A BILL

To authorize appropriations for fiscal year 2019 for military activities of the Department of Defense and for military construction, to prescribe military personnel strengths for such fiscal year, and for other purposes.

20 strengths for Selected Reserve personnel of the reserve
21 components as of September 30, 2019, as follows:

6 (b) END STRENGTH REDUCTIONS.—The end
7 strengths prescribed by subsection (a) for the Selected Re-
8 serve of any reserve component shall be proportionately
9 reduced by—

10 (1) the total authorized strength of units orga-
11 nized to serve as units of the Selected Reserve of
12 such component which are on active duty (other
13 than for training) at the end of the fiscal year; and

14 (2) the total number of individual members not
15 in units organized to serve as units of the Selected
16 Reserve of such component who are on active duty
17 (other than for training or for unsatisfactory partici-
18 pation in training) without their consent at the end
19 of the fiscal year.

20 (c) END STRENGTH INCREASES.—Whenever units or
21 individual members of the Selected Reserve for any reserve
22 component are released from active duty during any fiscal
23 year, the end strength prescribed for such fiscal year for
24 the Selected Reserve of such reserve component shall be
25 increased proportionately by the total authorized strengths

1 of such units and by the total number of such individual
2 members.

3 **SEC. 414. MAXIMUM NUMBER OF RESERVE PERSONNEL AU-**
4 **THORIZED TO BE ON ACTIVE DUTY FOR**
5 **OPERATIONAL SUPPORT.**

6 During fiscal year 2019, the maximum number of
7 members of the reserve components of the Armed Forces
8 who may be serving at any time on full-time operational
9 support duty under section 115(b) of title 10, United
10 States Code, is the following:

11 (1) The Army National Guard of the United
12 States, 17,000.

13 (2) The Army Reserve, 13,000.

14 (3) The Navy Reserve, 6,200.

15 (4) The Marine Corps Reserve, 3,000.

16 (5) The Air National Guard of the United

10 (a) ACTIVE-DUTY LIST APPOINTMENTS.—Section
 11 533(g) of title 10, United States Code, is amended—

12 (1) in paragraph (1)—

13 (A) in the matter preceding subparagraph

14 (A)—

15 (i) by striking “with cyberspace-re-
 16 lated experience or advanced education”;

17 (ii) by inserting “with advanced edu-
 18 cation, or special experience or training,
 19 related to a designated field” after “of
 20 such Secretary”; and

21 (iii) by striking “critically”;

22 (B) in subparagraph (A)—

23 (i) by striking “in a particular cyber-
 24 space-related field” and inserting “in such
 25 designated field”; and

1 (ii) by striking “operational”; and

2 (C) in subparagraph (B)—

3 (i) by striking “in a cyberspace-re-
4 lated field” and inserting “in such des-
5 ignated field”; and

6 (ii) by striking “operational”;

7 (2) by striking paragraph (2) and inserting the
8 following:

9 “(2) The amount of constructive service cred-
10 ited an officer under this subsection may be up to,
11 but may not exceed, the amount required in order
12 for the officer to be eligible for an original appoint-
13 ment in the grade of colonel in the Army, Air Force,
14 or Marine Corps or captain in the Navy.”; and

15 (3) by striking paragraph (4) and inserting the
16 following new paragraph:

17 “(4) In this subsection, the term ‘designated
18 field’ means any of the following:

19 “(A) Cyberspace.

20 “(B) Any scientific or technical field des-
21 ignated by the Secretary of Defense.

22 “(C) Any other field designated by the
23 Secretary of Defense as being a high-skill, dif-
24 ficult-to-fill field.”.

1 (b) RESERVE ACTIVE-STATUS LIST APPOINT-
2 MENTS.—Section 12207 of such title is amended—

3 (1) in subsection (a)(2), by inserting “or (g)”
4 after “subsection (b)”;

5 (2) in subsection (e), by striking “subsection
6 (b) or (d)” and inserting “subsection (b), (d), or
7 (g)”;

8 (3) by adding at the end the following new sub-
9 section:

10 “(g)(1) Under regulations prescribed by the Sec-
11 retary of Defense, if the Secretary of a military depart-
12 ment determines that the number of commissioned officers
13 serving on the reserve active-status list in an armed force
14 under the jurisdiction of such Secretary with advanced
15 education, or special experience or training, related to a
16 designated field is below the number needed, such Sec-
17 retary may credit any person receiving an original appoint-
18 ment with a period of constructive service for the fol-
19 lowing:

20 “(A) Special experience or training in such des-
21 ignated field if such experience or training is directly
22 related to the needs of the armed force concerned.

23 “(B) Any period of advanced education in such
24 designated field beyond the baccalaureate degree

1 level if such advanced education is directly related to
2 the needs of the armed force concerned.

3 “(2) The amount of constructive service credited an
4 officer under this subsection may be up to, but may not
5 exceed, the amount required in order for the officer to be
6 eligible for an original appointment in the grade of colonel
7 in the Army, Air Force, or Marine Corps or captain in
8 the Navy.

9 “(3) Constructive service credited an officer under
10 this subsection is in addition to any service credited that
11 officer under subsection (a) and shall be credited at the
12 time of the original appointment of the officer.

13 “(4) In this subsection, the term ‘designated field’
14 means any of the following:

15 “(A) Cyberspace.

16 “(B) Any scientific or technical field designated
17 by the Secretary of Defense.

18 “(C) Any other field designated by the Sec-
19 retary of Defense as being a high-skill, difficult-to-
20 fill field.”.

13 (c) DIRECT PAYMENT OF CONSIDERATION TO GOV-
14 ERNMENT CONTRACTORS.—The Secretary may require
15 that any cash consideration to be received under this sec-
16 tion be paid, directly or through the Air Force design/con-
17 struction agent, to the government contractors performing
18 design or construction of the real property improvements

20 (d) PAYMENT OF COSTS OF CONVEYANCES.—

21 (1) The Secretary may require TAA to cover

25 such costs, including survey costs, appraisal costs,
