To assist in the conservation of the North Atlantic right whale by supporting and providing financial resources for North Atlantic right whale conservation programs and projects of persons with expertise required for the conservation of North Atlantic right whales, and for other purposes.

### A BILL

To assist in the conservation of the North Atlantic right whale by supporting and providing financial resources for North Atlantic right whale conservation programs and projects of persons with expertise required for the conservation of North Atlantic right whales, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- This Act may be cited as the "Scientific Assistance
- 3 for Very Endangered North Atlantic Right Whales Act of
- 4 2019" or the "SAVE Right Whales Act".

### 5 SEC. 2. FINDINGS; SENSE OF CONGRESS.

- 6 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—
- 7 (1) North Atlantic right whales (Eubalaena
- 8 glacialis) are critically endangered, with no more
- 9 than 425 whales remaining at the time of the intro-
- duction of this Act;
- 11 (2) historically, the North Atlantic right whale
- population was decimated by the whaling industry;
- 13 (3) despite protection from whaling beginning
- in the 1930s, the North Atlantic right whale is one
- of the most endangered whales in the world and has
- experienced a significant decline since 2010;
- 17 (4) the North Atlantic right whale has been
- listed as an endangered species under the Endan-
- 19 gered Species Conservation Act of 1969 (Public Law
- 20 89–669; 80 Stat. 926) and its successor the Endan-
- 21 gered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.)
- since 1970 and is designated as depleted under the
- Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C.
- 24 1361 et seq.);
- 25 (5) because North Atlantic right whales are
- long-lived and highly migratory, and at present rates

- females give birth to a single calf only once every 4 to 10 years, they are highly vulnerable to the impacts of human activity and habitat degradation;
  - (6) North Atlantic right whales frequently cross paths with major shipping lanes and fishing grounds, leaving the whales particularly vulnerable to vessel collisions and fishing gear entanglements, the 2 leading causes of injury and death to the species;
  - (7) even when North Atlantic right whales do not die as a result of fishing gear entanglement, those whales can still experience significant sub-lethal effects such as chronic stress and reproductive failure;
  - (8) in August 2017, the National Marine Fisheries Service announced an Unusual Mortality Event involving North Atlantic right whales in 2017, with 17 known whale deaths that year alone;
  - (9) an Unusual Mortality Event involves a significant die-off of a population and, according to the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. 1361 et seq.), demands an immediate response;
  - (10) based on the current rate of mortality of North Atlantic right whales, and because of the small number of breeding females in the population

- and low birth rates, recent analysis suggests the species will lose its ability to recover in merely a few decades if human-caused mortality is not reduced immediately;
  - (11) under the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. 1361 et seq.), United States fishermen in certain locations have been required to modify their fishing gear and behavior to minimize the likelihood of entanglements, including by using sinking groundlines, having weak links in buoy lines, using multiple traps per buoy, appropriately marking fishing gear, and complying with area closures during North Atlantic right whale migrations;
  - (12) vessels in United States waters that are 65 feet or more in length have been required to comply with a 10-knot speed limit in certain locations during North Atlantic right whale migrations to reduce the threat of vessel collisions; and
  - (13) North Atlantic right whales are now migrating farther north into Canadian waters and in 2017 there were at least 12 North Atlantic right whale deaths in Canada's Gulf of St. Lawrence, in addition to the 8 documented deaths in United States waters in 2017 and 2018.

1	(b) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
2	gress that—
3	(1) the Governments of the United States and
4	Canada must work together to reduce lethal and
5	sub-lethal effects of human activities on North At-
6	lantic right whales; and
7	(2) effectively addressing the threats to the
8	long-term viability of the North Atlantic right
9	whales will require a joint commitment and effort
10	from government entities, local communities, marine
11	scientists and conservationists, fishermen, owners
12	and operators of passenger vessels and others in the
13	shipping industry, and other stakeholders.
14	SEC. 3. PURPOSES.
15	The purposes of this Act are the following:
16	(1) To rebuild healthy populations of the North
17	Atlantic right whale.
18	(2) To assist in the conservation and protection
19	of North Atlantic right whales by supporting North
20	Atlantic right whale conservation programs that
21	minimize conflicts between North Atlantic right
22	whales and human activities.
23	(3) To provide financial resources for those pro-

### 1 TITLE I—NORTH ATLANTIC 2 RIGHT WHALE CONSERVATION

3	SEC. 101. NORTH ATLANTIC RIGHT WHALE CONSERVATION
4	ASSISTANCE.
5	(a) Assistance.—
6	(1) In general.—Subject to the availability of
7	funds and in consultation with other Federal offi-
8	cials, the Secretary of Commerce (in this title re-
9	ferred to as the "Secretary") shall provide competi-
10	tive financial assistance, including multiyear grants,
11	for projects for the conservation of North Atlantic
12	right whales for which project proposals are ap-
13	proved by the Secretary in accordance with this sec-
14	tion.
15	(2) Use of existing authorities.—Assist-
16	ance provided under this section shall be carried out
17	in a manner consistent with authorities available to
18	the Secretary under the Endangered Species Act of
19	1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) and the Marine
20	Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. 1361 et
21	seq.).
22	(b) Project Proposals.—
23	(1) Eligible applicants.—A project proposal
24	may be submitted to the Secretary under this section
25	by—

1	(A) relevant State and tribal agencies, re-
2	search institutions, and nonprofit organizations
3	with expertise required for the conservation of
4	North Atlantic right whales; and
5	(B) any other individual or entity, as de-
6	termined appropriate by the Secretary, with the
7	expertise required for the conservation of North
8	Atlantic right whales, including large whale
9	disentanglement teams approved by the Na-
10	tional Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration
11	and members in good standing of the National
12	Marine Mammal Health and Stranding Re-
13	sponse Program, sectors of the shipping and
14	fishing industries, fishing gear manufacturers,
15	and rope manufacturers.
16	(2) Federal partnership opportunities.—
17	A Federal agency may not be a lead entity or receive
18	funding for a project under this section, but may be
19	included as a partner or collaborator on a project
20	that receives such funding.
21	(3) Required elements.—A project proposal
22	shall include—
23	(A) a statement of the purposes of the
24	project:

1	(B) the name of the entity or individual
2	with overall responsibility for the project;
3	(C) a description of the qualifications of
4	the entity or individuals that will conduct the
5	project;
6	(D) a description of—
7	(i) methods for project implementa-
8	tion and outcome assessment;
9	(ii) staffing and stakeholder engage-
10	ment for the project;
11	(iii) the logistics of the project;
12	(iv) an estimated timeline for the
13	project; and
14	(v) anticipated outcomes of the
15	project;
16	(E) a proposed budget for the funds and
17	time required to complete the project;
18	(F) information regarding the source and
19	amount of matching funding available for the
20	project;
21	(G) information that demonstrates the
22	clear potential of the project to contribute to
23	the conservation of North Atlantic right whales;
24	and

1	(H) any other information that the Sec-
2	retary considers to be necessary for evaluating
3	the eligibility of the project for funding under
4	this Act.
5	(c) Annual Grant Project Proposal Solicita-
6	TION, REVIEW, AND APPROVAL.—
7	(1) In General.—The Secretary shall annu-
8	ally—
9	(A) solicit project proposals for grants
10	under this section;
11	(B) provide to other Federal officials, as
12	appropriate, copies of each proposal submitted
13	in response to the solicitation; and
14	(C) review each such proposal on a time-
15	line that recognizes the urgency of the declining
16	North Atlantic right whale population to deter-
17	mine whether the proposal meets the criteria
18	specified in subsection (d).
19	(2) Consultation; approval or dis-
20	APPROVAL.—Subject to the availability of funds, the
21	Secretary shall, with respect to each project proposal
22	submitted under this section, and after consulting
23	with other Federal officials, as appropriate—

1	(A) consult with respect to the proposal
2	with the government of each State and foreign
3	country in which the project is to be conducted;
4	(B) after taking into consideration any
5	comments resulting from the consultation and
6	any potential losses that could be incurred to
7	the fishing industry as a result of the proposal,
8	approve or disapprove the proposal; and
9	(C) provide written notification of the ap-
10	proval or disapproval to the individual or entity
11	that submitted the proposal, other Federal offi-
12	cials, and each State and foreign country de-
13	scribed in subparagraph (A).
14	(d) Criteria for Approval.—The Secretary may
15	approve a project proposal under this section if the project
16	shows promise for contributing to recovering and sus-
17	taining a viable population of North Atlantic right whales
18	in the wild by assisting efforts to—
19	(1) implement conservation programs;
20	(2) address the unintentional conflicts between
21	humans and North Atlantic right whales through de-
22	velopment, testing, and use of innovative technology
23	or other methods to reduce the lethal and sub-lethal

effects on North Atlantic right whales from vessel

collisions and fishing gear entanglements;

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- (3) promote cooperative projects on such topics
   with foreign governments; or
- (4) promote cooperative projects on such topics
   with affected local communities, small businesses
   such as fishermen, others in the private sector, or
   nongovernmental organizations.
- 7 (e) Priority.—To the extent practicable, in deter-8 mining whether to approve project proposals under this 9 section, the Secretary shall prioritize projects that are de-10 signed to reduce the lethal and sub-lethal effects of human 11 activities on North Atlantic right whales. In prioritizing 12 such projects, the Secretary shall prioritize, among such 13 projects, projects that are cooperative in nature and in-14 clude fishing or shipping sector participants.

### (f) Matching Requirement.—

- (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in paragraph (3), the non-Federal share of the costs of an activity conducted with financial assistance under this section shall be 25 percent of such costs.
- (2) IN-KIND CONTRIBUTIONS.—The Secretary may apply to the non-Federal share of an activity conducted with financial assistance under this section the amount of funds, and the fair market value of property and services, provided by non-Federal sources and used for the activity.

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1 (3) WAIVER OF REQUIREMENTS.—The Sec-2 retary may waive the application of paragraph (1) if 3 the Secretary finds that such waiver is necessary to 4 support a conservation project that the Secretary 5 has identified as of high priority.

### (g) Project Reporting.—

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- (1) IN GENERAL.—Each individual or entity that receives assistance under this section for a project shall submit to the Secretary periodic reports (at such intervals as the Secretary may require) that include all information that the Secretary, after consultation with other government officials, determines is necessary to evaluate the progress and success of the project for the purposes of ensuring positive results, assessing problems, and fostering improvements.
- (2) AVAILABILITY TO THE PUBLIC.—Reports under paragraph (1), and any other documents relating to projects for which financial assistance is provided under this Act, shall be made available to the public in a timely manner.

### 22 SEC. 102. NORTH ATLANTIC RIGHT WHALE INTERAGENCY

- BUDGET.
- 24 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Director of the Office of 25 Management and Budget shall include, in the budget of

- 1 the President submitted to Congress under section
- 2 1105(a) of title 31, United States Code, for fiscal year
- 3 2021 and each fiscal year thereafter, an interagency budg-
- 4 et that displays for each Federal agency that engages in
- 5 North Atlantic right whale activities—
- 6 (1) the amount of appropriations and expendi-
- 7 tures for the preceding fiscal year for such activities
- 8 and a description of such activities;
- 9 (2) the estimated amount to be expended dur-
- ing the current fiscal year for such activities and a
- description of such activities; and
- 12 (3) the amount estimated to be necessary for
- the next fiscal year for such activities and a descrip-
- tion of such activities.
- 15 (b) NORTH ATLANTIC RIGHT WHALE ACTIVITIES
- 16 Defined.—In this section, the term "North Atlantic
- 17 right whale activities" means any activity of a Federal
- 18 agency to study, observe, monitor, manage, protect, con-
- 19 serve, or restore the North Atlantic right whale population
- 20 through direct or indirect means, including through the
- 21 provision of competitive financial assistance to non-Fed-
- 22 eral entities.
- 23 SEC. 103. REPORT TO CONGRESS.
- Not later than 2 years after the date of the enact-
- 25 ment of this Act, and annually thereafter, the Secretary

- 1 shall submit to Congress a report on the results and effec-
- 2 tiveness of projects receiving assistance provided under
- 3 this title, including recommendations concerning how this
- 4 title might be improved and whether funding for this title
- 5 should be continued in the future.

#### 6 SEC. 104. FUNDING.

- 7 (a) Authorization of Appropriations.—
- 8 (1) AUTHORIZATION.—There is authorized to
- 9 be appropriated to the Secretary to carry out this
- 10 title \$5,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2019
- 11 through 2029.
- 12 (2) Administrative expenses.—Of the
- amounts authorized to be appropriated under this
- subsection for a fiscal year, the Secretary may ex-
- pend not more than 5 percent, or up to \$80,000,
- whichever is greater, to pay the administrative ex-
- penses necessary to carry out this Act.
- 18 (3) SUPPLEMENT NOT SUPPLANT.—The
- amount authorized to be appropriated by paragraph
- 20 (1) shall supplement and not supplant other
- amounts available to the Secretary.
- 22 (b) ACCEPTANCE AND USE OF DONATIONS.—The
- 23 Secretary may accept, receive, solicit, hold, administer,
- 24 and use any gift, devise, or bequest to provide assistance
- 25 under section 5.

# 1 TITLE II—CONTINUOUS 2 PLANKTON RECORDER

_	I EMERITATIVE CONDESS.
3	SEC. 201. SURVEY.
4	(a) In General.—Not later than 180 days after the
5	date of the enactment of this Act, and on an ongoing basis
6	thereafter, the Secretary of Commerce shall conduct a con-
7	tinuous plankton recorder survey.
8	(b) REQUIRED ELEMENTS.—For the purpose of con-
9	ducting the survey required under subsection (a), the
10	Northeast Fisheries Science Center shall—
11	(1) to the extent possible, utilize the resources
12	of and partner with, on a volunteer basis, research
13	institutions, nonprofit organizations, commercial ves-
14	sels, and other Federal agencies;
15	(2) in as short a time as possible, ensure rel-
16	evant survey samples and results are analyzed,
17	stored, archived, and made publicly available;
18	(3) prioritize the collection of plankton samples
19	and data that inform the conservation of North At-
20	lantic right whales; and
21	(4) to the extent practicable, coordinate with
22	the Government of Canada to develop a transbound-
23	ary understanding of plankton abundance and dis-
24	tribution

- 1 (c) Authorization of Appropriations.—To carry
- 2 out this section there is authorized to be appropriated to
- 3 the Secretary of Commerce \$300,000 for each of fiscal

4 years 2019 through 2029.

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
