Resolved, That the bill from the Senate (S. 1678) entitled "An Act to express United States support for Taiwan's diplomatic alliances around the world.", do pass with the following

AMENDMENT:

Strike out all after the enacting clause and insert:

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Taiwan Allies Inter3 national Protection and Enhancement Initiative (TAIPEI)
4 Act of 2019".

5 SEC. 2. DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WITH TAIWAN.

6 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following findings: 7 (1) The Taiwan Relations Act of 1979 (Public 8 Law 96–8) states that it is the policy of the United 9 States "to preserve and promote extensive, close, and 10 friendly commercial, cultural, and other relations be-11 tween the people of the United States and the people 12 on Taiwan".

(2) The Taiwan Relations Act of 1979 states that
it is the policy of the United States "to maintain the
capacity of the United States to resist any resort to

1	force or other forms of coercion that would jeopardize
2	the security, or the social or economic system, of the
3	people on Taiwan".
4	(3) Taiwan is a free, democratic, and prosperous
5	nation of 23,000,000 people and an important con-
6	tributor to peace and stability around the world.
7	(4) Since the election of President Tsai Ing-wen
8	as President of Taiwan in 2016, the Government of
9	the People's Republic of China has intensified its ef-
10	forts to pressure Taiwan.
11	(5) Since 2016, the Gambia, Sao Tome and
12	Principe, Panama, the Dominican Republic, Burkina
13	Faso, El Salvador, the Solomon Islands, and Kiribati
14	have severed diplomatic relations with Taiwan in
15	favor of diplomatic relations with China.
16	(6) Taiwan currently maintains full diplomatic
17	relations with 15 nations around the world.
18	(7) Taiwan's unique relationship with the
19	United States, Australia, India, Japan, and other
20	countries are of significant benefit in strengthening
21	Taiwan's economy and preserving its international
22	space.
23	(8) According to President Tsai Ing-wen, the sev-
24	erance of diplomatic ties with Taiwan in favor of
25	diplomatic relations with China is "part of a series

1	of diplomatic and military acts of coercion" by
2	China.
3	(9) The Asia Reassurance Initiative Act of 2018
4	(Public Law 115–409) states that—
5	(A) it is United States policy "to support
6	the close economic, political, and security rela-
7	tionship between Taiwan and the United
8	States"; and
9	(B) the President should—
10	(i) "conduct regular transfers of de-
11	fense articles to Taiwan that are tailored to
12	meet the existing and likely future threats
13	from the People's Republic of China, includ-
14	ing supporting the efforts of Taiwan to de-
15	velop and integrate asymmetric capabilities,
16	as appropriate, including mobile, surviv-
17	able, and cost-effective capabilities, into its
18	military forces"; and
19	(ii) "encourage the travel of high-level
20	United States officials to Taiwan, in ac-
21	cordance with the Taiwan Travel Act".
22	SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS ON TRADE AND ECONOMIC
23	RELATIONS WITH TAIWAN.
24	It is the sense of Congress that—

1	(1) the United States and Taiwan have built a
2	strong economic partnership, with the United States
3	now Taiwan's second largest trading partner and
4	with Taiwan the 11th largest trading partner of the
5	United States and a key destination for United States
6	agricultural exports;
7	(2) strong United States-Taiwan economic rela-
8	tions have been a positive factor in stimulating eco-
9	nomic growth and job creation for the people of both
10	the United States and Taiwan; and
11	(3) the United States Trade Representative
12	should consult with Congress on opportunities for fur-
13	ther strengthening bilateral trade and economic rela-
14	tions between the United States and Taiwan.
15	SEC. 4. POLICY OF THE UNITED STATES WITH REGARD TO
16	TAIWAN'S PARTICIPATION IN INTER-
17	NATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS.
18	It should be the policy of the United States—
19	(1) to advocate, as appropriate—
20	(A) for Taiwan's membership in all inter-
21	national organizations in which statehood is not
22	a requirement and in which the United States is
23	also a participant; and

1	(B) for Taiwan to be granted observer sta-
2	tus in other appropriate international organiza-
3	tions;
4	(2) to instruct, as appropriate, representatives of
5	the United States Government in all organizations
6	described in paragraph (1) to use the voice, vote, and
7	influence of the United States to advocate for Tai-
8	wan's membership or observer status in such organi-
9	zations; and
10	(3) for the President or the President's designees
11	to advocate, as appropriate, for Taiwan's membership
12	or observer status in all organizations described in
13	paragraph (1) as part of any relevant bilateral en-

14 gagements between the United States and the People's
15 Republic of China, including leader summits and the

16 U.S.-China Comprehensive Economic Dialogue.

17 SEC. 5. STRENGTHENING OF TIES WITH TAIWAN.

(a) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Congress
that the United States Government should—

20 (1) support Taiwan in strengthening its official
21 diplomatic relationships as well as other partnerships
22 with countries in the Indo-Pacific region and around
23 the world;

24 (2) consider, in certain cases as appropriate and
25 in alignment with United States interests, increasing

1	its economic, security, and diplomatic engagement
2	with nations that have demonstrably strengthened, en-
3	hanced, or upgraded relations with Taiwan; and
4	(3) consider, in certain cases as appropriate, in
5	alignment with United States foreign policy interests
6	and in consultation with Congress, altering its eco-
7	nomic, security, and diplomatic engagement with na-
8	tions that take serious or significant actions to under-
9	mine the security or prosperity of Taiwan.
10	(b) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after the date of
11	the enactment of this Act, and annually thereafter for five
12	years, the Secretary of State shall report to the appropriate
13	congressional committees on the steps taken in accordance
14	with subsection (a).
15	(c) Appropriate Congressional Committees De-
16	FINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate congres-
17	sional committees" means—
10	

18 (1) the Committee on Foreign Relations, the
19 Committee on Appropriations, and the Committee on
20 Finance of the Senate; and

(2) the Committee on Foreign Affairs, the Com mittee on Appropriations, and the Committee on
 Ways and Means of the House of Representatives.
