A BILL

To amend the Public Health Service Act to provide grants to support initiatives focused on addressing pediatric public health disparities in children's hospitals graduate medical education programs.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Strengthening our Pe-
- 5 diatric Workforce Act of 2019".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress makes the following findings:

- 1 (1) Our Nation is facing a critical physician 2 shortage.
 - (2) The predicted supply of pediatric medical specialists is not expected to meet demand over the next ten years, which may make it more difficult to provide children with complex or special health conditions the care they need.
 - (3) Research reflects that poverty can have a negative impact on the long-term care outcomes of children. Poverty conditions can contribute to poor nutrition, chronic illness, obesity and delayed development. Ensuring pediatric physicians incorporate anti-poverty initiatives into their medical training can help improve the health of children living in poverty.
 - (4) The purpose of this Act is to provide additional assistance to the Children's Hospital Graduate Medical Education (CHGME) program for the purpose of incorporating initiatives to address pediatric health disparities.

1	SEC. 3. GRANT PROGRAM TO INCORPORATE PEDIATRIC
2	ANTI-POVERTY INITIATIVES INTO RESIDENT

4	Section 340E of the Public Health Service Act (42
5	U.S.C. 256e) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
6	lowing new subsection:
7	"(i) Grant Program To Incorporate Pediatric
8	ANTI-POVERTY INITIATIVES INTO RESIDENT TRAIN-
9	ING.—
10	"(1) In General.—The Secretary, acting
11	through the Administrator of the Health Resources
12	and Services Administration, may, for a year (begin-
13	ning with 2020), make grants to children's hospitals
14	described in paragraph (2) with approved graduate
15	medical residency training programs that are other-
16	wise receiving funding under this section for such
17	year, for the startup costs associated with developing
18	and incorporating initiatives that address pediatric
19	health disparities, including access to care, poverty,
20	opioid overuse, food insecurity, and child abuse.
21	"(2) Children's hospitals described.—For
22	purposes of this subsection, a children's hospital de-
23	scribed in this paragraph is, with respect to a year,
24	a children's hospital that is—

1	"(A) located in an area designated as a
2	health professional shortage area under section
3	332;
4	"(B) receiving payments pursuant to sub-
5	section (h) for such year; and
6	"(C) not receiving a bonus payment under
7	subsection (h)(6)(B) for such year.
8	"(3) Authorization of appropriations.—
9	There is authorized to be appropriated to carry out
10	this subsection, not more than \$10,000,000 for each
11	of fiscal years 2020 through 2027.".

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
