### **AN ACT**

To improve the security of public areas of transportation facilities, and for other purposes.

### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Securing Public Areas 3 of Transportation Facilities Act of 2018".

6 (1) PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SECTOR STAKE-7 HOLDERS.—The term "public and private sector 8 stakeholders" has the meaning given such term in 9 section 114(u)(1)(C) of title 49, United States Code. 10 (2) SURFACE TRANSPORTATION ASSET.—The 11 term "surface transportation asset" includes facili-12 ties, equipment, or systems used to provide transpor-13

14 (A) a public transportation agency (as 15 such term is defined in section 1402(5) of the 16 Implementing Recommendations of the 9/11 Commission Act of 2007 (Public Law 110–53; 17 18 6 U.S.C. 1131(5)));

19 (B) a railroad carrier (as such term is de-20 fined in section 20102(3) of title 49, United 21 States Code);

(C) an owner or operator of—

23 (i) an entity offering scheduled, fixed-24 route transportation services by over-the 25 road bus (as such term is defined in sec-26 tion 1501(4) of the Implementing Rec-

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ommendations of the 9/11 Commission Act 1 2 of 2007 (Public Law 110–53; 6 U.S.C. 3 1151(4)); or 4 (ii) a bus terminal; or 5 (D) other transportation facilities, equip-6 ment, or systems, as determined by the Sec-7 retary. 8 SEC. 3. PUBLIC AREA SECURITY WORKING GROUP.

9 (a) WORKING GROUP.—The Secretary of Homeland 10 Security shall establish a working group to promote collaborative engagement between the Department of Home-11 land Security and public and private sector stakeholders 12 to develop non-binding recommendations for enhancing se-13 14 curity in public areas of transportation facilities (including 15 facilities that are surface transportation assets), including recommendations regarding the following topics: 16

17 (1) Information sharing and interoperable com18 munication capabilities among the Department of
19 Homeland Security and public and private stake20 holders with respect to terrorist or other threats.

21 (2) Coordinated incident response procedures.

(3) The prevention of terrorist attacks and
other incidents through strategic planning, security
training, exercises and drills, law enforcement pa-

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trols, worker vetting, and suspicious activity report ing.

3 (4) Infrastructure protection through effective 4 construction design barriers and installation of ad-5 vanced surveillance and other security technologies. 6 (b) ANNUAL REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after 7 the establishment of the working group under subsection 8 (a) and annually thereafter for 5 years, the Secretary of 9 Homeland Security shall report to the Committee on 10 Homeland Security of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation 11 12 of the Senate on the working group's organization, partici-13 pation, activities, findings, and non-binding recommendations for the immediately preceding 12-month period. The 14 15 Secretary may publish a public version of such report that describes the working group's activities and such related 16 17 matters as would be informative to the public, consistent 18 with section 552(b) of title 5, United States Code.

(c) INAPPLICABILITY OF THE FEDERAL ADVISORY
COMMITTEE ACT.—The Federal Advisory Committee Act
(5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the working group established under subsection (a) or any subsidiary thereof.
SEC. 4. TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.

24 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-25 rity shall—

1 (1) inform owners and operators of surface 2 transportation assets about the availability of tech-3 nical assistance, including vulnerability assessment 4 tools and cybersecurity guidelines, to help protect 5 and enhance the resilience of public areas of such 6 assets; and

7 (2) subject to the availability of appropriations,
8 provide such technical assistance to requesting own9 ers and operators of surface transportation assets.

10 (b) BEST PRACTICES.—Not later than 1 year after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of 11 12 Homeland Security shall publish on the Department of 13 Homeland Security's website and widely disseminate, as appropriate, best practices for protecting and enhancing 14 15 the resilience of public areas of transportation facilities (including facilities that are surface transportation as-16 17 sets), including associated frameworks or templates for implementation. Such best practices shall be updated peri-18 19 odically.

20 **SEC. 5. REVIEW.** 

(a) REVIEW.—Not later than 1 year after the date
of the enactment of this Act, the Administrator of the
Transportation Security Administration shall submit to
the Committee on Homeland Security of the House of
Representatives and the Committee on Commerce,

1 Science, and Transportation of the Senate a report that 2 includes a review of regulations, directives, policies, and procedures issued by the Administrator regarding the 3 4 transportation of a firearm and ammunition, and, as ap-5 propriate, information on plans to modify any such regulation, directive, policy, or procedure based on such review. 6 7 (b) CONSULTATION.—In preparing the report required under subsection (a), the Administrator of the 8 9 Transportation Security Administration shall consult with the Aviation Security Advisory Committee (established 10 11 pursuant to section 44946 of title 49, United States Code) 12 and appropriate public and private sector stakeholders.
