# H.R. 192

## AN ACT

- To establish an interagency program to assist countries in North and West Africa to improve immediate and longterm capabilities to counter terrorist threats, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- This Act may be cited as the "Trans-Sahara Counter-
- 3 terrorism Partnership Act".

### 4 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

- 5 It is the sense of Congress that—
- 6 (1) the Trans-Sahara Counterterrorism Part-
- 7 nership, launched in 2005, is an interagency pro-
- 8 gram to assist partner countries in the Sahel and
- 9 Maghreb regions of Africa on their immediate and
- long-term capabilities to address terrorist threats
- and prevent the spread of violent extremism;
- 12 (2) armed groups and violent Islamist terrorist
- organizations, such as Al Qaeda in the Islamic
- Maghreb, Boko Haram, the Islamic State of West
- 15 Africa, and other affiliated groups, have killed tens
- of thousands of innocent civilians, displaced popu-
- 17 lations, destabilized local and national governments,
- and caused mass human suffering in the affected
- 19 communities;
- 20 (3) it is in the national security interest of the
- United States to combat the spread of radical
- Islamist extremism and build partner countries' ca-
- pacity to combat these threats in Africa;
- 24 (4) extremist movements exploit vulnerable and
- 25 marginalized communities suffering from poverty,

1	lack of economic opportunity (particularly among
2	youth populations), and weak governance; and
3	(5) to address critical security, political, eco-
4	nomic, and humanitarian challenges in these regions
5	of Africa, a coordinated, interagency approach is
6	needed to appropriately allocate resources, share re-
7	sponsibility, de-conflict programs, and maximize the
8	effectiveness of United States defense, diplomatic,
9	and development capabilities.
10	SEC. 3. TRANS-SAHARA COUNTERTERRORISM PARTNER-
11	SHIP.
12	(a) Trans-Sahara Counterterrorism Partner-
13	SHIP.—
14	(1) Establishment.—The Secretary of State,
15	in consultation with the Secretary of Defense and
16	the Administrator of the United States Agency for
17	International Development, shall establish a partner-
18	ship, to be known as the "Trans-Sahara Counterter-
19	rorism Partnership' (TSCTP), to coordinate all
20	United States programs, projects, and activities in
21	North and West Africa that are conducted for any
22	of the following purposes:
23	(A) To build the capacity of foreign mili-
24	tary and law enforcement entities in such re-

- 1 (B) To improve the ability of foreign mili-2 tary and law enforcement entities in such re-3 gions to cooperate with the United States and 4 other partner countries on counterterrorism ef-5 forts.
  - (C) To enhance the border security capacity of partner countries in such regions, including the ability to monitor, restrain, and interdict terrorists.
  - (D) To strengthen the rule of law in such countries, including access to justice, and the ability of the law enforcement entities of such partner countries to detect, disrupt, respond to, investigate, and prosecute terrorist activity.
  - (E) To monitor and counter the financing of terrorism.
  - (F) To further reduce any vulnerabilities among affected populations in such regions to recruitment or incitement of terrorist activities through public diplomacy efforts, such as supporting youth employment, promoting meaningful participation of women, strengthening local governance and civil society capacity, and improving access to economic opportunities and education.

- 1 (G) To support independent, local-lan-2 guage media, particularly in rural areas, to 3 counter media operations and recruitment prop-4 aganda by terrorist organizations.
  - (2) Consultation.—In coordinating programs through the TSCTP, the Secretary of State shall also consult, as appropriate, with the Director of National Intelligence, the Secretary of the Treasury, the Attorney General, the Chief Executive Officer of the United States Agency for Global Media (formerly known as the Broadcasting Board of Governors), and the heads of other relevant Federal departments and agencies.
    - (3) Congressional notification.—Not later than 15 days before obligating amounts for an activity coordinated by the TSCTP pursuant to paragraph (1), the Secretary of State shall submit a notification, in accordance with the requirements of section 634A of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2394–1), that includes the following:
    - (A) The foreign country and entity, as applicable, whose capabilities are to be enhanced in accordance with the purposes specified in paragraph (1).

1	(B) The amount, type, and purpose of sup-
2	port to be provided.
3	(C) An assessment of the capacity of the
4	foreign country or entity to absorb the assist-
5	ance to be provided.
6	(D) The estimated cost and anticipated im-
7	plementation timeline for assistance.
8	(E) As applicable, a description of the ar-
9	rangements to sustain any equipment provided
10	by the activity beyond the completion date of
11	such activity, if applicable, and the estimated
12	cost and source of funds to support such
13	sustainment.
14	(F) The amount, type, statutory authoriza-
15	tion, and purpose of any United States security
16	assistance provided to such foreign country dur-
17	ing the three preceding fiscal years pursuant to
18	authorities under title 10, United States Code,
19	the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C.
20	2151 et seq.), or any other "train and equip"
21	authorities of the Department of Defense.
22	(b) Comprehensive Strategy for Counterter-
23	RORISM EFFORTS.—
24	(1) Development.—Not later than 180 days
25	after the date of enactment of this Act, the Sec-

- retary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of
  Defense and the Administrator of the United States
  Agency for International Development, shall submit
  to the appropriate congressional committees a comprehensive, interagency strategy that—
  - (A) states the objectives of the United States counterterrorism effort in North and West Africa with respect to the use of all forms of United States assistance to counter violent extremism;
  - (B) includes a plan by the Secretary of State for the manner in which programs shall be coordinated by the TSCTP pursuant to subsection (a)(1), including which agency or bureau of the Department of State, as applicable, will be responsible for leading and coordinating each such program; and
  - (C) outlines a plan to monitor and evaluate TSCTP programs and identifies the key indicators that will be used to measure performance and progress under the strategy.
  - (2) SUPPORTING MATERIAL IN ANNUAL BUDG-ET REQUEST.—The Secretary of State shall include, in the budget materials submitted in support of the budget of the President (submitted to Congress pur-

suant to section 1105 of title 31, United States
Code) for each fiscal year beginning after the date
of the enactment of this Act, a description of the re-
quirements, activities, and planned allocation of
amounts requested by the TSCTP.
(c) Monitoring and Evaluation of Programs
AND ACTIVITIES.—
(1) Monitoring and Evaluation.—The Sec-
retary of State, in consultation with the Secretary of
Defense and the Administrator of the United States
Agency for International Development, shall monitor
and evaluate the programs coordinated by the
TSCTP pursuant to subsection (a)(1) in accordance
with the plan outlined pursuant to subsection
(b)(1)(C).
(2) Report.—For the 5-year period beginning
180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act,
the Secretary of State shall submit to the appro-
priate congressional committees an annual report on
monitoring and evaluation efforts pursuant to para-
graph (1) that describes—
(A) the progress made in meeting the ob-
jectives listed in the strategy required by sub-
section (b)(1), including any lessons learned in

carrying out TSCTP programs and activities

1 and any recommendations for improving such 2 programs and activities; (B) the efforts taken to coordinate, de-con-3 4 flict, and streamline TSCTP programs to maximize resource effectiveness; 6 (C) the extent to which each partner coun-7 try has demonstrated the ability to absorb the 8 equipment or training provided in the year pre-9 vious under TSCTP programs, and where appli-10 cable, the ability to maintain and appropriately 11 utilize such equipment provided; 12 (D) the extent to which each partner coun-13 try is investing its own resources to advance the 14 goals described in subsection (a)(1) or dem-15 onstrated a commitment and willingness to co-16 operate with the United States to advance such 17 goals; and 18 (E) the actions taken by the government of 19 each partner country receiving assistance 20 through programs coordinated by the TSCTP 21 to combat corruption, improve transparency 22 and accountability, and promote other forms of 23 good governance. 24 (d) FORM.—The strategy required by subsection

(b)(1) and the report required by subsection (c)(2) shall

- 1 be submitted in unclassified form but may include a classi-
- 2 fied annex.
- 3 (e) Appropriate Congressional Committees De-
- 4 FINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate congres-
- 5 sional committees" means—
- 6 (1) the Committee on Armed Services, the
- 7 Committee on Foreign Affairs, the Committee on
- 8 Appropriations, and the Permanent Select Com-
- 9 mittee on Intelligence of the House of Representa-
- tives; and
- 11 (2) the Committee on Armed Services, the
- 12 Committee on Foreign Relations, the Committee on
- Appropriations, and the Select Committee on Intel-
- ligence of the Senate.
