It is in keeping with the power invested in Congress under these articles to direct the Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) to study our dependence on Chinese pharmaceuticals; direct HHS to provide recommendations for weaning the American people off this dangerous dependence; and authorize the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to issue black-box warnings informing consumers of any risk they are taking when using pharmaceuticals from countries with systemic issues of supervision.

EXTENSIONS OF REMARKS

INTRODUCTION OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA COURTS AND PUBLIC DEFENDER SERVICE VOLUNTARY SEPARATION INCENTIVE PAYMENTS ACT

Ms. NORTON. Madam Speaker, today, I introduce the District of Columbia Courts and Public Defender Service Voluntary Separation Incentive Payments Act. This bill, which passed the House in the 114th Congress, would make a small but important change to the authorities of the District of Columbia Courts (D.C. Courts) and the Public Defender Service for the District of Columbia (PDS), giving them the same authority federal agencies and federal courts already have to offer voluntary separation incentive payments, or buyouts, to their employees.

We were able to get buyout authority for the D.C. Courts and PDS in fiscal year 2020 in the recently enacted spending bill. However, my bill is necessary to make this authorization permanent. Buyouts would allow the D.C. Courts and PDS to respond to future administrative and budgetary needs, and would provide the flexibility to extend buyout offers to their employees.

The U.S. Government Accountability Office has determined that voluntary separation incentive payments may be made only where statutorily authorized. Federal agencies and federal courts already have the statutory authority to offer buyouts, and there is no reason why the D.C. Courts and PDS should not have the same express authority in order to manage their workforce as budget conditions and needs change.

I urge my colleagues to support this important legislation.

GROVELAND FOUR MONUMENT DEDICATION

Mr. SPANO. Madam Speaker, I rise in memory of four young African American men who in 1949 in Lake County, FL, were harshly and unjustly mistreated by our judicial system—Charles Greenlee, Walter Irving, Samuel Shepherd, and Ernest Thomas.

The Groveland Four case, as it become known, centered around the alleged sexual assault of a 17-year-old white girl and an attack on her husband. Given the cruel reality of the social and racial divide of 1949 Florida, it would have been impossible for these young men to receive a fair and unbiased trial, despite being represented by Thurgood Marshall.

The incident lit a chain of events in our community that will forever be remembered as some of the most painful and scarring moments in our history. Almost 70 years later, the City of Groveland and Lake County apologized to their survivors and in 2019, Gov. Ron DeSantis officially pardoned the men—actions I commend.

It is never too late for justice, and never too late to do what is right. We have grown since those times in Lake County, but we're not done. I pray that the Groveland Four Monument brings some healing to their surviving family members, and that it is a constant reminder to us to always pursue truth and justice for all of our citizens.

Mr. Nolan's family, including his loyal parrot bird Gus who never left his side, friends and union brothers were very important to him. Cliff is remembered by those close to him as being laid-back, always happy and always looking to make those around him happy. Whenever his friends or family called on him to help, he was there without any thought or hesitation. He is survived by his wife Nancy, his mother Dolores, his sister Tracey and his adored nephew Joseph, his stepchildren Rick Roeder and Kasi Shepard and his four step grandchildren Blake Roeder, Preston Shephard, Hayden Shephard, and Bryna Shephard and his many cousins.
