3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Maritime Border Secu-
- 5 rity Review Act".

5	threat analysis required under subsection (a), the Sec-
6	retary of Homeland Security shall consider and examine
7	the following:
8	(1) Technology needs and challenges.
9	(2) Personnel needs and challenges.
10	(3) The role of State, territorial, and local law
11	enforcement in general border security activities.
12	(4) The need for cooperation among Federal,
13	State, territorial, local, and appropriate international
14	law enforcement entities relating to border security.
15	(5) The geographic challenges of the maritime
16	border.
17	(6) The impact and consequences of Hurricanes
18	Harvey, Irma, Maria, and Nate on general border
19	security activities with respect to the maritime bor-
20	der.
21	(c) Classified Threat Analysis.—To the extent
22	possible, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit
23	the threat analysis required under subsection (a) in un-
24	classified form. The Secretary may submit a portion of

1 the threat analysis in classified form if the Secretary de-

2 termines that such form is appropriate for such portion.
