AN ACT

To authorize an AI Center of Excellence within the General Services Administration, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited as the "AI in Government Act
3	of 2020".
4	SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
5	In this Act—
6	(1) the term "Administrator" means the Ad-
7	ministrator of General Services;
8	(2) the term "agency" has the meaning given
9	the term in section 3502 of title 44, United States
10	Code;
11	(3) the term "AI CoE" means the AI Center of
12	Excellence described in section 3;
13	(4) the term "artificial intelligence" has the
14	meaning given the term in section 238(g) of the
15	John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act
16	for Fiscal Year 2019 (10 U.S.C. 2358 note);
17	(5) the term "Director" means the Director of
18	the Office of Management and Budget;
19	(6) the term "institution of higher education"
20	has the meaning given the term in section 101 of the
21	Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1001);
22	and
23	(7) the term "nonprofit organization" means an
24	organization described in section 501(c)(3)of the In-
25	ternal Revenue Code of 1986 and exempt from tax-
26	ation under section 501(a) of that Code.

1 SEC. 3. AI CENTER OF EXCELLENCE.

2	(a) IN GENERAL.—There is created within the Gen-
3	eral Services Administration a program to be known as
4	the "AI Center of Excellence", which shall—
5	(1) facilitate the adoption of artificial intel-
6	ligence technologies in the Federal Government;
7	(2) improve cohesion and competency in the
8	adoption and use of artificial intelligence within the
9	Federal Government; and
10	(3) carry out paragraphs (1) and (2) for the
11	purposes of benefitting the public and enhancing the
12	productivity and efficiency of Federal Government
13	operations.
14	(b) Duties.—The duties of the AI CoE shall in-
15	clude—
16	(1) regularly convening individuals from agen-
17	cies, industry, Federal laboratories, nonprofit organi-
18	zations, institutions of higher education, and other
19	entities to discuss recent developments in artificial
20	intelligence, including the dissemination of informa-
21	tion regarding programs, pilots, and other initiatives
22	at agencies, as well as recent trends and relevant in-
23	formation on the understanding, adoption, and use
24	of artificial intelligence;
25	(2) collecting, aggregating, and publishing on a
26	publicly available website information regarding pro-

- grams, pilots, and other initiatives led by other agencies and any other information determined appropriate by the Administrator;
 - (3) advising the Administrator, the Director, and agencies on the acquisition and use of artificial intelligence through technical insight and expertise, as needed;
 - (4) assist agencies in applying Federal policies regarding the management and use of data in applications of artificial intelligence;
 - (5) consulting with agencies, including the Department of Defense, the Department of Commerce, the Department of Energy, the Department of Homeland Security, the Office of Management and Budget, the Office of the Director of National Intelligence, and the National Science Foundation, that operate programs, create standards and guidelines, or otherwise fund internal projects or coordinate between the public and private sectors relating to artificial intelligence;
 - (6) advising the Director on developing policy related to the use of artificial intelligence by agencies; and
- (7) advising the Director of the Office of
 Science and Technology Policy on developing policy

- related to research and national investment in artificial intelligence.
- 3 (c) Staff.—
- 4 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator shall pro-5 vide necessary staff, resources, and administrative 6 support for the AI CoE.
- 7 (2) SHARED STAFF.—To the maximum extent 8 practicable, the Administrator shall meet the re-9 quirements described under paragraph (1) by using 10 staff of the General Services Administration, includ-11 ing those from other agency centers of excellence, 12 and detailees, on a reimbursable or nonreimbursable 13 basis, from other agencies.
- 14 (3) Fellows.—The Administrator may, to the 15 maximum extent practicable, appoint fellows to par-16 ticipate in the AI CoE from nonprofit organizations, 17 think tanks, institutions of higher education, and in-18 dustry.
- 19 (d) SUNSET.—This section shall cease to be effective 20 on the date that is 5 years after the date of enactment 21 of this Act.
- 22 SEC. 4. GUIDANCE FOR AGENCY USE OF ARTIFICIAL INTEL-
- 23 LIGENCE.
- 24 (a) GUIDANCE.—Not later than 270 days after the 25 date of enactment of this Act, the Director, in coordina-

- 1 tion with the Director of the Office of Science and Tech-
- 2 nology Policy in consultation with the Administrator and
- 3 any other relevant agencies and key stakeholders as deter-
- 4 mined by the Director, shall issue a memorandum to the
- 5 head of each agency that shall—

of such technology;

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- 6 (1) inform the development of policies regarding
 7 Federal acquisition and use by agencies regarding
 8 technologies that are empowered or enabled by arti9 ficial intelligence, including an identification of the
 10 responsibilities of agency officials managing the use
 - (2) recommend approaches to remove barriers for use by agencies of artificial intelligence technologies in order to promote the innovative application of those technologies while protecting civil liberties, civil rights, and economic and national security;
 - (3) identify best practices for identifying, assessing, and mitigating any discriminatory impact or bias on the basis of any classification protected under Federal nondiscrimination laws, or any unintended consequence of the use of artificial intelligence, including policies to identify data used to train artificial intelligence algorithms as well as the

- data analyzed by artificial intelligence used by the
- 2 agencies; and
- 3 (4) provide a template of the required contents
- 4 of the agency plans described in subsection (c).
- 5 (b) Public Comment.—To help ensure public trust
- 6 in the applications of artificial intelligence technologies,
- 7 the Director shall issue a draft version of the memo-
- 8 randum required under subsection (a) for public comment
- 9 not later than 180 days after date of enactment of this
- 10 Act.
- 11 (c) Plans.—Not later than 180 days after the date
- 12 on which the Director issues the memorandum required
- 13 under subsection (a) or an update to the memorandum
- 14 required under subsection (d), the head of each agency
- 15 shall submit to the Director and post on a publicly avail-
- 16 able page on the website of the agency—
- 17 (1) a plan to achieve consistency with the
- 18 memorandum; or
- 19 (2) a written determination that the agency
- does not use and does not anticipate using artificial
- 21 intelligence.
- 22 (d) UPDATES.—Not later than 2 years after the date
- 23 on which the Director issues the memorandum required
- 24 under subsection (a), and every 2 years thereafter for 10

1	years, the Director shall issue updates to the memo-
2	randum.
3	SEC. 5. UPDATE OF OCCUPATIONAL SERIES FOR ARTIFI-
4	CIAL INTELLIGENCE.
5	(a) In General.—Not later than 18 months after
6	the date of enactment of this Act, and in accordance with
7	chapter 51 of title 5, United States Code, the Director
8	of the Office of Personnel Management shall—
9	(1) identify key skills and competencies needed
10	for positions related to artificial intelligence;
11	(2) establish an occupational series, or update
12	and improve an existing occupational job series, to
13	include positions the primary duties of which relate
14	to artificial intelligence;
15	(3) to the extent appropriate, establish an esti-
16	mate of the number of Federal employees in posi-
17	tions related to artificial intelligence, by each agen-
18	ey; and
19	(4) using the estimate established in paragraph
20	(3), prepare a 2-year and 5-year forecast of the
21	number of Federal employees in positions related to
22	artificial intelligence that each agency will need to
23	employ.
24	(b) Plan.—Not later than 120 days after the date
25	of enactment of this Act, the Director of the Office of Per-

- 1 sonnel Management shall submit to the Committee on
- 2 Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the Sen-
- 3 ate and the Committee on Oversight and Reform of the
- 4 House of Representatives a comprehensive plan with a
- 5 timeline to complete requirements described in subsection
- 6 (a).
