Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent to take from the Speaker's table the bill (H.R. 2157) making supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019, and for other purposes, with the Senate amendment thereto, and concur in the Senate amendment.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. For what purpose does the gentleman from Tennessee seek recognition?

Mr. JOHN W. ROSE of Tennessee. Mr. Speaker, reserving the right to object.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The gentleman is recognized on his reservation.

Mr. JOHN W. ROSE of Tennessee. Mr. Speaker, I am standing in a House chamber that is virtually empty. Nearly all of my 431 colleagues are absent as the Speaker of the House seeks to pass a \$19 billion spending bill.

Our Nation is \$22 trillion in debt. Trying to pass nearly \$20 billion in new spending while the majority of Congress is not even in Washington reflects another act of irresponsible big government.

This is absolutely, without a doubt, wrong. It is no surprise that public confidence in Congress is at historic lows.

Every single Member could board a plane today, and this issue could be voted on in the next 12 hours.

We are each accountable to the American people, who entrusted us with their votes and sent us here to work on their behalf. I am accountable to the people of Tennessee, and I can say with confidence: Tennesseans deserve better than what is being attempted here today.

I never expected, when I came to Washington, that I would be asked to stay home while \$19 billion is spent without my vote.

I urge the Speaker of the House, who is also not here today, to return to her

#### NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM EXTENSION ACT OF 2019

Mr. EVANS. Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent to take from the Speaker's table the bill (S. 1693) to reauthorize the National Flood Insurance Program and ask for its immediate consideration in the House.

The Clerk read the title of the bill.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Is there objection to the request of the gentleman from Pennsylvania?

There was no objection.

The text of the bill is as follows:

S. 1693

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

#### SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "National Flood Insurance Program Extension Act of 2019".

#### SEC. 2. REAUTHORIZATION OF NATIONAL FLOOD INSURANCE PROGRAM.

(a) FINANCING.—Section 1309(a) of the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 4016(a)) is amended by striking "May 31, 2019" and inserting "June 14, 2019".

(b) PROGRAM EXPIRATION.—Section 1319 of the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. 4026) is amended by striking "May 31, 2019" and inserting "June 14, 2019".

(c) RETROACTIVE EFFECTIVE DATE.—If this Act is enacted after May 31, 2019, the amendments made by subsections (a) and (b) shall take effect as if enacted on May 31, 2019.

The bill was ordered to be read a third time, was read the third time, and passed, and a motion to reconsider was laid on the table.
