3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Preserving America's
- 5 Battlefields Act".

Section 2 of the Civil War Battlefield Preservation
Act of 2002 (Public Law 107–359) is amended to read
as follows:
"SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.
"(a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
"(1) Battlefields of the American Revolution,

9 War of 1812 and the Civil War—

10 "(A) provide a means for the people of the 11 United States to understand our Nation's tur-12 bulent first century;

"(B) serve as living memorials to those 13 14 who fought and sacrificed in these conflicts to 15 establish and maintain our freedom and liberty;

"(C) serve as training grounds for our Na-16 17 tion's Armed Forces; and

"(D) serve as heritage tourism destina-18 19 tions, generating revenue for local economies.

20 "(2) According to the Report on the Nation's 21 Civil War Battlefields, prepared by the National 22 Park Service and updated in 2010, of the 383 Civil War battlefields identified as national preservation 23 24 priorities-

SEC. 2. CIVIL WAR BATTLEFIELD PRESERVATION ACT OF

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1	"(A) only at 31 battlefields is more than
2	half of the surviving landscape permanently
3	protected;
4	"(B) at 227 battlefields, less than half of
5	the surviving landscape is permanently pro-
6	tected;
7	"(C) 65 battlefields have no protection at
8	all; and
9	"(D) 113 battlefields have been severely
10	hampered by development since the Civil War
11	or are on the verge of being overwhelmed.
12	"(3) According to the 2007 Report to Congress
13	on the Historic Preservation of Revolutionary War
14	and War of 1812 Sites in the United States, pre-
15	pared by the National Park Service, of the 243 prin-
16	cipal Revolutionary War and War of 1812 battle-
17	fields identified as national preservation priorities—
18	"(A) almost 70 percent lie within urban
19	areas as denoted in the 2000 U.S. Census;
20	"(B) 141 are lost or extremely fragmented,
21	with residential and commercial development
22	being the chief threats;
23	"(C) 100 other battlefields retain signifi-
24	cant features and lands from the period of bat-

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1	tle, although on average these battlefields retain
2	only 37 percent of the original historic scene;
3	"(D) of these 100 surviving but diminished
4	battle landscapes, 82 are partially owned and
5	protected by public and nonprofit stewards, al-
6	though the extent of that protection varies from
7	site to site;
8	"(E) 18 are without any legal protection;
9	"(F) the condition of two battlefields is un-
10	known, with additional research and survey
11	being required to determine their exact location
12	and condition; and
13	"(G) the paucity of existing battlefield
14	landscapes necessitates preservation and main-
15	tenance of what precious little remains today.
16	"(b) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are—
17	((1) to act quickly and proactively to preserve
18	and protect nationally significant battlefields of the
19	American Revolution, War of 1812, and Civil War
20	through conservation easements and fee-simple pur-
21	chases of those battlefields from willing sellers; and
22	((2) to create partnerships among State and
23	local governments, regional entities, and the private
24	sector to preserve, conserve, and enhance the visitor

experience at nationally significant battlefields of the
 American Revolution, War of 1812, and Civil War.".

3 SEC. 3. PRESERVATION ASSISTANCE.

4 Section 308103(f) of title 54, United States Code, is
5 amended to read as follows:

6 "(f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There 7 is authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary to pro-8 vide grants under this section \$20,000,000 for each fiscal 9 year through 2028, of which not more than 10 percent 10 may be used each fiscal year as follows:

11 "(1) Not more than \$1,000,000 for projects 12 and programs that modernize battlefield interpretive 13 and educational assets through the deployment of 14 technology, disbursed through the competitive grant 15 process to non-profit organizations.

16 "(2) Not more than \$1,000,000 for grants to 17 organizations described in section 501(c)(3) of the 18 Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and exempt from 19 taxation under section 501(a) of such Code to be 20 used for projects that restore day-of-battle condi-21 tions on land preserved through Battlefield Land 22 Acquisition Grant Program funds.".
