## **S. 1281**

## AN ACT

To establish a bug bounty pilot program within the Department of Homeland Security, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

## 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Hack the Department
3 of Homeland Security Act of 2017" or the "Hack DHS
4 Act".

5 SEC. 2. DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY BUG BOUN6 TY PILOT PROGRAM.

7 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

8 (1) BUG BOUNTY PROGRAM.—The term "bug 9 bounty program" means a program under which an 10 approved individual, organization, or company is 11 temporarily authorized to identify and report 12 vulnerabilities of Internet-facing information tech-13 nology of the Department in exchange for compensa-14 tion.

15 (2) DEPARTMENT.—The term "Department"
16 means the Department of Homeland Security.

17 (3) INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY.—The term
18 "information technology" has the meaning given the
19 term in section 11101 of title 40, United States
20 Code.

(4) PILOT PROGRAM.—The term "pilot program" means the bug bounty pilot program required
to be established under subsection (b)(1).

24 (5) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means
25 the Secretary of Homeland Security.

26 (b) Establishment of Pilot Program.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall establish, within the Office of the Chief Information Officer, a bug bounty pilot program to minimize vulnerabilities of Internet-facing information technology of the Department.

7 (2) REQUIREMENTS.—In establishing the pilot
8 program, the Secretary shall—

9 (A) provide compensation for reports of 10 previously unidentified security vulnerabilities 11 within the websites, applications, and other 12 Internet-facing information technology of the 13 Department that are accessible to the public;

(B) award a competitive contract to an entity, as necessary, to manage the pilot program
and for executing the remediation of
vulnerabilities identified as a consequence of the
pilot program;

19 (C) designate mission-critical operations
20 within the Department that should be excluded
21 from the pilot program;

(D) consult with the Attorney General on
how to ensure that approved individuals, organizations, or companies that comply with the
requirements of the pilot program are protected

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from prosecution under section 1030 of title 18,
United States Code, and similar provisions of
law for specific activities authorized under the
pilot program;
(E) consult with the relevant offices at the
Department of Defense that were responsible
for launching the 2016 "Hack the Pentagon"
pilot program and subsequent Department of
Defense bug bounty programs;
(F) develop an expeditious process by
which an approved individual, organization, or
company can register with the entity described
in subparagraph (B), submit to a background
check as determined by the Department, and
receive a determination as to eligibility for par-
ticipation in the pilot program; and
(G) engage qualified interested persons, in-
cluding non-government sector representatives,
about the structure of the pilot program as con-
structive and to the extent practicable.
(c) REPORT.—Not later than 180 days after the date
on which the pilot program is completed, the Secretary
of Homeland Security shall submit to the Committee on
Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the Sen-
ate and the Committee on Homeland Security of the

House of Representatives a report on the pilot program,
 which shall include—

3	(1) the number of approved individuals, organi-
4	zations, or companies involved in the pilot program,
5	broken down by the number of approved individuals,
6	organizations, or companies that—
7	(A) registered;
8	(B) were approved;
9	(C) submitted security vulnerabilities; and
10	(D) received compensation;
11	(2) the number and severity of vulnerabilities
12	reported as part of the pilot program;
13	(3) the number of previously unidentified secu-
14	rity vulnerabilities remediated as a result of the pilot
15	program;
16	(4) the current number of outstanding pre-
17	viously unidentified security vulnerabilities and De-
18	partment remediation plans;
19	(5) the average length of time between the re-
20	porting of security vulnerabilities and remediation of
21	the vulnerabilities;
22	(6) the types of compensation provided under
23	the pilot program; and
24	(7) the lessons learned from the pilot program.

 (d) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
 are authorized to be appropriated to the Department
 \$250,000 for fiscal year 2018 to carry out this Act. Passed the Senate April 17, 2018.
