## AN ACT

To amend the Public Health Service Act to reauthorize and enhance the poison center national toll-free number, national media campaign, and grant program, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

## 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "Poison Center Network
- 3 Enhancement Act of 2019".
- 4 SEC. 2. REAUTHORIZATION OF POISON CONTROL CENTERS
- 5 NATIONAL TOLL-FREE NUMBER.
- 6 Section 1271 of the Public Health Service Act (42
- 7 U.S.C. 300d–71) is amended to read as follows:
- 8 "SEC. 1271. ESTABLISHMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF THE
- 9 NATIONAL TOLL-FREE NUMBER AND EN-
- 10 HANCED COMMUNICATIONS CAPABILITIES.
- 11 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall provide co-
- 12 ordination and assistance to poison control centers for—
- "(1) the development, establishment, implemen-
- tation, and maintenance of a nationwide toll-free
- 15 phone number; and
- 16 "(2) the enhancement of communications capa-
- bilities, which may include text capabilities.
- 18 "(b) Consultation.—The Secretary may consult
- 19 with nationally recognized professional organizations in
- 20 the field of poison control to determine the best and most
- 21 effective means of achieving the goals described in para-
- 22 graphs (1) and (2) of subsection (a).
- 23 "(c) Rule of Construction.—In assisting with
- 24 public health emergencies, responses, or preparedness,
- 25 nothing in this section shall be construed to restrict the

2	by the Secretary or other governmental agencies.
3	"(d) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
4	is authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section
5	\$700,000 for each of fiscal years 2020 through 2024.".
6	SEC. 3. REAUTHORIZATION OF NATIONWIDE PUBLIC
7	AWARENESS CAMPAIGN TO PROMOTE POI-
8	SON CONTROL CENTER UTILIZATION.

7	"(c) CONTRACT WITH ENTITY.—The Secretary may
8	carry out subsection (a) by entering into contracts with
9	one or more public or private entities, including nationally
10	recognized professional organizations in the field of poison
11	control and national media firms, for the development and
12	implementation of the awareness campaign under sub-
13	section (a), which may include—

- 7 "(5) to develop, support, and enhance tech-8 nology and capabilities of nationally recognized pro-9 fessional organizations in the field of poison control 10 to collect national poisoning, toxic occurrence, and

related public health data;

internet, data, and social networking technologies;

- "(6) to develop initiatives to foster the enhanced public health utilization of national poison data collected by such organizations;
  - "(7) to support and expand the toxicologic expertise within poison control centers; and
- "(8) to improve the capacity of poison control centers to answer high volumes of contacts and internet communications, and to sustain and enhance the poison control center's network capability to respond during times of national crisis or other public health emergencies.
- "(c) Accreditation.—Except as provided in sub-24 section (d), the Secretary may award a grant to a poison 25 control center under subsection (a) only if—

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- "(1) the center has been accredited by a nationally recognized professional organization in the field of poison control, and the Secretary has approved the organization as having in effect standards for accreditation that reasonably provide for the protection of the public health with respect to poisoning; or
  - "(2) the center has been accredited by a State government, and the Secretary has approved the State government as having in effect standards for accreditation that reasonably provide for the protection of the public health with respect to poisoning. "(d) WAIVER OF ACCREDITATION REQUIREMENTS.—
  - "(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary may grant a waiver of the accreditation requirements of subsection (c) with respect to a nonaccredited poison control center that applies for a grant under this section if such center can reasonably demonstrate that the center will obtain such an accreditation within a reasonable period of time as determined appropriate by the Secretary.
  - "(2) Renewal.—The Secretary may renew a waiver under paragraph (1).
- 24 "(3) LIMITATION.—The Secretary may not, 25 after the date of enactment of the Poison Control

- 2 son control center waivers or renewals that total
- 3 more than 5 years.
- 4 "(e) Supplement Not Supplant.—Amounts made
- 5 available to a poison control center under this section shall
- 6 be used to supplement and not supplant other Federal,
- 7 State, or local funds provided for such center.
- 8 "(f) Maintenance of Effort.—A poison control
- 9 center, in utilizing the proceeds of a grant under this sec-
- 10 tion, shall maintain the annual recurring expenditures of
- 11 the center for its activities at a level that is not less than
- 12 80 percent of the average level of such recurring expendi-
- 13 tures maintained by the center for the preceding 3 fiscal
- 14 years for which a grant is received.
- 15 "(g) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
- 16 is authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section,
- 17 \$28,600,000 for each of fiscal years 2020 through 2024.
- 18 The Secretary may utilize an amount not to exceed 6 per-
- 19 cent of the amount appropriated pursuant to the pre-
- 20 ceding sentence for each fiscal year for coordination, dis-
- 21 semination, technical assistance, program evaluation, data
- 22 activities, and other program administration functions,

- 1 which are determined by the Secretary to be appropriate
- 2 for carrying out the program under this section.".
