To amend the Older Americans Act of 1965 to authorize appropriations for fiscal years 2020 through 2024, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **TITLE I—ENSURING COLLABO-** 2 **RATION AND PROMOTING** 3 **INDEPENDENCE FOR OLDER** 4 **INDIVIDUALS**

5 **SEC. 101. PERSON-CENTERED, TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE.**

6 Section 101(2) of the Older Americans Act of 1965
 7 (42 U.S.C. 3001(2)) is amended by inserting “(including
 8 access to person-centered, trauma-informed care)” after
 9 “health”.

1 **SEC. 102. VACCINATION.**

2 Section 102(14) of the Older Americans Act of 1965
3 (42 U.S.C. 3002(14)) is amended—

4 (1) in subparagraph (B) by inserting “immuni-
5 zation status,” after “oral health,”; and

6 (2) in subparagraph (D) by inserting “infec-
7 tious disease, and vaccine preventable disease,” after
8 “disease),”.

9 **SEC. 103. FUNCTIONS OF ASSISTANT SECRETARY.**

10 (a) REVIEW OF APPLICATIONS.— Section 202 of the
11 Older Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3012) is amend-
12 ed—

13 (1) by amending subsection (a)(4) to read as
14 follows:

15 “(4) administer the grants provided by this Act
16 but not approve an application submitted by an ap-
17 plicant for a grant for a program for which such ap-
18 plicant previously received a grant unless the Assist-
19 ant Secretary determines—

20 “(A) the program for which such applica-
21 tion was submitted is operating effectively to
22 achieve its stated purpose; and

23 “(B) such applicant complied with the as-
24 surances provided to the Assistant Secretary
25 with the application for such previous grant;
26 and”;

1 (2) by adding at the end the following:

2 “(h) The Assistant Secretary shall publish, on an an-
3 nual basis, a list of centers and demonstration projects
4 funded under each title of the Act. The Assistant Sec-
5 retary shall ensure that this information is also directly
6 provided to States and area agencies on aging.”.

7 (b) ADDRESSING THE NEEDS OF OLDER INDIVID-
8 UALS IN DISASTERS.—Section 202(a) of the Older Ameri-
9 cans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3012(a)) is amended—

10 (1) in paragraph (30) by striking “and” at the
11 end;

12 (2) in paragraph (31) by striking the period at
13 the end and inserting “; and”; and

14 (3) by adding at the end the following:

15 “(32) provide technical assistance to and share
16 best practices with States and area agencies on
17 aging on how to collaborate and coordinate activities
18 and develop long-range emergency preparedness
19 plans with local and State emergency response agen-
20 cies, relief organizations, local and State govern-
21 ments, federal agencies as appropriate, and any
22 other institutions that have responsibility for dis-
23 aster relief service delivery.”.

1 **SEC. 104. PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS FOR NUTRITION OF-**
2 **FICIAL UNDER ASSISTANT SECRETARY.**

3 Section 205(a)(2)(C)(ii) of the Older Americans Act
4 of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3016(a)(2)(C)(ii) is amended to read
5 as follows:

6 “(ii) be a registered dietitian or registered dieti-
7 tian nutritionist.”.

8 **SEC. 105. INTERAGENCY COORDINATING COMMITTEE ON**
9 **AGE-FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES.**

10 Section 203 of the Older Americans Act of 1965 (42
11 U.S.C. 3013) is amended—

12 (1) in subsection (b)—

13 (A) in paragraph (18) by striking “and” at
14 the end;

15 (B) in subparagraph (19) by striking the
16 period at the end, and inserting “, and”; and

17 (C) by adding at the end the following:

18 “(20) section 393D of the Public Health Serv-
19 ice Act (42 U.S.C. 280b-1f), relating to safety of
20 seniors.”; and

21 (2) in subsection (c)—

22 (A) in paragraph (1)—

23 (i) by striking “Aging” and inserting
24 “Age-Friendly Communities”; and

25 (ii) by inserting “to support the abil-
26 ity of older individuals to age in place, in-

1 cluding through the provision of homeless-
2 ness prevention services, support the abil-
3 ity of older individuals to access preventive
4 health care, promote age-friendly commu-
5 nities, and address the ability of older indi-
6 viduals to access long-term care supports,
7 including access to caregivers and home-
8 and community-based services” before the
9 period at the end;

10 (B) in paragraph (4) by inserting “, except
11 that the 1st term of a member appointed to the
12 Interagency Coordinating Committee on Age-
13 Friendly Communities shall begin not later
14 than 1 year after the effective date of this ex-
15 ception” before the period at the end;

16 (C) in paragraph (5) by striking “once
17 each year” and inserting “semiannually”;

18 (D) in paragraph (6)—

19 (i) in subparagraph (A)—

20 (I) in clause (iii) by striking
21 “and” at the end;

22 (II) in clause (iv) by adding
23 “and” at the end; and

24 (III) by adding at the end the
25 following:

1 “(v) identifying best practices for con-
2 necting older individuals to services for which
3 they may be eligible;”;

4 (ii) in subparagraph (B)—

5 (I) by inserting “transportation,”
6 after “housing,” the 1st place it ap-
7 pears;

8 (II) in clause (i) by striking
9 “and” at the end;

10 (III) by amending clause (ii) to
11 read as follows:

12 “(ii) innovations in technology applications
13 (including assistive technology devices and as-
14 sistive technology services) that—

15 “(I) promote safe and accessible inde-
16 pendent living environments; and

17 “(II) give older individuals access to
18 information on available services or help in
19 providing services to older individuals, in-
20 cluding information on transportation serv-
21 ices such as public transit, on-demand
22 transportation services, volunteer-based
23 transportation services, and other private
24 transportation services; and”;

1 (IV) by adding at the end the fol-
2 lowing:

3 “(iii) transportation models that reduce
4 costs of transportation for older individuals and
5 provide the ability to schedule trips in advance
6 and on demand, as appropriate;”;

7 (iii) in subparagraph (E)—

8 (I) by striking “nongovernmental
9 experts and organizations, including
10 public health interest and research
11 groups and foundations” and insert-
12 ing “nongovernmental organizations,
13 academic or research institutions,
14 community-based organizations, and
15 philanthropic organizations”; and

16 (II) by striking “(F)” and insert-
17 ing “(G)”;

18 (iv) by redesignating subparagraphs
19 (E), (F), and (G) as subparagraphs (F),
20 (G), and (H), respectively;

21 (v) by inserting after subparagraph
22 (D) the following:

23 “(E) work with the Centers for Disease Control
24 and Prevention, the National Institute on Aging,
25 Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, the

1 Housing and Urban Development Office of Lead
2 Hazard Control and Healthy Homes, and other Fed-
3 eral agencies as appropriate, to develop rec-
4 ommendations, in accordance with paragraph (1), to
5 reduce falls among older individuals that incorporate
6 evidence-based falls prevention programs and home
7 modifications to reduce and prevent falls;” and

8 (vi) by adding at the end the fol-
9 lowing:

10 “(9) In this subsection, the term ‘age-friendly com-
11 munity’ means a community that—

12 “(A) is taking steps—

13 “(i) to include accessible housing, acces-
14 sible spaces and buildings, safe and secure
15 paths, variable route transportation services,
16 and programs and services designed to maintain
17 health and well-being;

18 “(ii) to respect and include older individ-
19 uals in social opportunities, civic participation,
20 volunteerism, and employment; and

21 “(iii) to facilitate access to supportive serv-
22 ices for older individuals; and

23 “(B) has a plan in place to meet local needs for
24 housing, transportation, civic participation, social
25 connectedness, and accessible spaces.”; and

1 (3) by adding at the end the following:

2 “(d) Not later than 2 years after the effective date
3 of this subsection, the Comptroller General of the United
4 States shall conduct a study and issue a report that in-
5 cludes—

6 “(1) an inventory of Federal programs, admin-
7 istered by the Department of Health and Human
8 Services, the Department of Housing and Urban De-
9 velopment, or any other Federal agency determined
10 appropriate by the Comptroller General, that sup-
11 port home assessments and home modifications for
12 older individuals and individuals with disabilities,

13 “(2) statistical data, for recent fiscal years, on
14 the number of older individuals and individuals with
15 disabilities served by each Federal program de-
16 scribed in paragraph (1) and the approximate
17 amount of Federal funding invested in each such
18 program,

19 “(3) a demographic analysis of individuals
20 served by each such program for recent fiscal years,

21 “(4) an analysis of duplication and gaps in pop-
22 ulations supported by the Federal programs de-
23 scribed in paragraph (1),

24 “(5) what is known about the impact of the
25 Federal programs described in paragraph (1) on

1 health status and health outcomes in populations
2 supported by such programs,

3 “(6) a review of Federal efforts to coordinate
4 Federal programs existing prior to the effective date
5 of this subsection that support home assessments
6 and home modifications for older individuals and in-
7 dividuals with disabilities and any considerations for
8 improving coordination, which may include an indi-
9 cation of the Federal agency or department that is
10 best suited to coordinate such Federal efforts, and

11 “(7) information on the extent to which con-
12 sumer-friendly resources, such as a brochure, are
13 available through the National Eldercare Locator
14 Service established under section 202(a)(21), are ac-
15 cessible to all area agencies on aging, and contain
16 information on home assessments and home modi-
17 fications for older individuals attempting to live
18 independently and safely in their homes and for the
19 caregivers of such individuals.”.

20 **SEC. 106. TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE ON AGE-FRIENDLY COM-**
21 **MUNITIES.**

22 Section 205(a)(2) of the Older Americans Act of
23 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3016(a)(2)) is amended—

24 (1) by redesignating subparagraph (C) as sub-
25 paragraph (D); and

1 (2) by inserting after subparagraph (B) the fol-
2 lowing:

3 “(C) The Assistant Secretary may provide technical
4 assistance, including through the regional offices of the
5 Administration, to State agencies, area agencies on aging,
6 local government agencies, or leaders in age-friendly com-
7 munities (as defined in section 203(c)(9)) regarding—

8 “(i) support for public and private entities in
9 building partnerships to promote such age-friendly
10 communities;

11 “(ii) dissemination of, or consideration of ways
12 to implement, best practices and recommendations
13 from the Interagency Coordinating Committee on
14 Age-Friendly Communities established under section
15 203(c); and

16 “(iii) methods for managing and coordinating
17 existing programs to meet the needs of growing age-
18 friendly communities.”.

19 **SEC. 107. MALNUTRITION.**

20 The Older Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 2011
21 et seq.) is amended—

22 (1) in section 102(14)(B) by inserting “(includ-
23 ing screening for malnutrition)” before the semi-
24 colon at the end; and

1 (2) in section 330(1) by striking “and food in-
2 security” and inserting “, food insecurity, and mal-
3 nutrition”.

4 **SEC. 108. COORDINATION WITH RESOURCE CENTERS.**

5 (a) AREA PLANS.—Section 306(a) of the Older
6 Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3026(a)) is amended—

7 (1) in paragraph (16) by striking “and” at the
8 end;

9 (2) in paragraph (17) by striking the period at
10 the end and inserting “; and”; and

11 (3) by adding at the end the following:

12 “(18) provide assurances that the area agency
13 on aging will collect data to determine—

14 “(A) the services that are needed by older
15 individuals whose needs were the focus of all
16 centers funded under title IV in fiscal year
17 2019; and

18 “(B) the effectiveness of the programs,
19 policies, and services provided by such area
20 agency on aging in assisting such individuals;
21 and

22 “(19) provide assurances that the area agency
23 on aging will use outreach efforts that will identify
24 older individuals eligible for assistance under this
25 Act, with special emphasis on those older individuals

1 whose needs were the focus of all centers funded
2 under title IV in fiscal year 2019.”.

3 (b) STATE PLANS.—Section 307(a) of the Older
4 Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3027) is amended by
5 adding at the end the following:

6 “(31) The plan shall contain an assurance that
7 the State shall prepare and submit to the Assistant
8 Secretary annual reports that describe—

9 “(A) data collected to determine the serv-
10 ices that are needed by older individuals whose
11 needs were the focus of all centers funded
12 under title IV in fiscal year 2019;

13 “(B) data collected to determine the effec-
14 tiveness of the programs, policies, and services
15 provided by area agencies on aging in assisting
16 such individuals; and

17 “(C) outreach efforts and other activities
18 carried out to satisfy the assurances described
19 in paragraphs (18) and (19) of section
20 306(a).”.

21 **SEC. 109. ARTS EDUCATION.**

22 (a) PROGRAM DESIGN.—Section 202(a)(5) of the
23 Older Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3012(a)(5)) is
24 amended by inserting “cultural experiences, activities and
25 services, including the arts,” after “education),”.

1 (b) SUPPORTIVE SERVICES.—Section 321(a)(7) of
2 the Older Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3030d(a)(7))
3 is amended by inserting “cultural experiences (including
4 the arts),” after “art therapy,”.

5 **SEC. 110. SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH.**

6 Section 301(a)(1) of the Older Americans Act of
7 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3021(a)(1)) is amended—

8 (1) in subparagraph (C) by striking “and” at
9 the end;

10 (2) in subparagraph (D) by striking the period
11 at the end and inserting “; and”; and

12 (3) by adding at the end the following:

13 “(E) address the social determinants of health
14 of older individuals.”.

15 **SEC. 111. FALLS PREVENTION AND CHRONIC DISEASE**
16 **SELF-MANAGEMENT EDUCATION.**

17 Section 411(a) of the Older Americans Act of 1965
18 (42 U.S.C. 3032(a)) is amended—

19 (1) by redesignating paragraphs (13) and (14)
20 as paragraphs (15) and (16), respectively; and

21 (2) by inserting after paragraph (12) the fol-
22 lowing:

23 “(13) bringing to scale and sustaining evidence-
24 based falls prevention programs that will reduce the
25 number of falls, fear of falling, and fall-related inju-

1 tion and coordination of supportive services and
2 health care to address negative health effects
3 associated with social isolation; and”.

4 **SEC. 114. INCREASED FOCUS OF ASSISTANT SECRETARY ON**
5 **HEALTH EFFECTS ASSOCIATED WITH SOCIAL**
6 **ISOLATION.**

7 Section 202(a) of the Older Americans Act of 1965
8 (42 U.S.C. 3012(a)), as amended by section 103, is
9 amended—

10 (1) in paragraph (31) by striking “; and” and
11 inserting a semicolon;

12 (2) in paragraph (32) by striking the period at
13 the end and inserting “; and”; and

14 (3) by adding at the end the following:

15 “(33) develop objectives, priorities, and a long-
16 term plan for supporting State and local efforts in-
17 volving education about, prevention of, detection of,
18 and response to negative health effects associated
19 with social isolation among older individuals.”.

20 **SEC. 115. ADVISORY COUNCIL ON HEALTH EFFECTS ASSO-**
21 **CIATED WITH SOCIAL ISOLATION.**

22 Section 202 of the Older Americans Act of 1965 (42
23 U.S.C. 3012), as amended by section 103, is amended by
24 adding at the end the following:

1 “(i)(1) The Assistant Secretary shall convene an ad-
2 visory council on negative health effects associated with
3 social isolation with aging network stakeholders, including
4 caregivers, and select members in a manner that ensures
5 geographic diversity of the members—

6 “(A) to review and evaluate efforts to address
7 negative health effects associated with social isola-
8 tion among older individuals; and

9 “(B) to identify challenges, solutions, and best
10 practices related to such efforts.

11 “(2) The advisory council convened under paragraph
12 (1) shall—

13 “(A) ensure consideration of consumer-directed
14 care models; and

15 “(B) submit a report to Congress on its find-
16 ings.

17 “(3) The Federal Advisory Committee Act (5 U.S.C.
18 App.) shall not apply with respect to the advisory council
19 convened under paragraph (1).”.

20 **SEC. 116. SUPPORTIVE SERVICES AND SENIOR CENTERS.**

21 Section 321(a) of the Older Americans Act of 1965
22 (42 U.S.C. 3030d(a)) is amended—

23 (1) in paragraph (24) by striking “and” at the
24 end;

1 (2) by redesignating paragraph (25) as para-
2 graph (26); and

3 (3) by inserting after paragraph (24) the fol-
4 lowing:

5 “(25) services that promote or support social
6 connectedness and reduce negative health effects as-
7 sociated with social isolation; and”.

8 **SEC. 117. DEMONSTRATION PROJECTS.**

9 (a) DEMONSTRATIONS.—Section 411(a) of the Older
10 Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3032(a)), as amended
11 by section 111, is amended—

12 (1) in paragraph (15) by striking “and” at the
13 end;

14 (2) by redesignating paragraph (16) as para-
15 graph (17); and

16 (3) by inserting after paragraph (15) the fol-
17 lowing:

18 “(16) projects that address negative health ef-
19 fects associated with social isolation among older
20 adults; and”.

21 (b) REPEAL.—Section 416 of the Older Americans
22 Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3032e) is repealed.

23 **SEC. 118. YOUNGER ONSET ALZHEIMER’S DISEASE.**

24 (a) DEFINITION OF “FAMILY CAREGIVER”.—Section
25 302(3) of the Older Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C.

1 3022(3)) is amended by inserting “of any age” after “an
2 individual”.

3 (b) DEFINITION OF “RESIDENT”.—Section 711(6) of
4 the Older Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3058(6)) is
5 amended by inserting “of any age” after “individual”.

6 **SEC. 119. PRIORITY FOR THE SENIOR COMMUNITY SERVICE**
7 **EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM.**

8 (a) PRIORITY.—The Older Americans Act of 1965
9 (42 U.S.C. 3001 et seq.) is amended—

10 (1) in section 503(a)(4)(C)—

11 (A) in clause (iii) by striking “and” at the
12 end;

13 (B) in clause (iv) by adding “and” at the
14 end; and

15 (C) by adding at the end the following:

16 “(v) eligible individuals who have been
17 incarcerated within the last 5 years or are
18 under supervision following the release
19 from prison or jail within the last 5
20 years;”;

21 (2) in section 514(e)(1) by inserting “older in-
22 dividuals who have been incarcerated or are under
23 supervision following the release from prison or jail,”
24 after “need,”; and

25 (3) in section 518—

1 (A) in subsection (a)(3)(B)(ii)—

2 (i) in clause (IV) by striking “or” at
3 the end;

4 (ii) in clause (V) by striking the pe-
5 riod at the end and inserting “; or”; and

6 (iii) by adding at the end the fol-
7 lowing:

8 “(VI) have been incarcerated within
9 the last 5 years or are under supervision
10 following the release from prison or jail
11 within the last 5 years.”; and

12 (B) in subsection (b)(2)—

13 (i) in subparagraph (F) by striking
14 “or” at the end;

15 (ii) in subparagraph (G) by striking
16 the period at the end and inserting “; or”;
17 and

18 (iii) by adding at the end the fol-
19 lowing:

20 “(H) has been incarcerated or is under super-
21 vision following the release from prison or jail within
22 the last 5 years.”.

23 (b) TRANSITION PERIOD.—This section shall take ef-
24 fect 1 year after the date of the enactment of this Act.

1 **SEC. 120. DIRECT CARE WORKFORCE.**

2 (a) DEMONSTRATIONS.—Section 411(a) of the Older
3 Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3032(a)), as amended
4 by sections 111 and 117, is amended—

5 (1) by redesignating paragraphs (16) and (17)
6 as paragraphs (17) and (18), respectively; and

7 (2) by inserting after paragraph (15) the fol-
8 lowing:

9 “(16) in coordination with the Secretary of
10 Labor, the demonstration of new strategies for the
11 recruitment, retention, or advancement of direct care
12 workers, and to solicit, develop, and implement
13 strategies—

14 “(A) to reduce barriers to entry for a di-
15 verse and high-quality direct care workforce, in-
16 cluding providing wages, benefits, and advance-
17 ment opportunities needed to attract or retain
18 direct care workers;

19 “(B) to provide supportive services and ca-
20 reer planning for direct care workers; and

21 “(C) to support the advancement of direct
22 care workers through education and workforce
23 development programs that include necessary
24 credential or licensing preparation, paid on-the-
25 job training or work-based learning, and appro-
26 priate safety training;”.

1 (b) OLDER AMERICAN COMMUNITY SERVICE EM-
2 PLOYMENT PROGRAM.—Section 502(e)(2)(B) of the Older
3 Americans Act of 1965 (42 U.S.C. 3056(e)(2)(B)) is
4 amended—

12 amount expended by the State agency with

14 2019, and an amount that is not less than the
15 amount expended by the State agency with
16 funds received under title VII for fiscal year

19 cies pursuant to section 712 shall be used to
20 supplement and not supplant other Federal,

AN ACT

To amend the Older Americans Act of 1965 to authorize appropriations for fiscal years 2020 through 2024, and for other purposes.
