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL CONTRACTING

14 SEC. 1105. In addition to recourses available under
15 current policies and procedures, the Architect of the Cap-
16 itol shall establish, document, and follow policies and pro-
17 cedures for suspension and debarment of firms or individ-
18 uals the Architect has determined should be excluded from
19 future contracts. The Architect shall provide for notice to
20 other government agencies of suspension or debarment ac-
21 tions taken via the government-wide excluded parties sys-
22 tem administered by the General Services Administration.
23 The Architect shall consult the list of excluded parties
24 when making responsibility determinations prior to the
25 award of any contract.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For all necessary expenses of the Library of Congress not otherwise provided for, including development and maintenance of the Library's catalogs; custody and custodial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; cleaning, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the Library; preparation and distribution of catalog records and other publications of the Library; hire or purchase of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the Library of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly chargeable to the income of any trust fund held by the Board, \$434,934,000, of which not more than \$6,000,000 shall be derived from collections credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2017, and shall remain available until expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter 1301; 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than \$350,000 shall be derived from collections during fiscal year 2017 and shall remain available until expended for the development and maintenance of an international legal information database and activities related thereto: *Provided*, That the Library of Congress may not obligate or expend any funds derived from collections under the Act of June

1 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for obliga-
 2 tion or expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided fur-*
 3 *ther*, That the total amount available for obligation shall
 4 be reduced by the amount by which collections are less
 5 than \$6,350,000: *Provided further*, That, of the total
 6 amount appropriated, not more than \$12,000 may be ex-
 7 pended, on the certification of the Librarian of Congress,
 8 in connection with official representation and reception ex-
 9 penses for the Overseas Field Offices: *Provided further*,
 10 That of the total amount appropriated, \$8,400,000 shall
 11 remain available until expended for the digital collections
 12 and educational curricula program: *Provided further*,
 13 That, of the total amount appropriated, \$1,300,000 shall
 14 remain available until expended for upgrade of the Legis-
 15 lative Branch Financial Management System: *Provided*
 16 *further*, That, of the total amount appropriated,
 17 \$2,000,000 shall remain available until September 30,
 18 2019, to replace shelving in the Law Library's collection
 19 storage area.

20 COPYRIGHT OFFICE

21 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

22 For all necessary expenses of the Copyright Office,
 23 \$68,825,000, of which not more than \$33,619,000, to re-
 24 main available until expended, shall be derived from collec-
 25 tions credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2017

1 under section 708(d) of title 17, United States Code: *Pro-*
 2 *vided*, That the Copyright Office may not obligate or ex-
 3 pend any funds derived from collections under such sec-
 4 tion, in excess of the amount authorized for obligation or
 5 expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided further*, That
 6 not more than \$5,929,000 shall be derived from collections
 7 during fiscal year 2017 under sections 111(d)(2),
 8 119(b)(3), 803(e), 1005, and 1316 of such title: *Provided*
 9 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation
 10 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are
 11 less than \$39,548,000: *Provided further*, That \$6,147,000
 12 shall be derived from prior year unobligated balances: *Pro-*
 13 *vided further*, That not more than \$100,000 of the amount
 14 appropriated is available for the maintenance of an “Inter-
 15 national Copyright Institute” in the Copyright Office of
 16 the Library of Congress for the purpose of training nation-
 17 als of developing countries in intellectual property laws
 18 and policies: *Provided further*, That not more than \$6,500
 19 may be expended, on the certification of the Librarian of
 20 Congress, in connection with official representation and
 21 reception expenses for activities of the International Copy-
 22 right Institute and for copyright delegations, visitors, and
 23 seminars: *Provided further*, That, notwithstanding any
 24 provision of chapter 8 of title 17, United States Code, any

9 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

10 For all necessary expenses to carry out the provisions
 11 of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
 12 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Anno-
 13 tated Constitution of the United States of America,
 14 \$106,945,000: *Provided*, That no part of such amount
 15 may be used to pay any salary or expense in connection
 16 with any publication, or preparation of material therefor
 17 (except the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued
 18 by the Library of Congress unless such publication has
 19 obtained prior approval of either the Committee on House
 20 Administration of the House of Representatives or the
 21 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate.

22 BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED

23 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

24 For all necessary expenses to carry out the Act of
 25 March 3, 1931 (chapter 400; 46 Stat. 1487; 2 U.S.C.

1 135a), \$50,248,000: *Provided*, That of the total amount
 2 appropriated, \$650,000 shall be available to contract to
 3 provide newspapers to blind and physically handicapped
 4 residents at no cost to the individual.

6 REIMBURSABLE AND REVOLVING FUND ACTIVITIES

7 SEC. 1201. (a) IN GENERAL.—For fiscal year 2017,
 8 the obligational authority of the Library of Congress for
 9 the activities described in subsection (b) may not exceed
 10 \$188,188,000.

11 (b) ACTIVITIES.—The activities referred to in sub-
 12 section (a) are reimbursable and revolving fund activities
 13 that are funded from sources other than appropriations
 14 to the Library in appropriations Acts for the legislative
 15 branch.

16 GOVERNMENT PUBLISHING OFFICE

17 CONGRESSIONAL PUBLISHING

18 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

19 For authorized publishing of congressional informa-
 20 tion and the distribution of congressional information in
 21 any format; expenses necessary for preparing the semi-
 22 monthly and session index to the Congressional Record,
 23 as authorized by law (section 902 of title 44, United
 24 States Code); publishing of Government publications au-
 25 thorized by law to be distributed to Members of Congress;

1 and publishing, and distribution of Government publica-
2 tions authorized by law to be distributed without charge
3 to the recipient, \$79,736,000: *Provided*, That this appro-
4 priation shall not be available for paper copies of the per-
5 manent edition of the Congressional Record for individual
6 Representatives, Resident Commissioners or Delegates au-
7 thorized under section 906 of title 44, United States Code:
8 *Provided further*, That this appropriation shall be available
9 for the payment of obligations incurred under the appro-
10 priations for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years:
11 *Provided further*, That notwithstanding the 2-year limita-
12 tion under section 718 of title 44, United States Code,
13 none of the funds appropriated or made available under
14 this Act or any other Act for printing and binding and
15 related services provided to Congress under chapter 7 of
16 title 44, United States Code, may be expended to print
17 a document, report, or publication after the 27-month pe-
18 riod beginning on the date that such document, report,
19 or publication is authorized by Congress to be printed, un-
20 less Congress reauthorizes such printing in accordance
21 with section 718 of title 44, United States Code: *Provided*
22 *further*, That any unobligated or unexpended balances in
23 this account or accounts for similar purposes for preceding
24 fiscal years may be transferred to the Government Pub-
25 lishing Office Business Operations Revolving Fund for

1 carrying out the purposes of this heading, subject to the
 2 approval of the Committees on Appropriations of the
 3 House of Representatives and Senate: *Provided further*,
 4 That notwithstanding sections 901, 902, and 906 of title
 5 44, United States Code, this appropriation may be used

10 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

11 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

12 For expenses of the public information programs of
 13 the Office of Superintendent of Documents necessary to
 14 provide for the cataloging and indexing of Government
 15 publications and their distribution to the public, Members
 16 of Congress, other Government agencies, and designated
 17 depository and international exchange libraries as author-
 18 ized by law, \$29,500,000: *Provided*, That amounts of not
 19 more than \$2,000,000 from current year appropriations
 20 are authorized for producing and disseminating Congres-
 21 sional serial sets and other related publications for fiscal
 22 years 2015 and 2016 to depository and other designated
 23 libraries: *Provided further*, That any unobligated or unex-
 24 pended balances in this account or accounts for similar
 25 purposes for preceding fiscal years may be transferred to

1 the Government Publishing Office Business Operations
 2 Revolving Fund for carrying out the purposes of this head-
 3 ing, subject to the approval of the Committees on Appro-
 4 priations of the House of Representatives and Senate.

5 GOVERNMENT PUBLISHING OFFICE BUSINESS

6 OPERATIONS REVOLVING FUND

7 For payment to the Government Publishing Office
 8 Business Operations Revolving Fund, \$7,832,000, to re-
 9 main available until expended, for information technology
 10 development and facilities repair: *Provided*, That the Gov-
 11 ernment Publishing Office is hereby authorized to make
 12 such expenditures, within the limits of funds available and
 13 in accordance with law, and to make such contracts and
 14 commitments without regard to fiscal year limitations as
 15 provided by section 9104 of title 31, United States Code,
 16 as may be necessary in carrying out the programs and
 17 purposes set forth in the budget for the current fiscal year
 18 for the Government Publishing Office Business Operations
 19 Revolving Fund: *Provided further*, That not more than
 20 \$7,500 may be expended on the certification of the Direc-
 21 tor of the Government Publishing Office in connection
 22 with official representation and reception expenses: *Pro-*
 23 *vided further*, That the business operations revolving fund
 24 shall be available for the hire or purchase of not more than
 25 12 passenger motor vehicles: *Provided further*, That ex-

penditures in connection with travel expenses of the advisory councils to the Director of the Government Publishing Office shall be deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of title 44, United States Code: *Provided further*, That the business operations revolving fund shall be available for temporary or intermittent services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, but at rates for individuals not more than the daily equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay for level V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of such title: *Provided further*, That activities financed through the business operations revolving fund may provide information in any format: *Provided further*, That the business operations revolving fund and the funds provided under the heading “Public Information Programs of the Superintendent of Documents” may not be used for contracted security services at GPO’s passport facility in the District of Columbia.

SALARIES AND EXPENSES

For necessary expenses of the Government Accountability Office, including not more than \$12,500 to be expended on the certification of the Comptroller General of the United States in connection with official representation and reception expenses; temporary or intermittent services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States

1 Code, but at rates for individuals not more than the daily
2 equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay for level IV of
3 the Executive Schedule under section 5315 of such title;
4 hire of one passenger motor vehicle; advance payments in
5 foreign countries in accordance with section 3324 of title
6 31, United States Code; benefits comparable to those pay-
7 able under sections 901(5), (6), and (8) of the Foreign
8 Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 4081(5), (6), and (8));
9 and under regulations prescribed by the Comptroller Gen-
10 eral of the United States, rental of living quarters in for-
11 eign countries, \$542,405,919: *Provided*, That, in addition,

19 TITLE II

20 GENERAL PROVISIONS

SEC. 201. No part of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-

1 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the
 2 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate
 3 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

4 FISCAL YEAR LIMITATION

5 SEC. 202. No part of the funds appropriated in this
 6 Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year
 7 2017 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

8 RATES OF COMPENSATION AND DESIGNATION

9 SEC. 203. Whenever in this Act any office or position
 10 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of
 11 1929 (46 Stat. 32 et seq.) is appropriated for or the rate
 12 of compensation or designation of any office or position
 13 appropriated for is different from that specifically estab-
 14 lished by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-
 15 ignation in this Act shall be the permanent law with re-
 16 spect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act
 17 for the various items of official expenses of Members, offi-
 18 cers, and committees of the Senate and House of Rep-
 19 resentatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of
 20 the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law
 21 with respect thereto.

22 CONSULTING SERVICES

23 SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation
 24 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-
 25 ment contract, under section 3109 of title 5, United States

1 Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such ex-
 2 penditures are a matter of public record and available for
 3 public inspection, except where otherwise provided under
 4 existing law, or under existing Executive order issued
 5 under existing law.

6 COSTS OF LBFMC

7 SEC. 205. Amounts available for administrative ex-
 8 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates
 9 in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council
 10 (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall
 11 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC
 12 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total
 13 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legisla-
 14 tive branch entities (in such allocations among the entities
 15 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$2,000.

16 LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE

17 SEC. 206. For fiscal year 2017 and each fiscal year
 18 thereafter, the Architect of the Capitol, in consultation
 19 with the District of Columbia, is authorized to maintain
 20 and improve the landscape features, excluding streets, in
 21 Square 580 up to the beginning of I-395.

22 LIMITATION ON TRANSFERS

23 SEC. 207. None of the funds made available in this
 24 Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or in-
 25 strumentality of the United States Government, except

1 pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority pro-
2 vided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

3 GUIDED TOURS OF THE CAPITOL

4 SEC. 208. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b),
5 none of the funds made available to the Architect of the
6 Capitol in this Act may be used to eliminate or restrict
7 guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led
8 by employees and interns of offices of Members of Con-
9 gress and other offices of the House of Representatives
10 and Senate.

11 (b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or
12 at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the
13 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the
14 United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-
15 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended tempo-
16 rarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or re-
17 lated reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the
18 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of
19 the Capitol.

20 This Act may be cited as the “Legislative Branch Ap-
21 propriations Act, 2017”.
