Ms. DUCKWORTH (for herself, Mr. CASEY, Mr. DURBIN, Mrs. GILLIBRAND, and Mr. VAN HOLLEN) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

A BILL

To amend the Child Care Access Means Parents in School Program under the Higher Education Act of 1965.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Expanding On-Campus
5 Child Care to Help Student Parents Succeed Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. CHILD CARE ACCESS MEANS PARENTS IN SCHOOL.**

7 Section 419N of the Higher Education Act of 1965
8 (20 U.S.C. 1070e) is amended—

1 (1) by striking subsection (a) and inserting the
2 following:

3 “(a) PURPOSE.—The purpose of this section is to fa-
4 cilitate the success of low-income parents in postsecondary
5 education through the provision of subsidized child care
6 services, including campus-based child care services.”;

7 (2) in subsection (b)—

8 (A) in paragraph (2), by striking subpara-
9 graphs (A) and (B) and inserting the following:

10 “(A) MINIMUM GRANT AMOUNT.—A grant
11 under this section shall be awarded in an
12 amount that is not less than \$50,000.

13 “(B) CCAMPIS INCREASE.—

14 “(i) IN GENERAL.—For any fiscal
15 year for which the amount appropriated
16 under subsection (h) is not less than
17 \$140,000,000, the Secretary may increase
18 the amount of a grant awarded under this
19 section to an eligible institution of higher
20 education if the institution submits an ap-
21 plication that—

22 “(I) demonstrates the success of
23 the eligible institution of higher edu-
24 cation in serving a significant number
25 of low-income student parents, which

1 may include graduation, transfer, or
2 retention rates for full-time and part-
3 time students receiving subsidies for
4 child care under this section;

5 “(II) demonstrates the need for
6 additional funds; and

7 “(III) provides information re-
8 garding the planned use of additional
9 funds to—

10 “(aa) improve the quality of
11 a campus-based child care facil-
12 ity;

13 “(bb) provide child care sub-
14 sidies to additional student par-
15 ents; or

16 “(cc) provide support serv-
17 ices to student parents.

18 “(ii) MAXIMUM AMOUNT.—The in-
19 crease paid to an eligible institution of
20 higher education under clause (i) for a fis-
21 cal year shall not exceed an amount equal
22 to 20 percent of the amount of the annual
23 grant payment received by the institution
24 under paragraph (3)(B) for the fiscal year

preceding the fiscal year for which the increase is paid.

“(iii) ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION.—In this subparagraph, the term ‘eligible institution of higher education’ means an institution of higher education that has received a grant under this section for not less than the period of 3 consecutive fiscal years preceding the fiscal year in which the increase is paid under clause (i).”;

(B) in paragraph (3)—

(i) in subparagraph (A), by striking “4 years” and inserting “5 years”; and

(ii) in subparagraph (B), by striking “subsection (e)(2)” and inserting “subsection (e)(3)”;

(C) in paragraph (4), by striking “exceeds \$350,000” and all that follows through the period at the end and inserting “exceeds \$300,000, except for institutions that are eligible for assistance under title III or V.”; and

(D) by striking paragraph (5) and inserting the following:

1 “(5) USE OF FUNDS.—Grants funds under this
2 section shall be used by an institution of higher edu-
3 cation to support accessible high-quality child care
4 services for low-income parents enrolled in postsec-
5 ondary education. Grant funds under this section
6 may be used—

7 “(A) to support or establish a campus-
8 based child care program primarily serving the
9 needs of low-income students enrolled at the in-
10 stitution of higher education;

11 “(B) to provide child care subsidies or a
12 sliding fee scale for low-income student parents;

13 “(C) to provide affordable and accessible
14 before and after school services for children of
15 low-income student parents;

16 “(D) to provide support services for low-in-
17 come student parents; or

18 “(E) to enhance the quality of campus-
19 based child care services, including improve-
20 ments to—

21 “(i) move to the next tier or level of
22 the State tiered and transparent system
23 for measuring the quality of child care pro-
24 viders;

1 “(ii) implement the training and pro-
 2 fessional development required for child
 3 care providers through the Child Care and
 4 Development Block Grant Act of 2014
 5 (Public Law 113–186); or

6 “(iii) implement quality improvements
 7 toward achieving accreditation from a na-
 8 tionally recognized accrediting body.”;

9 (3) by striking subsection (c) and inserting the
 10 following:

11 “(c) APPLICATIONS.—

12 “(1) IN GENERAL.—An institution of higher
 13 education desiring a grant under this section shall
 14 submit an application to the Secretary at such time,
 15 in such manner, and accompanied by such informa-
 16 tion as the Secretary may require. Such application
 17 shall—

18 “(A) demonstrate that the institution is an
 19 eligible institution described in subsection
 20 (b)(4);

21 “(B) specify the amount of funds re-
 22 quested;

23 “(C) demonstrate the need of low-income
 24 students at the institution for accessible and af-

1 fordable child care services by including in the
2 application—

3 “(i) information regarding student de-
4 mographics;

5 “(ii) an assessment of child care ca-
6 pacity on or near campus;

7 “(iii) information regarding the exist-
8 ence of waiting lists for child care services
9 on or near campus;

10 “(iv) information regarding additional
11 needs created by concentrations of poverty
12 or by geographic isolation; and

13 “(v) other relevant data;

14 “(D) contain a description of the activities
15 to be assisted, including whether the grant
16 funds will support an existing child care pro-
17 gram or a new child care program;

18 “(E) identify the resources, including tech-
19 nical expertise and financial support, the insti-
20 tution will draw upon to support the child care
21 program and the participation of low-income
22 students in the program (such as accessing so-
23 cial services funding, using student activity fees
24 to help pay the costs of child care, using re-
25 sources obtained by meeting the needs of par-

ents who are not low-income students, and accessing foundation, corporate, or other institutional support) and demonstrate that the use of the resources will not result in increases in student tuition;

“(F) contain an assurance that the institution will meet the child care needs of low-income students through the provision of services, or through a contract for the provision of services;

“(G) describe the extent to which the child care program will coordinate with the institution’s early childhood education curriculum, to the extent the curriculum is available, to meet the needs of the students in the early childhood education program at the institution, and the needs of the parents and children participating in the child care program assisted under this section;

“(H) in the case of an institution seeking assistance for a new child care program—

“(i) provide a timeline, covering the period from receipt of the grant through the provision of the child care services, delineating the specific steps the institution

1 will take to achieve the goal of providing
2 low-income students with child care serv-
3 ices;

4 “(ii) specify any measures the institu-
5 tion will take to assist low-income students
6 with child care during the period before
7 the institution provides child care services;

8 “(iii) include a plan for identifying re-
9 sources needed for the child care services,
10 including space in which to provide child
11 care services, and technical assistance if
12 necessary; and

13 “(iv) include plans to assure quality of
14 campus-based child care facilities;

15 “(I) in the case of an institution seeking
16 assistance for a campus-based child care pro-
17 gram in existence on the date of the applica-
18 tion—

19 “(i) provide information regarding the
20 number of low-income students served
21 through campus-based child care on such
22 date;

23 “(ii) provide information on the age
24 groups of children to be served;

1 “(iii) specify any measures the institu-
2 tion will take to assist students eligible
3 under this section who are waitlisted for
4 the campus-based child care program;

5 “(iv) provide information regarding
6 the application of subsidies or a sliding fee
7 scale for child care services;

8 “(v) specify what staff positions will
9 be supported by funding under this sec-
10 tion, and how those staff positions support
11 the purpose under subsection (a);

12 “(vi) provide information on the total
13 number of children served by the campus-
14 based child care program, and number of
15 children of students served; and

16 “(vii) specify if funding will be used to
17 enhance program quality as described in
18 subsection (b)(5)(E);

19 “(J) in the case of an institution seeking
20 assistance that will contract for the provision of
21 child care services—

22 “(i) provide information on the age
23 groups of children to be served;

1 “(ii) provide information regarding
2 the application of subsidies or a sliding fee
3 scale for child care services; and

4 “(iii) provide information regarding
5 parameters the institution will use in se-
6 lecting child care providers in contracting
7 for the provision of services, including—

8 “(I) assessment of program qual-
9 ity; and

10 “(II) geographic location;

11 “(K) contain an assurance that any child
12 care facility assisted under this section will
13 meet the applicable State and local government
14 licensing, certification, approval, or registration
15 requirements;

16 “(L) describe how information regarding
17 the availability of subsidized child care will be
18 provided to students;

19 “(M) contain an assurance that the insti-
20 tution, when applicable, will make information
21 available to students receiving child care serv-
22 ices provided under this section about the eligi-
23 bility of such students for assistance under the
24 supplemental nutrition assistance program
25 under the Food and Nutrition Act of 2008 (7

1 U.S.C. 2011 et seq.) and the program of block
 2 grants for States for temporary assistance for
 3 needy families established under part A of title
 4 IV of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 601 et
 5 seq.);

6 “(N) contain an abstract summarizing the
 7 contents of such application and how the insti-
 8 tution intends to achieve the purpose under
 9 subsection (a); and

10 “(O) contain a plan for any child care fa-
 11 cility assisted under this section to become ac-
 12 credited within 3 years of the date the institu-
 13 tion first receives assistance under this section.

14 “(2) TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.—The Secretary
 15 may provide technical assistance to eligible institu-
 16 tions to help such institutions qualify for, apply for,
 17 and maintain a grant under this section.”;

18 (4) by striking subsection (d) and inserting the
 19 following:

20 “(d) PRIORITY.—

21 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall give
 22 priority in awarding grants under this section—

23 “(A) first to institutions of higher edu-
 24 cation that submit applications describing pro-
 25 grams that leverage significant local or institu-

1 tional resources, including in-kind contribu-
 2 tions, to support the activities assisted under
 3 this section; and

4 “(B) to institutions of higher education
 5 that submit applications describing programs
 6 that utilize a sliding fee scale for child care
 7 services provided under this section in order to
 8 support a high number of low-income parents
 9 pursuing postsecondary education at the insti-
 10 tution, after the institution gives priority to in-
 11 stitutions described in subparagraph (A).

12 “(2) PROHIBITION.—The Secretary may not
 13 give priority in awarding grants under this section
 14 to institutions of higher education that propose
 15 projects that are designed to increase access to edu-
 16 cational choice.”;

17 (5) in subsection (e)—

18 (A) in paragraph (1)(B), by striking the
 19 semicolon at the end of clause (i) and inserting
 20 the following: “which shall include—

21 “(I) the number of full- and part-
 22 time students, respectively, receiving
 23 child care services under this section;

1 “(II) whether the institution re-
2 stricts eligibility for child care services
3 to only full-time students; and

4 “(III) the number of students re-
5 ceiving child care services under this
6 section who—

7 “(aa) remain enrolled at the
8 institution during the academic
9 year for which they received such
10 services;

11 “(bb) graduate from the in-
12 stitution during the academic
13 year for which they received such
14 services;

15 “(cc) transfer to a different
16 institution during the academic
17 year for which they received such
18 services; or

19 “(dd) withdrew from the in-
20 stitution during the academic
21 year for which they received such
22 services;”;

23 (B) by redesignating paragraph (2) as
24 paragraph (3);

1 (C) by inserting after paragraph (1) the
2 following:

3 “(2) REPORT.—

4 “(A) REPORT REQUIRED.—On an annual
5 basis, the Secretary shall submit to the author-
6 izing committees a report that includes—

7 “(i) a summary of the information de-
8 scribed in paragraph (1); and

9 “(ii) each abstract submitted under
10 subsection (c)(1)(N) by an institution of
11 higher education that receives a grant
12 under this section.

13 “(B) PUBLIC AVAILABILITY.—The Sec-
14 retary shall make each report submitted under
15 subparagraph (A) publicly available.

16 “(C) STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION.—The
17 Secretary shall work with relevant stakeholders
18 to determine the manner in which the data de-
19 scribed under subparagraph (A) is collected in
20 order to ensure compliance with such subpara-
21 graph.”; and

22 (D) by inserting after paragraph (3) the
23 following:

24 “(4) TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE.—The Secretary
25 shall provide technical assistance to institutions of

1 higher education receiving grants under this section
2 to help such institutions meet necessary reporting
3 requirements.”;

4 (6) by redesignating subsection (g) as sub-
5 section (h);

6 (7) by inserting after subsection (f) the fol-
7 lowing:

8 “(g) NONDISCRIMINATION.—No person in the United
9 States shall, on the basis of actual or perceived race, color,
10 religion, national origin, sex (including sexual orientation
11 and gender identity), or disability, be excluded from par-
12 ticipation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to
13 discrimination by any program funded, in whole or in part,
14 with funds made available under this section or with
15 amounts appropriated for grants, contracts, or certificates
16 administered with such funds.”; and

17 (8) in subsection (h), as redesignated by para-
18 graph (6), by striking “such sums as may be nec-
19 essary for fiscal year 2009 and each of the five suc-
20 ceeding fiscal years” and inserting “\$200,000,000
21 for fiscal year 2020 and each succeeding fiscal
22 year”.

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
